

Treaty of Peace and Commerce between this City and Algiers, on the same Conditions as the Treaty already subsisting between his Danish Majesty and the Regency of Algiers.

Hague, April 13. This Court went into Mourning on Sunday last for three Months on Occasion of the Death of the Prince of Wales. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will continue their Deliberations Tomorrow. The young Prince of Saxe Hildburghausen is arrived here from Germany, and 'tis reported that he is going into the Service of this State, and that he will shortly be appointed a Captain in the Regiment of Foot Guards.
