We 'have received Advice from Goa, that the new Viceroy arrived there the 20th of September laft, and on the 27th of the fame Month took Pof--feffion of that high Office with all the State and Dignity imaginable.

Petersbourg, July 19. Her Imperial Mafefty, being willing to give her Minister at the Court of Vienna a new Mark of the particular Efteem and Regard fhe has for his Services, has ordered his Appointments to be augmented with four thousand Rubles a Year. We have received Advice from Moscow, that the Count de Rasoumosski, Atteman or General of the last Month for the Ukraine, in order to take Possession of that important Post. Naples, July 20. 'Tis thought some important Negociation is on the Tapis between this Court and that of Vienna; and the rather, as Prince Esterhasy, Ambassador from their Impetial Majesties, has of late been invited to several Conferences that have been held by the Minifters of this Court. The Deputies who are come hither from Dantzick, as well on Behalf of the Magistrates, as of the Burgesses, have already laid a Narrative of their Grievances before the Commissions whom the King has appointed to enquire into their Complaints. Hambourg, Aug. 3. M. Corthum, one of the Members of the Regency, has been elected Burgomafter of this City, in the room of the late M. Spreckelfen, whofe Corps was interred with great Funeral Pomp in the Church of St. Nicholas. We learn by the laft Letters from Petersbourg, that, in Conformity to the Orders of the Empress, an Ordonnance has been publilhed there, renewing that of the 11th of May 1744, which forbids, under very fevere Penalties, the carrying of any Gold or Silver, or any Species of Ruffian Money, out of any Part of that Empire. They write from Drefden, that Field Marshal Count Lowendahl, and the Countels his Spoule, let out from thence on the 26th past, on their Return to France. Berlin, Aug. 3. The Queen-Mother, accompanied by the Princess Amelia, went on Sunday Night last to pay a Visit to her present Majesty at the Palace of Schenhausen, where there was a very grand Concert, at which were prefent the Prince of Pruffia, and several Perfons of the First Distinction of both Sexes. The Tame Day Count Bredow, Minister of State, and Grand Master of the King's Wardrobe, set out from hence for Vienna. His Majesty has appointed M. de Tettau to be Major to the Regiment of Foot of the Prince of Heffe Darmstadt. The Prince of Anhalt Bernbourg arrived here Yesterday Morning, and the same Day waited on the two Queens, and met with a gracious Reception. Franckfort, Aug. 5. The Pruffian Officers continue to raise a great Number of Recruits in the Neighbourhood of this City; and they are often fending them away for their respective Regiments. The Affair concerning the Church, which the Protestants have been for a long Time past folliciting to have built within the Walls of ! this City, continues in the fame Situation it+

standing feveral Princes and States of the Empire have interested themselves in Favour of the Protestants, yet the Magistrates seem quite stedfast in refufing their Request.
