THE following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by his Grace been presented to his Majesty: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, do, with unfeign'd Joy, congratulate your Majesty on the safe Delivery of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales; and the Birth of a Princess.

The Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's Government can only rise in their Estimate from a Prospect of their Continuance—And that Prospect is enlarg'd to us by the Birth of this Princess, as it has added to the Number of the many other Royal Pledges, heretofore sprung from you, for our future Security.

Every Increase of your Family must be a Circumstance of the highest Satisfaction to your Subjects, especially as they see how equally your paternal Care is shar'd between your Offspring and your People—You have given us many Instances of this your Goodness, but amongst them, none more conspicuous, than that wise Provision (schem'd and made perfect by you) whereby unexperienced Youth will be guided and directed in the Government of your Kingdoms by the Maxims of sound Policy, and the true Interest of the People preserv'd in the tender Years of an Infant Successor when it shall please Heaven to afflict us with the Loss of you.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed this 29th Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and fifty one.

Petersbourg, Aug. 1. The Number of Forces now on Foot in this Empire, that are ready to take the Field upon any Emergency, amount, according to a List lately sent to Court, to 200,000 effective Men, 160,000 of which are Foot, and 40,000 Horse, besides Calmucks, Cossacks, and the Militia of the Country. Major General Brown, Son-in-Law of the late Field Marshal Count Lascy, and the Count de

Brigly, Commander of the Troops quartered in Easthonia, are both soliciting their Discharge from this Service, the latter on Account of his great Age and bad State of Health. A Courier is arrived here from Constantinople, by whose Dispatches we learn, that the Porte has sent new Orders to the Kans of Crimea and Budziack, to take especial Care that the Tartars conduct themselves in such a Manner, as that the Subjects of the Russian Empire, bordering upon them, have not the least Cause to complain of their Behaviour.

Bastia, Aug. 3. The Deputies of the several Communities of this Island being assembled at San Fiorenzo, pursuant to Summonses which were sent to them for that Purpose, the Chevalier de Chauvelin and the Marquis de Cursay communicated to them a new Regulation for establishing the Tranquillity of this Country; and, after the same had been taken into Consideration, the Deputies returned for Answer, that there were some of the Articles liable to Objections, however they would lay them before their Communities, and do all in their Power to support them.

Plaisance, Aug. 5. The extreme dry Weather we have had for some Time past in this Country, having greatly damaged all the Fruits of the Earth, publick Prayers are at length put up in all the Churches of this Dutchy for wet Weather. The Court is to continue at Sala till the Middle of October next, and is then to return to Parma. The Infanta Dutchess advances happily in her Pregnancy. Cardinal Alberoni has considerably augmented the Revenues of the Seminary which he lately established in this City.

Rome, Aug. 7. The Congregation of the Sacred Rites, which was held a few Days ago in the Pope's Presence, was composed of 17 Cardinals, besides many Prelates, and others; when the Proofs of the Miracles that have been performed through the Intercession of that venerable Lady Maria de Chantal, Foundress of the Religious Order of the Visitation, were fully admitted, so that to all Appearance they will soon proceed to her Beatification. We have received Advice from Anzio, that the Maltese Gallies put to Sea on Wednesday last on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates. All the Advices we have received for some Days past from different Parts of the Ecclesiastical State, are full of melancholy Accounts of the great Damage they have received by the late Earthquakes. A few Days ago the Pope caused a Bull to be fixed up in different Parts of this City, notifying to the Publick, the Suppression of the Patriarchate of Aquileja, and the Erection of the
