Naples, June 8.

ON the 29th past sailed from this Port, the King's Ships the St. Phillip and Queen, to cruize in the Seas of Calabria and Sicily, against the Barbary Pirates. On the 1st Instant arrived here Post from Turin, a Gentleman of the King of Sardinia's Court, who next Morning was, by his Sardinian Majesty's Minister, introduced to an Audience of their Majesties, to acquaint them, on the Part of the Duke of Savoy, of the Birth of a Prince, of which her Royal Highness the Dutchess was happily delivered on the 24th past. On the 2d anchored in this Port, from Apuglia and Calabria, a Convoy of Vessels, loaden with different Sorts of Provisions for the Markets of this City. The King has nominated M. Borgio to succeed the late M. Ligvoro in the vacant Bishoprick of Della Cava. On the 5th a slight Shock of an Earthquake was felt in this City, which did no considerable Damage.

Petersbourg, June 11. A few Days ago an Express arrived here from Vienna, the Dispatches whereof occasioned a long Conference at the Great Chancellor's. The Marriage of the young Count de Bruce, with the Daughter of General Count Romanzoff, was celebrated on Monday last with great Magnificence, her Imperial Majesty honouring that Ceremony, and the grand Entertainment that followed it, with her Presence.

Rome, June 12. Last Week Cardinal Alexander Albani, and Count Rivera, in Consequence of a Courier which they had received from the Court of Turin, had an Audience of the Pope, to communicate to him the Delivery of the Dutchess of Savoy of a Prince. The Grand Master of Malta, at the Request of the Pope, besides his Gallies, has ordered two Frigates to cruize on the Roman Coasts against the Barbary Pirates, who greatly infest those Seas. M. Vannitelli, a famous Architect, is set out for Naples, with the Draught and Model of a Palace and Garden, which he has drawn, by Directions of the King of Naples, and is to assist at the Building of at Caserta, where the Court proposes to pass some Part of the Year. Last Week the Marquis Lombardi failed for a considerable Sum, which has occasioned an entire Stoppage of Commerce with Genoa, the Merchants of that City being mostly concerned in that Failure. The Pope, at his Departure for Castle Gandolfo, has caused a Bull to be published against the Society of Free Masons, by which he renews the Prohibition and Censures prescribed by the late Pope against their Meetings, and recommends to the Catholick Princes the suppressing of that Society in their States, under severe Punishments.

Genoa, June 16. Last Week Publick Prayers were put up in all the Churches of this City, to emprove the Assistance of the Almighty in the present critical Circumstances in which this State is involved. As all the Methods hitherto made use of for establishing the Credit of the Bank are not likely to have the desired Effect, the Government are going to lay an extraordinary Tax upon the Clergy for that Purpose, in which all the Convents, even the Mendicants, are to be included.

Plaisance, June 17. This Court has resolved, for the greater Improvement of the Commerce of this Dutchy, to permit all Jews whatsoever to come and settle here, on Condition nevertheless of their paying each a certain yearly Sum into the Ducal Treasury.

Warsaw, June 22. Field Marshal Count Lowendahl arrived here on Thursday last, and proposes setting out shortly for France; and 'tis believed will go by the Way of Berlin. They continue to expect the King here towards the End of the Summer; and 'tis said, that immediately after his Majesty's Arrival, the several important Posts, now vacant in this Kingdom, will be filled up.

Stockholm, June 25. An Ordonnance was published here this Morning, promising a large Reward to any Person or Persons who shall discover the Villains who have lately made it their Business to set Fire to several Houses in different Parts of this City and Suburbs; by which Means the fine Church of St. Claire, and a great Number of Houses have been consumed within this Week past.

Berlin, June 26. The King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, returned to Potzdarn on Wednesday last from the Tour he has made into East Friseland and the Dutchy of Cleves.

Vienna, June 26. Yesterday Morning their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Princess Charlotte, and followed by several Lords and Ladies of the Court, arrived at Schonbrun, and after staying there a short Time, set out for Purkerstorff, to receive Prince Charles of Lorraine, with whom they returned the same Night to Presbourg; from whence we learn, that the Empress Queen having been informed of the great Confusion the playing at Hazard has caused amongst the Nobility, has forbid the same under very severe Penalties.

Hague, July 6. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will continue their Assembly To-morrow, when 'tis expected his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange will assist at the Deliberations. The Deputies who went change the Magistrates in Dutch Flандe are returned, and have already assisted at the Assembly of their High Mightinesses. M. Villattes has taken the usual Oaths, before the Council

Council of State, for the Office of Receiver of the publick Taxes in the Quarter of Kempe-land and the Mayoralty of Bois-le-Duc. Count Flemming arrived here on Saturday last from Dresden, and will set out for London in a few Days.
