

The Proceſſion to be from the Prince's Chamber, through the Old-Palace-Yard to the South Eaſt Door of Weſtminſter Abbey, and being entered the Church, to paſs up directly to the Steps leading to Henry the Seventh's Chapel.

At the Entrance within the Church, the Dean and Prebendaries, attended by the Choir, are to receive the Body, and are to fall into the Proceſſion juſt before the Officer of Arms, who precedes the Maſter of the Horſe, and ſo are to proceed into King Henry the Seventh's Chapel, where the Body is to be deposited on Treſſels, the Coronet and Cuſhion being laid at the Head, and the Canopy held over it; the Supporters of the Pall ſtanding by it, the chief Mourner and his Two Supporters ſeated in Chairs placed for them at the Head of the Corps, the Lords, Aſſiſtants, Maſter of the Horſe, Groom of the Stole, and Lords of the Bed-Chamber on both Sides, the Four White Staff Officers ſtanding at the Feet, the others ſeating themſelves in the Stalls on each Side of the Choir.

That Part of the Service before the Interment being read by the Biſhop of Rocheſter Dean of Weſtminſter, the Corps is to be carried to the Vault preceded by the White Staff Officers, the Maſter of the Horſe, Chief Mourner, his Supporters, and the Aſſiſtants following, Garter going before them, and are to place themſelves near the Vault.

The Corps being interred, the Dean of Weſtminſter is to go on with the Office of Burial, which ended, Garter King of Arms is to proclaim the Stile of His Royal Highneſs, and the White Staff Officers are to break their Staves, and to throw them into the Vault.

Naples, March 23. On the 15th Inſtant ſailed from this Port the King's Xebecs to cruize in the Adriatick againſt the Barbary Pirates. On the 16th a large Houſe fell down in the Street of the Silverſmiths, by which Accident eight Perſons were buried under the Ruins, and many others were greatly bruifed and diſabled. The ſame Day Count Policaſtro was, by the King's Orders, ſent Priſoner to the Caſtle of Gaeta, for having abuſed a Judge of the Criminal Court, at the Time that he had confined him to his Houſe for having challenged and fought M. Sepino. On the 18th ſome Soldiers of the Foot Regiment of Calabria purſuing, in a Quarrel, ſome Sea-faring People of Chiaja, who took Shelter in the Palace of the Prince of Strongoli, the young Prince and his Uncle came down Stairs to prevent Miſchief; but the Soldiers, without any Regard, fired their Guns, killed a Man upon the Spot at the Elbow of the young Prince, and wounded him dangerously in the Face with a Cutlaſh. The Soldiers were arreſted,

and the Nobility are very impatient to ſee what Punishment will be inflicted upon them.

Rome, March 27. On the 19th Inſtant Cardinal Rezzonico had a long Audience of the Pope, in Conſequence of a Commiſſion he had received from the Senate of Venice; he being charged with their Affairs till the Arrival of the new Ambaſſador. On the 22d the Portugueſe and Sardinian Miniſters had each an Audience of the Pope, to communicate to him the Commiſſions from their reſpective Courts. Beſides the Body of Sta. Creſtina, and a Baſon of Agnus Dei, the Pope preſented to the Duke of Deux Ponts a fine Picture of Moſaick, and two others in Tapiſtry of the Fabrick of St. Michael.

Florence, April 2. On the 28th paſt Count Richecourt returned from Leghorn, where he had been to ſee his Son, who was performing Quarantain after the Voyage he had made to the Levant, &c. with the Emperor's three Ships of War commanded by Commodore Acton; and, agreeable to the Emperor's Commands, to give the neceſſary Orders for diſarming thoſe Ships, and laying them up at Porto Ferrai, where Preparations are making accordingly for that Purpoſe. Theſe Ships were to be admitted at Pratick this Day the 2d Inſtant. On the 29th Colonel Mill ſet out from hence on his Journey to England. By the laſt Letters from Vienna, the Regency received Notice of the happy Delivery of the Empreſs of a Princeſs.

Barcelona, April 4. His Daniſh Maſteſty's Envoy to the Court of Spain paſſed through this City this Week in his Way to Madrid.

Whitehall, April 13.

The King has been pleaſed to conſtitute and appoint his Grace the Duke of Bedford, one of his Maſteſty's Principal Secretaries of State, to be Lord Lieutenant and Cuſtos Rotulorum of the County of Devon, and of the City of Exeter and County of the ſame, in the room of the Earl of Orford, deceaſed.
