A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the Fifteenth Day of October next; We, with the Advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Fifteenth Day of October, to Thursday the Fourteenth Day of November next; and we have given Order to our Chancellor of Great-Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Fourteenth Day of November next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Fourteenth Day of November next.

Given at our Court at *Kensington*, the Twenty-sixth Day of *September*, 1751, in the Twenty-fifth Year of our Reign.

G O D Save the K I N G.

Lisbon, Aug. 28. This Court is come to a Resolution to augment the Naval Force of this Kingdom with a certain Number of Men of War, and they are now actually making the necessary Preparations for carrying the said Resolution into immediate Execution. The Corsairs of Barbary continue to be extremely troublesome to our Commerce, notwithstanding we have a Man of War and three Frigats out upon a Cruise against them.

Naples, Sept. 7. 'Tis said that Cardinal Spinelli, Archbishop of this City, is determined to resign his Archbishoprick, in order to spend the Remainder of his Days at Rome, and that he has informed the King thereof by an Express. The Algerine Corsairs having lately appeared again in great Numbers upon the Coast of this Kingdom, and taken one of our Merchantmen and a Genoese Pink, Orders are given for all the armed Vessels in this Port to put to Sea immediately on a Cruise against them.

Rome, Sept. 13. The Pope has been exceeding ill for some Days past, during which his Legs have swelled so very much that he has been obliged to keep his Bed. The Parmesan Commissioners, who were buying up great Quantities of Corn in the Ferrarois, have been obliged to return Home without compleating their Commissions, agreeable to the Pope's Orders, which

were issued some Days ago, for prohibiting, for the present, the Exportation of that Commodity out of the Ecclesiastical State.

Marseilles, Sept. 16. We have received certain Advice that the Plague continues to rage with great Violence at Constantinople and in that Neighbourhood, whereupon Orders are issued for all Ships coming into this Port from the Levant, to perform a very strict Quarantine.

Ulm, Sept. 21. Yesterday Morning about three hundred Recruits, who came hither from different Parts of the Circle of Swabia, where they were enlisted, embarked at Guntzbourg, a small Town about three Miles from hence, and set sail for Lintz in Upper Austria, from whence they are to continue their Route by Land to Moravia, in order to be distributed in the Regiment of Molok, and in that of the Grand Master of the Teutonick Order, both which Regiments are there in Garrison.

Munster, Sept. 24. On Monday last a Cartel was published here, by which his Prussian Majesty, and the Elector our Sovereign, agree to deliver up, reciprocally, all Deserters from each other's Troops.

Harlem, Sept. 28. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has confirmed the Choice that was made here, and presented to him for his Approbation, of the following Persons to be Magistrates of this City, viz. Abraham de Pape, Jean Solomon la Clé, Gaspard Jacob Ravens, Jean Frederick Parvé, Daniel Jean Cumerling, Corneille van Sypesteyn, and David van Lennep, And in an Assembly of the Council, which was held here Yesterday, it was resolved that M. van den Broek, Councillor and ancient Burgo-master of this City, should be continued in the Post of Deputy to the College of the Admiralty of Amsterdam.

Amsterdam, Sept. 29. The Directors of our East India Company have given publick Notice, that they will begin to sell by Auction the Merchandize and Effects lately brought by our Ships from the East Indies, viz. in the Chamber of Amsterdam on the 8th of November next; in that of Zealand on the 22d; in that of Delft on the 29th; in that of Rotterdam on the 1st of December; in that of Horn on the 7th; and in that of Enckhuysen on the 12th: To which Sale they propose adding the Merchandize that may be brought on board four other Ships that are daily expected, provided they arrive in our Ports by or before the 15th of next Month; but in Case those Ships do not arrive by that Time, the Sale of their Cargoes is to be put off till next Spring.

Hague, Sept. 30. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland opened their Assembly Yesterday, and this Day continued their Deliberations. Count Bentinck is returned here from Guelderland, and has already assisted at the A
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sembly of their High Mightinesses. M. Godyn, whom the Prince Stadtholder lately appointed to be a Captain in the Regiment of Major General Becker, has taken his Oaths before the Council of State in that Quality. By our last Letters from Aix-la-Chapelle, his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange continued to enjoy a good State of Health at that Place, from whence 'twas believed he would set out on Monday next for Maestricht.

Dublin, September 19.

This Day arrived his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom; his Grace was received at his Landing by the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of Dublin. The Foot Forces in Garrison, with the Militia of the City, lined the Streets through which his Grace (attended by a Squadron of Horse, the Battle Axe Guards and the other Officers attending the State) proceeded, amidst the Acclamations of the People, with the usual Ceremony, to the Castle, where, in the Council Chamber, his Grace took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and received the Sword from their Excellencies the Lords Justices. After which the great Guns in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out upon College Green; and his Grace, repairing to the Presence Chamber, received there the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival to take upon him the Government of this Kingdom.
