

Finland, to take especial Care to observe a strict Discipline, and to regulate themselves in such Manner as not to give the least Uneasiness to any of the Officers of the Russian Troops posted near them.

*Vienna, April 10.* Her Imperial Majesty is so well recovered from her late Lying-in, that 'tis said she will go Abroad for the first Time on Tuesday next, after which the Court will remove to Schonbrun till the Time of its Departure for Presbourg. Field Marshal Prince Lobkowitz, to whom her Imperial Majesty has given the Chief Command of the Troops in Hungary, has already received the Compliments of the Nobility on that Occasion, and 'tis thought he will soon be setting out for that Kingdom, in order to take Possession of that Employment. The Elector Palatine has presented a Memorial to this Court, containing a very considerable Demand for Provisions and Forage furnished to the Imperial Troops during the late War; which Memorial is ordered to be immediately taken into Consideration.

*Prague, April 12.* The Bull for the Jubilee was published to Day in all the Churches of this City. It is to commence on Sunday next, and is to last for Six Months. Prince Lobkowitz, Commander in Chief of the Imperial Troops in this Kingdom, having been lately appointed Commander in Chief of those in Hungary, it is generally believed he will be succeeded in this Command by Field Marshal Count Hohenembs.

*Copenhagen, April 13.* This Court has just received two Expresses, the first from London, with the melancholy News of the Death of the Prince of Wales, her Majesty's Brother, and the other from Stockholm with an Account of the Death of the King of Sweden, which happened on the 5th Instant, and of the Prince Successor's being the next Day proclaimed King with the usual Formalities; this last Express brought likewise a Copy of the Act that was signed and sworn to by his Swedish Majesty on his Advancement to the Throne; wherein his Majesty declares, amongst other Things, that he shall look upon, as his most dangerous Enemies, all those who shall, on any Pretence whatsoever, endeavour to introduce either despotick Power or arbitrary Government; which Declaration, we flatter ourselves, will be the Means of securing and maintaining the Peace of the North. The anniversary Festival of the Order of the Elephant, was this Day celebrated at Court with great Splendor.

*Manheim, April 15.* Prince Frederick of Deux Ponts returned here the 12th of this Month from the Tour he has taken into Italy. The next Day his Serene Highness received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction on his safe Return; and this Day there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court on that Occasion.

*Berlin, April 17.* On Friday last the King reviewed the Regiments of Foot of Kalckstein, Wurtemberg, Meyering and Forcade; after which his Majesty paid a Visit to Count Rothernbourg, with whom he staid some Time, and then set out for Potzdam. The same Day an Express arrived here from Stockholm, with Advice of the Death of the King of Sweden, and of the Prince Successor's being proclaimed.

*Brussels, April 19.* 'Tis said that a Camp is soon to be formed in the Neighbourhood of Ruremonde upon the Meuse, and that it will be composed of two Battalions of each of the Regiments in Garrison in the Neighbouring Provinces. The Detachment of Matroses who were here, have received Orders to march for Mechlin, in order to join their Company; and a Battalion of the Regiment of Ligne is arrived here from Mons on its Way to Bruges. The Project for cutting a Canal from hence to Charleroy, which was for some Time under Consideration, is again brought upon the Carpet, and the Deputies appointed for the Managing of that Affair are already set out with several experienced Workmen, to mark out the Ground and consider of the proper Methods for carrying the same into Execution. They write from Ghent, that they have been obliged to suspend, on Account of the almost continual Rains, the Works that were carrying on at the Canal of Bruges.

*Hambourg, April 20.* The Merchants Adventurers of England, who reside in this City, have taken decent and proper Mourning, upon Account of the Death of his late Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; the News of which unhappy Event was received here with great Surprize, and gave a very general Concern.

*Hague, April 22.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who were assembled Yesterday, have this Day continued their Deliberations. Prince Birkenfeldt and General Trips, who lately arrived here, have been admitted to their Audiences of the Prince Stadtholder, and were afterwards in Conference with the President of the Assembly of their High Mightinesses. Yesterday his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange dined with the Greffier Fagel, who had invited on this Occasion divers Lords of the Regency. We learn from Utrecht, that the Waters of the Lecq' have considerably fallen within these few Days past, and that great Part of the Land which was under Water is now quite dry again.
