The King's most Excellent Majesty in his Privy Council.

Whereas it has appeared to his Majesty, by the Representation of the Master of the Mint, that notwithstanding the Laws in Being for the Punishment of Offenders convicted of counterfeiting Halfpence and Farthings, and uttering and receiving them, knowing the same to be false, such Practices are of late grown to a great Height, and more especially in the principal Manufacturing Counties, where, from the great Number of Workmen employed, Opportunities are given of dispersing this Sort of counterfeit Coin; and many considerable Dealers are induced, by the great Profit they make, to buy up large Quantities at low Prices, and pay them away by Tale at the nominal Value to the Labourers and Manufacturers, to the great Fraud and Injury of the poor People, the Detriment of Trade, and the Danger of Publick Credit: And whereas not only the Counterfeiters, but those who buy, sell, utter, or take, knowingly, such Counterfeit Coin, or are concerned in the dispersing the same, are guilty of a High Misdemeanor, and subject to severe Punishment by the general Law of the Realm: And whereas by an Act made in the Fifteenth Year of his Majesty's Reign, intituled, *An Act for the more effectual Preventing the Counterfeiting of the current Coin of this Kingdom, and the Uttering or Paying of False or Counterfeit Coin*—It is, amongst other Things, enacted, That if any Person whatsoever shall make, coin or counterfeit any Brass or Copper Money, called a Halfpenny or a Farthing, such Offender therein, and his, her and their Aiders, Abettors and Procurers, being thereof convicted, shall suffer two Years Imprisonment, and find Sureties for his or her good Behaviour for two Years more, to be computed from the End of the said first two Years: And whereas, for the Encouragement of Persons to discover and bring to Punishment such Offenders, a Reward of Ten Pounds, without paying any Fee, is by the said Act given for every Person convicted of such Counterfeiting, to be paid by the Sheriff within one Month after such Conviction, to the Prosecutors. And whereas his Majesty, duly weighing the great Publick Mischief arising from these Practices, has resolved that the Laws against such Offenders shall be carried, in the strictest and most effectual Manner, into Execution; It is therefore Ordered by his Majesty, by the Advice of his Privy Council, That all Persons, who have been or shall be guilty of Counterfeiting Halfpence or Farthings, or of vending, uttering, disposing, receiving or paying any such

counterfeit Halfpence or Farthings, knowing the same to be so counterfeited, shall be punished to the utmost Severity of the Law. And his Majesty doth, by Advice of his Privy Council, strictly command, that all the Laws for preventing and punishing such Offenders, be carried effectually into Execution; and that the Officers of the Mint, and all the Justices of Peace, Sheriffs, and all Ministers of Justice, do, within their respective Districts and Jurisdictions, use their utmost Endeavours to discover and bring such Offenders to Justice.

Algier, June 24. The cruizing Ships of this Place are returned without any Prize. The Xebeques which cruized to the Eastward have taken 30 Sail, one a Venetian of 40 Guns only five of them can as yet be accounted for.

viz. Three laden with Corn, Wine and Oyl, sold at Tripoly; and one with Oyl, and one with Corn, sold here; the rest not appearing, it is supposed, are retaken, except the Venetian, which we hear is on the Coast of Tunis. The rest of our Xebeques sailed on a Cruize the 20th Instant. Two Danish Men of War, and two Transports, are hourly expected here. By the last Accounts from Alexandria, the Plague was broke out at Grand Cairo and Rosetta.

Rome, June 29. M. Migazze, Auditor di Ruota in this City for the German Nation, has been nominated by the Court of Vienna, Coadjutor of the Archbishoprick of Malines, in order to succeed the Cardinal of Alsace; who, on Account of his Indispositions, is not in a Condition to take Charge any longer of that Archbishoprick. On Wednesday last Cardinal Alexander Albany, pursuant to the Directions which he had received from the Court of Turin, performed the Ceremony, in his private Chapel, of investing Count Revera with the Order of St. Maurice and Lazzaro, lately conferred upon him by the King of Sardinia, with a Pension of 1000 Crowns per Annum.

Florence, July 5. On the 24th past, being the Festival of St. John, the Chevalier Antinori, Member of the Regency, and Secretary at War, agreeable to the Emperor's Directions to the Members of the Regency to perform the publick Functions alternatively, attended by the Magistrates, of this City, and a suitable Retinue, received, with the usual publick Formalities, the Homage from the respective Cities, Towns, and Fuedatories of Tuscany; and in the Evening, the Race of Chariots and Barbary Horses run for the usual Prize, which was won by an English Hunter. A few Days ago a Surveyor of the French King's Arsenal at Toulon, arrived here from thence, and has applied to the Regency for leave to view the Woods and Forests in Tuscany, in order to provide Timber for the King's Navy. A Companion of his went likewise to Lucca on the same Account. On the 27th at Night Count Richcourt returned hither from the Baths of Pifa.

Hague, July 22. Their Serene and Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, accompanied by Field Marshal Prince Lewis of Brunswick Wolfembutte, and divers other Persons of the first Distinction, honoured the Burgomaster Raad with their Company at Dinner to Day at his Country Seat. We have received Advice from Utrecht, that M. Albert Roelans, ancient Burgomaster, and one of the Council of that City, died there on Tuesday Morning last, in the 69th Year of his Age.

This Morning about Eight o'Clock her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales was safely delivered of a Princess; and her Royal Highness, and the young Princess, are, blessed be God, in good Health.
