## RESOLUTION, and ORDER, of the House of COMMONS.

Jovis, 13 Die Junii, 1751.

*Resolved,*

THAT Notice be given, that the Annuities, payable at the Exchequer, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum per Annum, and which, by an Act, passed in the Fourth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, were charged on the additional Duties on Stamp Vellom, Parchment, and Paper, will be redeemed and paid off on the 10th Day of October 1752, agreeable to the Power of Redemption in the said Act.

*Ordered,*

That Mr. Speaker do forthwith signify, by Writing, to be inserted in the London Gazette, and affixed on the Royal Exchange in London, the said Resolution of this House.

Which Resolution, thus signified and published by Me, is to be sufficient Notice of the said intended Redemption.

*Stockholm, June 8.* A few Days ago Count Panin received a Courier with Dispatches from Petersbourg, the Contents of which he immediately communicated to the Ministry; since which a Courier is arrived at Court from thence with Advices from the Baron de Griffenheim, our Minister Plenipotentiary at that Court. The Dispatches brought by these two Couriers give such great Satisfaction at this Court, that neither the Swedish nor Russian Fleets will put to Sea this Year.

*Vienna, June 9.* The Empress Queen, who came to Town upon Monday, returns this Day to Presburg, where the Emperor is expected upon the 10th or 12th. Count Erdody, the Judex Curiae of Hungary, was elected Knight of the Golden Fleece on Sunday was Sen'night. On Monday last General Bernes arrived here from Petersburg. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed Field Marshal Count Brown to command the Imperial Troops in Bohemia, in the Room of Prince Lobkowitz, who is appointed to the Command of those in Hungary; and Field Marshal Count Hohenembs is to succeed Count Brown in the Command of those in Transilvania. The Prince of Saxe Hildbourghausen, who followed the Court to Presburg, was seized there a few Days ago with a Fit of an Apoplexy, and was very much indisposed when the last Letters from thence came away. Yesterday died, very much advanced in Years, the Count de Seylern, Great Chancellor of the Archduchy of Austria.

*Brussels, June 16.* It is now confidently asserted, that Prince Charles of Lorraine will set out for Vienna towards the latter End of this Week, his Serene Highness having already named the Persons who are to attend him in that Journey.

*Dusseldorp, June 18.* The King of Prussia arrived the 13th Instant at Embden, where he was received by the Burghers under Arms; the next Day he visited the Port, and on the 15th set out for Wezel, where he arrived the Day following.

*Hague, June 20.* His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers upon his Arrival from Zealand, at his House in the Wood, where he found all his august Family in perfect Health. M. Stuten has taken the Oaths before the Council of State in Quality of Lieutenant Colonel and Director of the Fortifications.
