P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable Simon Earl of Harcourt, was, by his Majesty's Command, sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Egremont, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Cumberland; his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Turin, April 21. The King has lately made a Reform of five Men in each Company of the Troops of this Kingdom, which makes a Saving of near 200,000 Livres a Year. The Dutches of Savoy advances happily in her Pregnancy, and 'tis generally believed will be brought to Bed towards the latter End of next Month or the Beginning of June.

Stockholm, April 27. The Body of the late King, which has lain in State in one of the Halls of the Palace ever since the 12th Instant, was carried Yesterday in great Funeral Pomp to the Church of Ritterholm, followed by his present Majesty, the Senators, and many other Persons of the first Distinction, and was deposited in a Vault belonging to the said Church, where it is to remain till after the Meeting of the States of the Kingdom, after which the Ceremony of its Interment will be performed with the greatest Solemnity. We wait here with the utmost Impatience the Return of the Courier that was dispatched to Petersbourg with an Account of the Death of the late King, and his present Majesty's Declaration, which we doubt not will be favourably received at that Court, and that the Answer thereto will be perfectly agreeable to the sincere Desire of his Majesty to maintain a good Understanding and Friendship with the Empress of Russia, agreeable to the Assurances his Majesty gave upon his Advancement to the Throne of this Kingdom.

Vienna, April 28. The Departure of the Court for Presbourg is fixed for the 4th of next Month. The Empress Queen has conferred the Government of Transylvania, which has been vacant for some Time, on Field Marshal Count Hohenembs. A Proposal has been made to her Imperial Majesty for establishing a National

Regiment in each of her Hereditary Provinces, which Regiment is to be always quartered in the Province which raises and supports it, except in Time of War, when they are all to be obliged to take the Field in Conjunction with the other Troops. This Proposal it is said has been already approved, and Orders given for carrying it into Execution. On Monday last the Emperor, accompanied by the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain his Sister, and some of the principal Lords and Ladies of the Court, went to take the Diversion of hunting in the Neighbourhood of Wolkerstorff. The Indulto lately granted by the Pope for raising Ten per Cent. upon the Revenues of the Clergy in all the Hereditary Countries will considerably augment the Finances. Count Colloredo, who arrived here a few Days ago from Italy, has already been admitted to several private Audiences of their Imperial Majesties, in which he has communicated to them the Success of his Negotiations at the Court of Turin, and the Sentiments of his Sardinian Majesty upon the present Situation of Affairs. The Baron de Neuhaus, Minister from the Elector of Bavaria, is on his Departure for Munich, where, on his Arrival, he is to espouse the Countess de Solms, one of the Electress of Bavaria's Ladies of Honour.

Copenhagen, May 1. On the 24th past the King, accompanied by several Lords of the Court, went to the New Holm, and viewed the Ships which are there on the Stocks. Orders are given for building a large Hospital for Invalid Soldiers. On Wednesday last their Majesties dined at the Queen-Mother's with the Princess Charlotte Amelia, and afterwards set out for Fredensbourg, where they propose spending Part of the fine Season, and the Queen-Mother set out Yesterday for Hirschholm.

Berlin, May 4. Last Saturday Morning the King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and attended by several General Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, went from Potzdam to a Plain adjoining to the Village of Templow, and reviewed the Regiment of Gendarmes, and that of Hussars of Ziethen, with whose Appearance and Behaviour he seemed very well pleased; after which his Majesty came hither, and dined at the Palace of the Queen-Mother with all the Princes and Princesses of the Royal Family, and early the next Morning set out for Potzdam. The General Review of the Troops is appointed for the 21st Instant, after which 'tis said the King proposes setting out on a Journey to Oostfrize.

Paris, May 8. His most Christian Majesty removes To-day from Versailles to Marly, and will be followed To-morrow by the Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family, to remain there till the 25th. On the Return of the Court to Versailles, they will soon after go to Cressy, and from thence, in a few Days, to Compeigne. Cardinal Tencin has desired Leave to retreat to his Archbishopsrick at Lyons, which his Majesty has consented to, and he will set out accordingly some Day next Month.

Cologne, May 9 We hear from Leipsick, that the King and Queen of Poland, accompanied by the Prince Royal and the Princess his Spouse, arrived there from Dresden on the 2d Instant, and propose staying during the whole Time of the Fair.

Hague, May 11. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are to assemble To-morrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived here. This Morning their Serene and Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, with the Hereditary Prince and Princess Caroline, accompanied by several General Officers, went to review the Burgeses of this Place, who were all drawn out in Arms for that Purpose; and having seen them perform their Exercises, they pertook of a cold Collation which was purposely prepared for them in a Tent, and at Night supped with the Officers of the Burgeses. We learn from Amsterdam, that the Directors of the East India Company have received Advice, that the Baron d'Imhoff, Governor General of the Dutch Settlements in the East Indies, died at Batavia on the 1st of November last, and was succeeded by M. Mossel, first Counsellor and Director General of the Company's Affairs in that Country; and that M. Golonosse, who had been named Governor of Ceylon, succeeded M. Mossel.
