Constantinople, August 4.

MAJOR Obreskoy, the new Russian Minister to this Court, arrived here on the 15th of last Month from Petersbourg: He has already had his Audience of the Grand Vizier, and imparted to him the last Declaration made by the Empress his Mistress, in relation to the Affairs of Sweden; which Declaration has been highly approved of at this Court, and gives universal Satisfaction. The Havock made here, and in this Neighbourhood, for these two Months past, by the Plague, is scarcely to be credited, there having, according to the nearest Computation, died of that Distemper only, upwards of sixty Thousand Persons.

Naples, Aug. 14. On the 29th. past died M. Roffi, one of the King's Privy Counsellors, to which Post the young Prince of Cariati has succeeded. Last Week the Duke delle Prata, and a Sicilian Gentleman, were put under Arrest for having fought a Duel, occasioned by a Quarrel they had at Gaming. On the 2d Instant the young Chevalier d'Altemps was, by Order of the Government, committed to Prison, for having, jointly with his Brother, mortally wounded an Officer of the Criminal Court, whilst he was intimating to them their Arrest by Order of the said Court. The said Gentleman, being sensible of the great Offence he had thereby committed, threw himself furiously out of a Window, and was thereby dangerously hurt; on which Account he was removed from the Common Jail to his own House. His Brother, a Knight of Malta, took Refuge in the Convent of the Olivetan Fryars. On the 6th a Criminal, who had made his Escape from the Common Jail to a Church, was, by Consent of the Court of Rome, taken out of it, and restored to Justice, in order to receive his Punishment. On the 7th several Delinquents, who had escaped to Rome, were brought back, agreeable to a mutual Agreement subsisting between this Court and that of Rome, to deliver up their respective Criminals.

Rome, Aug. 16. On the 6th Instant the Pope went to visit, for a second Time, Cardinal Valenti his Secretary of State, who is still confined to his Bed by the Gout. On the 12th and 14th, Cardinal Portocarrero, and the Duke of Ceresano, had an Audience of the Pope, to communicate the Contents of some Dispatches they had received from their respective Courts of Spain and Naples. The French Ambassador having compleated his Visits to the College of Cardinals, they, on the 28th, began to return theirs to the said Ambassador.

Florence, Aug. 20. By the last Letters from Modena we hear, that the Duke and the Hereditary Prince, attended by their respective Retinues, were on the Point of taking a Journey from Modena to Massa, to visit the new Road, and to view the Works that are carrying on at Lavenza, in order to make that Port convenient for small Ships, and other Trading Vessels. On the 15th Instant, the Senator Guadagne set out for Bologna, with Instructions from this Government, to use his utmost Endeavours to induce that Republick to compleat, on their Part, the new Road that is making from Florence thither, which, without their Concurrence, will remain unfinished. A few Days ago the Lord and Lady Killmurray arrived here with their Son and Daughter. Lord Bruce and Lord Charlemont are also arrived here from Rome; so that there are upwards of thirty English Travellers here, and many others are expected soon.

Breslau, Aug. 27. The Troops that are to form a Camp in this Province, are all in Motion; they consist of the Regiments of Cuirassiers of Buddenbroek, Gesler, Rochau, Kyau and Bornstadt; the Regiments of Dragoons of Nassau and Schwerin; the Regiments of Hufars of Wartemberg, Wechmar, Szecely and Vippach; and the Regiments of Foot of Margrave Henry, Kalsow, Lestewitz, Hautcharmois, Schultz, Treskow, Krëitzen, Brandeis and Sers. All these Regiments will be encamped by Sunday next, in the Neighbourhood of Ohlau, where 'tis thought they will remain at least a Fortnight, during which Time the King proposes to review them. His Majesty's Head Quarters, and those of the Princes his Brothers, will be at Marschwitz, where every Thing is ready for their Reception.

Vienna, Aug. 28. The whole Court is at present at Hollitsch, where the Emperor and Prince Charles of Lorrain intend staying till the End of next Month, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting; but the Empress Queen, Princess Charlotte of Lorrain, and the young Imperial Family, are expected at Schonbrun towards the End of next Week. The last Advices we received from Croatia inform us, that the late Disturbances in that Province were entirely at an End, the Mutineers having all returned to their different Employments, except their Chiefs, who, for Fear of meeting with their just Deserts, had taken Shelter in the Territories of the Grand Signior, after having been refused the Protection they solicited of the Bashaw of Bosnia. This Court having been informed, that the Plague rages with great Violence at Constantinople, and being apprehensive

hensive lest the same should spread itself into Hungary, has sent Orders to the Commissaries of Health established on the Frontiers of that Country, to use all imaginable Precautions to prevent the same. A large Quantity of Bullets, Bombs, Granades, and other warlike Ammunition, were sent away from hence a few Days ago for the Fortresses of Brinn and Olmutz in Moravia. On Tuesday last we received the melancholy News of a Fire breaking out at Gundramstorff, a small Town in the Neighbourhood of Luxembourg, which soon reduced to Ashes about 40 Houses, and the principal Church of that Place.

Dresden, Aug. 29. M. Kalkoen, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to this Court, was last Week seized with an Apoplectic Fit, but it was not attended with any fatal Consequences. General Arnim, who has resided for some Years at the Court of Russia, in Quality of Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court, is daily expected here from Petersbourg. The last Letters received here from Dantzick say, that the Magistrates of that City have published a Declaration, couched in very strong Terms, wherein they insist upon their Right of preserving their ancient Privileges; from which they absolutely declare they will never depart.

Copenhagen, Aug. 29. The King having engaged himself, by a late Treaty with the Emperor of Morocco, to make that Prince a considerable Present of Artillery and Ammunition, a Vessel is ordered to be got ready for carrying the same accordingly. The Baron de Juel, the new Ambassador from this Court to that of Sweden, set out from hence a few Days ago for Stockholm. In Conformity to the King's Orders, 150 Men have been drafted out of the Troops of this Garrison, who are to be sent to Elsenour, in order to be employed in erecting a new Battery of Cannon near the Fort of Cronenbourg.

Berlin, Aug. 31. On Wednesday last the King, accompanied by the Prince of Prussia, set out from hence for Silesia, and was followed the next Day by the Princes Henry and Ferdinand, and by several of the Nobility and General Officers. In passing by Custrin his Majesty reviewed the Regiment of Dragoons of Count Rothenbourg, and that of Foot of Bonin. During his Stay in Silesia the Troops in that Province are to form a Camp in the Neighbourhood of Neifs. By an Express just arrived here from Great Glogau we are informed, that the King arrived there on Saturday last in perfect Health, and reviewed the same Day the Regiment of Du Moulin, which is there in Garrison.

Hague, Sept. 7. On Tuesday last his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange set out from hence for Aix la Chapelle; the next Day the Margrave of Baden Dourlach followed his Serene Highness, and on Thursday the Duke of Brunswick Wolfenbittel took the same Route. Before the Prince of Orange's Departure he disposed of the Post of Marshal of the Lower Quarter of the Province of Utrecht in Favour of Baron d'Amerongen. This Day her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange received an Express from Aix la Chapelle, by which we learn, that his Serene Highness reached Maestricht Yesterday Noon, and was saluted at his Entrance by a tripple Discharge of the Cannon

upon the Ramparts; soon after which he received the Compliments of the Magistrates in a Body; and, having dined with the Baron d'Aylva, Governor of that City, his Serene Highness set out in the Afternoon for Aix la Chapelle, which Place he reached about Ten that Evening, being escorted by 160 Palatine Horse, who came two Leagues from that City to meet him. His Serene Highness was received at his Entrance into Aix la Chapelle, in the same Manner he had been at Maestricht, and, upon his Arrival at his Lodgings, found a Company of Grenadiers posted at his Gate to serve him for a Guard. The same Night his Serene Highness was complimented upon his safe and happy Arrival by the Magistrates in a Body, and by all the principal Persons of Distinction in the City.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
