THIS Day the Right Honourable the
Marquis of Hartington, and the Earl
of Albemarle, were, by his Majesty's
Command, sworn of his Majesty's most Ho-
nourable Privy Council; and took their Places
at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the
most Honourable Charles Marquis of Rocking-
ham to be Lord Lieutenant of the West Riding
in the County of York, and of the City of
York and County of the same City; his Lord-
ship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be
taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Alle-
giance and Supremacy.

Whereas it has appeared to his Majesty, by
the Representation of the Master of the
Mint, that notwithstanding the Laws in Being
for the Punishment of Offenders convicted of
counterfeiting Halfpence and Farthings, and ut-
tering and receiving them, knowing the same
to be false, such Practices are of late grown to
a great Height, and more especially in the prin-
cipal Manufacturing Counties, where, from the
great Number of Workmen employed, Oppor-
tunities are given of dispersing this Sort of
counterfeit Coin; and many considerable Dealers
are induced, by the great Profit they make, to
buy up large Quantities at low Prices, and pay
them away by Tale at the nominal Value to
the Labourers and Manufacturers, to the great
Fraud and Injury of the poor People, the De-
tachment of Trade, and the Danger of Publick
Credit: And whereas not only the Counter-
feiters, but those who buy, sell, utter, or take,

knowingly, such Counterfeit Coin, or are con-
cerned in the dispersing the same, are guilty of
a High Misdemeanor, and subject to severe Pu-
nishment by the general Law of the Realm:
And whereas by an Act made in the Fifteenth
Year of his Majesty's Reign, intituled, *An Act
for the more effectual Preventing the Counter-
feiting of the current Coin of this Kingdom, and
the Uttering or Paying of False or Counterfeit
Coin*—It is, amongst other Things, enacted,
That if any Person whatsoever shall make, coin
or counterfeit any Brass or Copper Money,
called a Halfpenny or a Farthing, such Offender
therein, and his, her and their Aiders, Abettors
and Procurers, being thereof convicted, shall
suffer two Years Imprisonment, and find Sureties
for his or her good Behaviour for two Years
more, to be computed from the End of the
said first two Years: And whereas, for the
Encouragement of Persons to discover and bring
to Punishment such Offenders, a Reward of
Ten Pounds, without paying any Fee, is by
the said Act given for every Person convicted of
such Counterfeiting, to be paid by the Sheriff
within one Month after such Conviction, to the
Prosecutors. And whereas his Majesty, duly
weighing the great Publick Mischief arising from
these Practices, has resolved that the Laws against
such Offenders shall be carried, in the strictest
and most effectual Manner, into Execution; It
is therefore Ordered by his Majesty, in and by the
Advice of his Privy Council, That all Persons,
who have been or shall be guilty of Counter-
feiting Halfpence or Farthings, or of vending,
uttering, disposing, receiving or paying any such
counterfeit Halfpence or Farthings, knowing
the same to be so counterfeited, shall be punish-
ed to the utmost Severity of the Law. And
his Majesty doth, by Advice of his Privy Coun-
cil, strictly command, that all the Laws for
preventing and punishing such Offenders, be
carried effectually into Execution; and that the
Officers of the Mint, and all the Justices of
Peace,

Peace, Sheriffs, and all Ministers of Justice, do, within their respective Districts and Jurisdictions, use their utmost Endeavours to discover and bring such Offenders to Justice.

Naples, June 22. The Secretary of State has received Notice, that two of the King's Gallies, cruising off the Presidii, had on the 4th Instant, taken a Tunisine Corsair, with 19 Moors on Board (the rest of its Crew having escaped on Shore) then at Anchor under a small Fort in the Island del Giglio, belonging to Tuscany; and that the Gallies had rescued a Neapolitan Bark, loaden with Wine, that had been taken by the said Corsair. This Event has given great Satisfaction to the Publick, especially as it is confidently reported, that our Court will not harken to any Sollicitations for the Restitution of the said Corsair. A most scandalous Libel is handed about this City against the Neapolitan Nobility of both Sexes, who are greatly offended at it; insomuch, that the King has given his positive Orders to the supreme Judge of the Criminal Court, to use his utmost Endeavours to discover the Author.

Rome, June 26. A few Days ago the Secretary of State received Notice, that the Pope's Gallies, cruising upon the Roman Coast, having on the 4th Instant discovered at Sea, a small Tunisine Corsair, and a large Genoese Filucca, which he had taken, pursued him to a Creek in the Island del Giglio, belonging to Tuscany, where the Crew took Refuge on Shore, and the Gallies carried off the Corsair's Vessel, and its Prize, which they had abandoned.

Florence, July 2. Last Week the Regency sent a Person to the Island del Giglio, to take an exact Account, from the Master of the Tunisine Corsair, of what happened at the small Fort del Campefe, between him and the Neapolitan Gallies.

Warsaw, July 4. According to our last Advices from the Frontiers of Podolia and Volinia, the Heyducks continue to commit great Ravages in those Parts, notwithstanding all the Measures that have been taken to exterminate them. We have received Advice from Radom, a Town in the Palatinate of Sendomir, that a most dreadful Fire lately broke out there, which had consumed the Castle, and about 90 Houses.

Turin, July 7. His Sardinian Majesty sets out for the Baths of Vaudier next Friday, and during his Absence, the Duke of Savoy will receive

ceive the Foreign Ministers, and transact the Business with the Ministers of State here.

Stockholm, July 6. The King and Senate have agreed, that a general Collection shall be made throughout this Kingdom, and the Great Dutchy of Finland, for the poor unhappy Sufferers by the late dreadful Fires. And his Majesty having ordered that the Houses which were burnt down, should be rebuilt, if possible, before Winter, a great Number of Workmen, with Timber and other Materials, are almost daily arriving here from several of the neighbouring Provinces for that Purpose.

Presbourg, July 6. The Emperor and Prince Charles of Lorraine are gone to Hollitsch, to take the Diversion of Hunting. The Departure of the Court for the Camp at Pest, is now fixed for the 18th Instant.

Vienna, July 7. The Empress Queen is expected here To-day from Presbourg, with the two Archdutchesses, but the third Archdutchess is not to come till next Week. Her Imperial Majesty has granted to the Hungarian Nation, the free Liberty of sending Corn into all the Hereditary Countries.

Hague, July 20. This Morning the States of Holland and Westfrizeland reassumed their Deliberations. A few Days ago his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange made a considerable Promotion of Military Officers, some of whom have already taken the usual Oaths before the Council of State for their Emyloyments.
