RESOLUTION, and ORDER, of the House of COMMONS.

Jovis, 13 Die Junii, 1751.

Resolved,

THAT Notice be given, that the Annuities, payable at the Exchequer, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum per Annum, and which, by an Act, passed in the Fourth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, were charged on the additional Duties on Stamp Vellom, Parchment, and Paper, will be redeemed and paid off on the 10th Day of October 1752, agreeable to the Power of Redemption in the said Act.

Ordered,

That Mr. Speaker do forthwith signify, by Writing, to be inserted in the London Gazette, and affixed on the Royal Exchange in London, the said Resolution of this House.

Which Resolution, thus signified and published by Me, is to be sufficient Notice of the said intended Redemption.

Kensington, June 18.

The King has been pleased this Day to appoint the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, to be one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the room of his Grace the Duke of Bedford, who has resigned,

AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 21st Day of June, 1751.

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace John Duke of Bedford, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Devon, and of the City of Exeter, and County of the same; His Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

This Day the Right Honourable Robert Earl of Holderness, was, by his Majesty's Command, sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council; as likewise one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint Brownlowe Cecil, Esq; (commonly called Lord Burghley) to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Rutland; he this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Whitehall, June 22.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable George Lord Anson, the Right Honourable William Viscount Barrington, William Ponsonby, Esq; commonly called Lord Duncannon, Welbore Ellis and Thomas Villiers, Esqrs. together with William Rowley and Edward Boscawen, Esqrs. to be Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Dominions, Islands and Territories thereunto respectively belonging.

Kensington, June 18.

This Day Signior Businello, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

The same Day M. Aelt, Minister, charged with the Affairs of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, had a private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his new Letters of Credence, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, and conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Leicester-House, June 21.

Signior Businello, Resident from Venice, had a private Audience of Leave, of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

As had afterwards M. Aelt, Minister, charg'd with the Affairs of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, a private Audience of his Royal Highness, to which they were introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Lisbon, May 27. Their Majesties are expected here on Saturday next from Villa Viciosa. The Fleet for Maranham will put to Sea towards the Beginning of next Month, and will have on Board between 3 and 400 Families who are going to make a Settlement there, where they are to be allowed a certain Quantity of Land in Proportion to their Number, and all necessary Utensils for cultivating of it. Preparations are making for celebrating the King's Birth Day, when 'tis expected a numerous Promotion of Military Officers will be made.
