Lisbon, July 9.

THE King proposes going in a short Time with the whole Court to Bellem, where 'tis said they will stay five or six Weeks. The Chevalier Branchamp, the new Prussian Resident, has had his first publick Audience of his Majesty, in which he delivered his Credential Letters. They have begun to repair the Fortifications of some of the Sea Ports in this Kingdom, which Work will be carried on with all possible Dispatch till they are all put in a proper State of Defence, agreeable to his Majesty's Orders issued some Time since for that Purpose. The Fleet from Fernambucca, that was expected some Time ago, is at length arrived in this Port, very richly laden, as well on the King's Account, as on that of the Merchants of this City. We have received Advice from Goa, that the new Viceroy arrived there the 20th of September last, and on the 27th of the same Month took Possession of that high Office with all the State and Dignity imaginable.

Petersbourg, July 19. Her Imperial Majesty, being willing to give her Minister at the Court of Vienna a new Mark of the particular Esteem and Regard she has for his Services, has ordered his Appointments to be augmented with four thousand Rubles a Year. We have received Advice from Moscow, that the Count de Rasoumofski, Atteman or General of the Cossacks, set out from thence on the 29th of last Month for the Ukraine, in order to take Possession of that important Post.

Naples, July 20. 'Tis thought some important Negotiation is on the Tapis between this Court and that of Vienna; and the rather, as Prince Esterhazy, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties, has of late been invited to several Conferences that have been held by the Ministers of this Court. The two Gallies that made themselves Masters of the Tunesian Galliot, under the Cannon of the Fort of St. Giglio, returned into this Port on Wednesday last; and the other Ships of War, now out on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, are daily expected.

Parma, July 22. The Infant Dutchess, who advances happily in her Pregnancy, was let blood a few Days ago by Way of Precaution. 'Tis reported here, that several considerable Employments at Court will be laid aside; and that

the Number of Officers belonging to their Serene Highnesses Household will likewise be considerably reduced.

Milan, July 24. Count Christiani, Great Chancellor of this Dutchy, having finished the Negotiation with which he was charged by the Empress Queen of Hungary, at the Court of Turin, is returned hither: A few Days ago a great Number of Banditti, who had been confined in the different Prisons of Lombardy, were conducted from thence to Trieste, under an Escort of a Detachment of Grenadiers, from whence they are to be sent into Hungary, in order to work at the Fortifications.

Gotha, July 30. Their Serene Highnesses our Sovereigns set out from hence on the 22d Instant for their Palace of Ichterhausen, from whence they went the same Night to Arnstadt, in order to pay a Visit to the Princess Dowager of Schwartzbourg Sonderhausen. The Hereditary Prince of Saxe Weymar, who has taken a Tour to Eisenach, returned to the Castle of Fridenstein on Monday last. We have had here for some Days past several prodigious Storms of Wind and Rain, accompanied with Hail Stones of a very large Size, which have done an infinite deal of Damage to the Fruits of the Earth in all the Country round about us.

Stockholm, July 30. The Inhabitants of this City have already named Messrs. Plomgreen and Kierman, to be their Deputies to the approaching General Diet of this Kingdom; the first having presided in that Quality, in several preceeding Diets, and filled that Post with great Reputation. And we learn from divers Provinces of this Kingdom, that they are likewise proceeding to the Election of their respective Deputies, and that every Thing relating thereto is carrying on with the greatest Tranquility imaginable.

Copenhagen, July 31. Yesterday two Ships arrived in our Road from China, both said to be very richly laden. M. de Moltzhan, lately appointed Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Russia, set out from hence this Morning for Petersbourg. The King has appointed M. de John, his Majesty's Minister to the Circle of Lower Saxony, to be one of his Privy Councillors.

Vienna, July 31. The 8th of next Month being fixed for their Imperial Majesties Departure

ture from Presbourg for the Camp at Pest, several Hungarian Noblemen, who have Seats on the Roads through which they are to pass, are already set out to make the necessary Preparations for their Reception. The Archdukes and Archduchesses are to leave Presbourg on Wednesday next, in order to return to Schonbrun. 'Tis said that the Empress Queen, before the Return of the Court from Hungary, will dispose of the important Post of Primate of that Kingdom, which has been vacant for some Years; and, according to all Appearance, it will be given to the Archbishop of Koloczka.

Modena, Aug. 1. The Duke has given Orders for casting, at our Arsenal, thirty Pieces of large Cannon, and some Mortars, and they are already preparing to begin the same. The Court is still at the Castle of Rivalta, but will remove on Thursday or Friday next to Sassuolo, in order to pass the Remainder of the fine Season at that Place.

Dresden, Aug. 2. The whole Court set out this Morning for Zedlitz, where it will stay till the End of the Week. The Deputies who are come hither from Dantzick, as well on Behalf of the Magistrates, as of the Burgeses, have already laid a Narrative of their Grievances before the Commissaries whom the King has appointed to enquire into their Complaints.

Hambourg, Aug. 3. M. Corthum, one of the Members of the Regency, has been elected Burgomaster of this City, in the room of the late M. Spreckelsen, whose Corps was interred with great Funeral Pomp in the Church of St. Nicholas. We learn by the last Letters from Petersburg, that, in Conformity to the Orders of the Empress, an Ordonnance has been published there, renewing that of the 11th of May 1744, which forbids, under very severe Penalties, the carrying of any Gold or Silver, or any Species of Russian Money, out of any Part of that Empire. They write from Dresden, that Field Marshal Count Lowendahl, and the Countess, his Spouse, set out from thence on the 26th past, on their Return to France.

Berlin, Aug. 3. The Queen-Mother, accompanied by the Princess Amelia, went on Sunday Night last to pay a Visit to her present Majesty at the Palace of Schonhausen, where there was a very grand Concert, at which were present the Prince of Prussia, and several Persons of the First Distinction of both Sexes. The same Day Count Bredow, Minister of State, and Grand Master of the King's Wardrobe, set out from hence for Vienna. His Majesty has appointed M. de Tettau to be Major to the Regiment of Foot of the Prince of Hesse Darmstadt. The Prince of Anhalt Bernbourg arrived here Yesterday Morning, and the same Day waited on the two Queens, and met with a gracious Reception.

Franckfort, Aug. 5. The Prussian Officers continue to raise a great Number of Recruits in the Neighbourhood of this City; and they are often sending them away for their respective Regiments. The Affair concerning the Church, which the Protestants have been for a long Time past soliciting to have built within the Walls of this City, continues in the same Situation it

has been for some Time past; and notwithstanding several Princes and States of the Empire have interested themselves in Favour of the Protestants, yet the Magistrates seem quite stedfast in refusing their Request. A few Days ago a prodigious Quantity of all Sorts of Merchandizes passed by here, upon the Mayne, for the Fair of Mayence, which is to begin Tomorrow.

Hague, Aug. 10. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of this Country are arrived here from their respective Towns, and have already began their Deliberations. And Tomorrow the States of Holland and Westfrizeland will open their Assembly. We learn from Delft, that M. Bleiswyk, Councillor and Burgomaster of that City, died there Yesterday Morning, aged 72.
