Danigick, July 25. Ur Letters from Warfaw tell us, That the King convinues his preparations for the Campagnes that out of his private Revenue he has given 130000 Rix-Dollars, towards the paying the Arrears of the Army, which confills at present of 16000 Men. That in the mean time his Majesty has Commanded the Nobility to be in a readiness, resolving however, not to call them into the Field, but in case of extraordinary necessity. The Tartars which made an incution into Pedolia, to the great destruction of that Countrey, have been forced to retire again for the defence of their own Territories, having news that the Muscovites were fallen into Tartary with a confiderable Army. We are here not without hopes of a fuddain Peace with the Port, though the Grand Vizier has lately written to the Republick, in which he reproaches their breaking of the late Treaty, before the Ink (as his expression is) with which they Signed that Treaty was dry; and tells them, That if they do not in time fend to the Grand Signior and give him satisfaction; he will enter into this Kingdom and utterly destroy it with Fire and Sword. The Queen Dowager has chosen Thorne in Pruffia, to go and reside

Coblents, July 10. Yesterday Monsseur de Turenne decamped from his Quarters near Ladenburgh, and marched towards Philipsbourg; In the mean time the discourses are various concerning his designe, some report that he will goe and attack the Consecrates in their Camp at Florsboim near Majents, others, that he will beliege Frankendal; but the Imperialists give our, he is going towards Flunders, to

joyn with the Prince of Conde.

Acrnhem, July 28. On Thursday last passed through this place two Regiments of Poot towards the Camp hefore Grave, which place is now formally besieged by our Troops, under the Command of Monsieur Raben-laup; The 26 instant at night six of our Regiments passed the Maes in small Boats, and took their several Posts; The next day our Troops secured themselves of a Sluyce near Grave, by means of which, the French might have very much incommoded them; Yesterday the Besieged made a Sally with a party of Dragoons, but were sorted to retire again without any great loss on either side; several People have been killed and wounded by the Enemies Canon, which they make use of without any intermission: It is said that a Bore hathbeen taken as he was endeavouring to get into Grave, being charged with Letters to the Governor.

Hague, July 31. The 27 initiant the States of Halland separated, after having resolved for desiraying of the charges of the War this year, to raise the 200 penny twice by way, of Loan, an the rate of 4 per Sent: Interest, and that the said Interests may be duly and constantly paid, they have settled a Fond for it, by doubling the Impositions that are already on Turf and burning Wood. ders for the furnishing Monsieur Rabenhaup with all things necessary for the Siege of Grave, which he has already undertaken; Our last advices told us; That on our fide they were at work about making the Lines, and railing of Batteries; and that in the mean time the Be-fiegd (who have the Marquis de Chamit pofor where Governor) defend themselves very well, having made several Sallies, and done some execution in our Camp with their Canon; We are affored that they have in the Townshour 3000 Soldiers, 500 pieces of Canon, and 17000 Barrels of Powder, of which they are not in the least sparing. We are told that the States have likewife refolved to pay the Meneys for which the Hollages of Swoll and Deventer are fill detained by the French at Macfirith: 5 but at the fame time, that they have refolved to find out fome way to reimburfe themselves of the Elector of cologne, who it is faid, by the late Treaty between him and this State; is obliged to let these Hostages at liberty, and to content the French. Our Letters from Vienna tell us, That the Emperce was much diffacisfied, that to much of the Summer was spent without any action on our fide, and that he hall thereupon written to the Count de Souches Geborid of his Army; and that his Imperial Majesty had like-wife written to the Elector of Brandonburghy to pray him to haften the march of his Forces towards the Pas larinate, for the affifiance of that Elector; and from 604 logne they tell us, that the faid Forces begin already to march, but fo flowly, that they believe if will be the latter end of the next month before they will be joying with the other Confederate Troops;

Amflerdam, July 31. Paffengers as well as the Lenters that come from Nimmegen inform us; That our Troops under the Command of Monfieur Rabenbang have now formally belieged Grave; that the Lines were almost finished, that they were at work about raising of three Batteries, with intention to plant fin pieces of Canon on each of them; That our Troops had in the mean time possessed themselves of a Sluyce near Grave; which the French defigned to have opened, and by that means to have fet one fide of the Town under water, and that last night the Trenches were to be opened; That the Beliegers desended themselves with a great deal of courage and refolution; that they had made two Sallies, though without doing any considerable execution; and that they fixed with their Car mon into our Camp, without my intermission, they having in one day made above 600 shot. This day we have advice, that 2000 French Horse have appeared near Ruremond, whose deligne as behought, is to get into Greve. Here is arrived a small Vesset from the Streights, and brings advice. That Lieutenant-Admiral de Rivier was pass by with a Squadron of Metros Wat, and other Vesserhite attended him, directing his course, as they believed, sowards the West Indian; it

is faid he has with him acros holdiers.
