The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable George Lord Anson, the Right Honourable William Viscount Barrington, William Ponsonby, Esq; commonly called Lord Duncannon, Welbore Ellis and Thomas Villiers, Esqrs. together with William Rowley and Edward Boscawen, Esqrs. to be Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Dominions, Islands and Territories thereunto respectively belonging.

*Kensington, June 18.*

This Day Signior Businello, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

The same Day M. Aelt, Minister, charged with the Affairs of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, had a private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his new Letters of Credence, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, and conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

*Leicester-House, June 21.*

Signior Businello, Resident from Venice, had a private Audience of Leave, of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

As had afterwards M. Aelt, Minister, charg'd with the Affairs of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, a private Audience of his Royal Highness, to which they were introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

*Lisbon, May 27.* Their Majesties are expected here on Saturday next from Villa Viciosa. The Fleet for Maranham will put to Sea towards the Beginning of next Month, and will have on Board between 3 and 400 Families who are going to make a Settlement there, where they are to be allowed a certain Quantity of Land in Proportion to their Number, and all necessary Utensils for cultivating of it. Preparations are making for celebrating the King's Birth Day, when 'tis expected a numerous Promotion of Military Officers will be made.

*Dresden, June 18.* The King being informed that the Disputes between the Magistrates and Citizens of this City augment daily, and are like to be carried to a greater Height than ever,

ever, unless Timely prevented, has taken a Resolution of visiting that City in August next, in order to put an End, if possible, to those Differences. Count Flemming having received his last Instructions, sets out this Evening on his Return to the Court of London, where he is to reside in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court.

Hague, June 29. Prince Stolberg has taken the usual Oaths before the Council of State in Quality of Colonel of the Regiment of Foot of the late Count Wartenleben, as have several other Military Officers for the different Employments to which his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has lately appointed them.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
