The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and bad on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a Large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands bigb, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
