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Warsaw, 27 June.

THe King having received advice, That the *Turks* and *Tartars* prepare to come into the Field with great Armies, has sent the *Palatine of Russia*, and the *Palatine of Rivia*, towards the Frontiers, to give the necessary Orders for the bringing our Forces together, and the forming an Army, which the King will command in Person: His Majesty has likewise given orders for the fortifying the City of *Leopol*, at his own particular charge, the Revenues of the Republick being at present so exhausted; that they can hardly furnish the expences necessary in other matters, for the prosecuting the War. The *Tartars* make daily incursions into our Territories, and have had the boldness to come almost to the Walls of *Leopol*, doing much mischief every where as they passed, and carrying away with them great numbers of people, and many of the Nobility. And our Letters add, That the Garrison of *Jaslowiec* having sallied out, to repulse them, were beaten by them, and all killed and taken; after which, the Enemy took the Town and burnt it. In the mean time, the Bishop of *Marselles*, Extraordinary Ambassador from the most Christian King at this Court, assures his Majesty, that the King his Master will use all his endeavors to procure us a honorable Peace with the *Turks*, and that to that purpose he has sent Instructions to Monsieur de *Noiuel*, his Ambassador at the Port.

Rome, June 29. On Thursday last, according to the Aquil Custom the Prince of *Palestrina*, who, for that purpose, had the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary of the Crown of *Spain*, did homage to his Holiness, in the name of his Catholic Majesty, for the Kingdom of *Naples*: This Ceremony was performed with more than ordinary magnificence; for besides the great numbers of Prelates, Nobility, and other persons of quality, who with their attendance assisted at it, the Princes own Train and Equipage was extraordinary numerous and splendid. It is reported, that the said Prince is to succeed the Marquess *d'Astorga* in the Government of *Naples*. Several Banditti of *Naples* having lately retired into the Ecclesiastical Territories, the Marquess *d'Astorga* upon notice thereof sent to our Superiors to demand, that they might be put into his hands to receive the punishment they had deserved, according to the Laws of that Kingdom; which being refused, it seems the Marquess resolved to take them by force of Arms. For the twenty eighth instant, the Governor of *Ascoli* sent an Express hither to acquaint the Cardinal Patron, That the President of *Liquita* had with 2000 Men entered into the Ecclesiastical Territories, in pursuit of the said Banditti, and that being informed that some of them had for their greater security, put themselves into a certain Castle not far from *Ascoli*; the said President attacked it, but that the Banditti assisted by the strength of the place, and the Country people thereabouts, had defended themselves; till he (the Governor of *Ascoli*) having an account of what was doing, came with a considerable party, drawn out of that Garrison to their assistance; the fight was sharply maintained on both sides, and lasted above four hours, when the Spaniards were forced to retreat, leaving many of their Companions dead behind them. Since the Banditti to revenge themselves on the Spaniards, have entered into the County of *Abuzzo*; and done much mischief there. Our Superiors are much concerned hereat, and are desirous to find out some mean to adjust this matter. The Pope has for these two or three days past been somewhat indisposed.

Berlin, July 3. The first instant, the Treaty between our Elector and the States General of the *United Provinces*, was concluded and signed, and in a day or two the Heer Van *Achtienhoven* who hath Negotiated this Treaty, on the part of the said States, parts hence with the Ratifications of it for the *Hague*. We are told, That by this Treaty his Electoral Highness has obliged himself to act offensively against the most Christian King in favor of the Dutch, and that accordingly his Electoral Highnesss Forces begin already to march.

Frankfort, July 12. Monsieur de *Turenne*, whose Army is at present composed of above 20000 fighting men, is returned from the *Bergstrasse* to *Ladenburgh*, between *Manheim* and *Heidelberg*, and is encamped there. It is reported here, That the Forrage being all eaten up on this side the *Rhine*, Monsieur de *Turenne*, will march back to *Philipsburgh*, repass the *Rhine* there, and then go and besiege *Frankendal*. The Confederate Troops lie still between this City and *Hochst*, though as yet, we do not hear, that any fresh Troops are joined with them. We are told, That the most Christian King has written to the Sieur de *Gravelle* his Minister at *Meyence*, commanding him to assure his Electoral Highness, That notwithstanding the late victory obtained by his Forces under the command of Monsieur de *Turenne* at *Smitzheim*, and the success of his Arms since, in the Palatinate, he continues in the same disposition he before had to re-establish the Peace of the Empire in General, or with any the particular Members

thereof; provided, they will quit the Engagements they have with his Enemies.

Offend, July 18. Two days since arrived here, five Marchant Men of this place, with their Convoy a Man of War of 40 Guns from *Spain*: The sixteenth instant, a French Frigate took a Caper of this Town, mounted with four Guns.

Hague, July 20. From *Nimwegen* they write, That Monsieur *Ratenbaur* has drawn a considerable Body of Men together out of *Guosingen* and *Friesland*, and that he has already seized on several small places possessed by the French, in order to the attacking of *Grave*, in which the French have about 2500 or 3000 Men in Garrison: There has been reports spread abroad, that the French there looking upon themselves unable to defend the place, because they could not expect any Succors, had resolved to quit it, and to retire in time; but they prove to be without the least Ground. The next week, it is said, Monsieur *Nabenhart* will begin a formal siege of the place. People very much wonder that we receive not any Letters from the Fleet which we had hoped would see this have explored some thing considerable on the Coast of *France*, that in some measure might have answered the great charge the State is at. Last night we received Letters from the Prince of *Orange's* Camp, which tell us That upon the Prince of *Carles* decamping from *Brugel* near *Leob*; & his marching towards the *Sambre*, a Council of War had been held, in which, the Count de *Stromberg*, Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands*, was present; that there it was resolved, That the Armies should forthwith march, and not to lose any more time, that the Prince of *Orange* should march towards the Prince of *Cond*, and offer him battle, which if he decline (as it is thought he will not) that all ways should be tried to oblige him to it; that pursuant to this Resolution, the Prince of *Orange* resolved to begin his march the seventeenth instant, and to move towards *Lorraine*, and having there held a General Rendezvous, to proceed towards *Cherbourg*; that the eighteenth, the Spanish Forces who lay at present quartered about *Brusse*, and amount Ten thousand Men, would likewise march; but that the Count de *Monte* will not go into the Field in person, because his Army is too small. We hourly expect here the arrival of Monsieur *Ardenburgh*, with the Ratification of the Treaty concluded between this State, and his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburgh*.
