Paris, May 8. His most Christian Majesty removes To-day from Versailles to Marly, and will be followed To-morrow by the Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family, to remain there till the 25th. On the Return of the Court to Versailles, they will soon after go to Cressy, and from thence, in a sew Days, to Compeigne. Cardinal Tencin has desired Leave to retreat to his Archb shoprick at Lyons, which his Majesty has consented to, and he will set out accordingly some Day next Month.

Cologn, k.ay 9 We hear from Leipsick, that the King and Queen of Poland, accompanied by the Prince Royal and the Princess his Spouse, arrived there from Dresden on the 2d Instant, and propose staying during the whole

Time of the Fair.

Hague, May 11. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are to assemble To-morrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived here. This Morning their Serene and Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, with the Hereditary Prince and Princess Caroline, accompanied by several General Officers, went to review the Burgesses of this Place, who were all drawn out in Arms for that Purpose; and having seen them perform their Exercises, they pertook of a cold Collation which was purposely prepared for them in a Tent, and at Night supped with the Officers of the Burgesses. We learn from Amsterdam, that the Directors of the East India Company have received Advice, that the Baron d'Imhoff, Governor General of the Dutch Settlements in the East Indies, died at Batavia on the 1st of November last, and was succeeded by M. Mossel, first Counsellor and Director General of the Company's Affairs in that Country; and that M. Golonosse, who had been named Governor of Ceylon, succeeded M. Mossel.
