Petersbourg, March 18.

THE Report that was spread some Days ago, that her Imperial Majesty intended to take a Tour into Livonia, in Company with the Great Duke and Great Dutchess, is confirmed, and 'tis said the same will take Place towards the Beginning of May next. Nothing is transacting at this Court at present, the Empress being determined to keep the holy Time of Lent as strict as possible. Count Lynar, the Danish Envoy, proposes to set out on his Return Home in about five or six Weeks at farthest; and as his Negotiations cannot well be completed by that Time, it is thought his Danish Majesty will soon name another Minister to succeed him. The Departure of Count Bernes on his Return to Vienna, is put off for some Time on Account of his Indisposition, which has been so violent as to confine him to his Bed. The Countess de Woronzoff, Spouse to the Count of that Name, Minister of State, and Vice-Chancellor of this Empire, was safely delivered on Saturday last of a Son, to the great Joy of all that Family.

Parma, March 19. Their Serene Highnesses the Duke and Dutchess our Sovereigns having resolved to pass great Part of the Summer at Colorno, a great Number of Workmen are gone thither in order to make all necessary Repairs for that Purpose. We learn by the last Letters from Genoa, that the Directors of the Spanish Post in that City have received, by Order of his Catholick Majesty, a very considerable Sum of Money to be remitted to Turin, being the Remainder of the Dutchess of Savoy's Fortune.

Marseilles, March 22. In Conformity to the Orders received here some Time since from Versailles, we oblige all Ships whatsoever, which arrive in this Port from the Coast of Africa, to perform a strict Quarantain; and though this does in some Measure hinder our Commerce, yet we are sensible that by this Precaution we run the less Risk of catching that most dreadful Disorder the Plague, which we are informed continues to rage very much in several Parts of that Country. The Master of a Maltese Ship, which arrived here a few Days ago from Cadiz, reports, that an Algerine Chebeck of eight Guns and 130 Men, had been drove amongst some Rocks near Gibraltar, in the late Tempestuous Weather; that one Part of the Crew was drowned; and that the other, who with great Difficulty reached the Shore, had fallen into the Hands of the Spaniards.

Stockholm, March 26. Yesterday the Court went out of Mourning for the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Saxe Eisenach. The King has appointed M. Wallberg to be Assessor, and M. Oernschield to be Secretary, to the Royal College of Mines in this Kingdom. A Report has been made to his Majesty, that, in Conformity to the Orders lately given, the Fleet at Carlscroon, consisting of twenty Men of War, and twelve Frigates, were ready to put to Sea on the first Notice. 'Tis said a

Treaty of Commerce is on the Tapis between this Court and that of Naples, the Conditions of which, it is believed, if it should take Place, will be much the same with those contained in the Treaty concluded some Time since between the Crown of Denmark and the King of the Two Sicilies.

Prague, March 27. 'Tis now said for certain, that two Camps will be formed this Summer, the one at Pilsen, and the other at Collin. The first is, as we are assured, to be composed of the Regiments of Foot of Neuperg, Botta, Brown, Gaisrugg, and Puebla, and the Regiment of Dragoons of Philibert. And the Second is to be composed of the Regiments of Foot of Konigseck, Waldeck, Wolfembuttel, Harfeh, Haller, and Betlehem; the Regiment of Dragoons of Wirtemberg, and the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Lobkowitz.

Vienna, March 28. The Empress Queen continues to gather Strength every Day, and the young Archdutchess, of which her Imperial Majesty was lately delivered, is in perfect Health. His Imperial Majesty has conferred the Title of Baron of the Empire on M. Fischer, who for some Time past has had the Management of the Affairs of the House of Saxe Hilburghausen at this Court. The Prince of Portia having terminated his Affairs, set out from hence on Friday last for Carinthia. On the 26th in the Morning, an Express arrived at Court with Advice, that Count Palfy, Palatin of the Kingdom of Hungary, Field Marshal of her Imperial Majesty's Armies, Colonel of a Regiment of Cuirassiers, Counsellor of State, and Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece, &c. died on Wednesday last at Presbourg, aged about 92. Count Charles Palfy, Son of the deceased, is already appointed to succeed him in the Post of Governor of Presburg, but the important Post of Palatin of Hungary is not as yet disposed of. M. vander Mark is returned hither from Milan, and has made his Report of the Condition in which he found the Imperial Troops in Lombardy. The Count de Canales, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, received a few Days ago an Express from his Court, with some Dispatches relating to the Investiture he is shortly to receive from the Hands of the Emperor, of the Estates the King his Master is possessed of in Italy, and holds as Fiefs of the Empire. Prince Lobkowitz, who came hither some Days ago from Prague, to settle every Thing necessary for forming two Camps this Summer in Bohemia, is on his Departure from hence, in order to return to that Kingdom.

Bonn, April 5. The Cardinal of Bavaria, Prince and Bishop of Liege, and Brother to the Elector our Sovereign, arrived here on the 3d Instant in the Morning, and was saluted at his Entrance into this City, by a general Discharge of the Artillery upon our Ramparts: Tomorrow he sets out for Liege, which Place he proposes reaching by Wednesday Night.

Hambourg, April 5. Last Week we received the agreeable News of the Conclusion of a Treaty

Treaty of Peace and Commerce between this City and Algiers, on the same Conditions as the Treaty already subsisting between his Danish Majesty and the Regency of Algiers.

Hogue, April 13. This Court went into Mourning on Sunday last for three Months on Occasion of the Death of the Prince of Wales. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will continue their Deliberations Tomorrow. The young Prince of Saxe Hildburghausen is arrived here from Germany, and 'tis reported that he is going into the Service of this State, and that he will shortly be appointed a Captain in the Regiment of Foot Guards.
