Lisbon, August 24.

HIS Day the Fleet from Rio de Janeiro came into Port; it consists of two Men of War, and fourteen Merchantmen, all richly laden.

Leghorn, Sept. 11. Upon Advice that they have had very large Crops of Corn this Year in divers Places of the Levant, the Merchants of this City have sent several Vessels thither, in order to purchase a good Quantity of the same for the Use of those Provinces in Italy where the Crops have failed.

Turin, Sept. 17. An Experiment has lately been made upon the Wines of this Country, and particularly those of the County of Nice, in order to see if the carrying them by Sea would any ways alter their Quality; and it appearing that they are the better for it, our Merchants propose sending a Quantity of them yearly to England, and seem to think that this new Branch of Commerce will be very advantagious to them. The Count de Brisqueresque, whom the King appointed some Time since to be Viceroy of Sardinia, is preparing to fet out to take Possession of that important Employment.

Modena, Sept. 17. The Prince of Est, second Son of the Duke our Sovereign, died Yesterday in the Asternoon of the Small-Pox.

Genoa, Sept. 18. The last Advices from Corfica say, that the Journey the Marquess de the desired Effect, the Inhabitants of the Pieves of Niolo and Calenzana having laid down their Arms, and given Hostages for their Submission to the new Regulation.

Warsaw, Sept. 18. The Vice-Chancellor has sent out Summonses for a Meeting of the Assessorial Tribunal on the first of December next at Grodno. Upon Advice that the Plague continues to rage with great Violence in different Places of the Grand Signior's Dominions, and particularly at Constantinople and in its Neighbourhood, repeated Orders were dispatched last Week to the Frontiers, to take all imaginable Precautions to prevent its being brought into

this Kingdom. We have received Advice that the Countess of Podoska, Spouse to the Great Cup-Bearer of Lithuania, died the latter End of last Month, at her Seat in the Neighbourhood of Przeszow.

Hanover, Sept. 25. Advice having been received that the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle is broke out in the Neighbourhood of Munster, strict Orders are issued for preventing the bringing from thence Try Horned Cattle into this Electorate. We are daily receiving most dismal Accounts of the Damages that have lately been done by the Overflowing of the River Weser. The Elbe has likewise overflowed its Banks, and done an infinite deal of Damage to the Fortifications of Stade, and to the Magazines of Ammunition and Provisions of that Place, a great Part whereof are entirely fpoiled.

Vienna, Sept. 25. On Sunday last the Chevalier Tron, Ambassador from the Republick of Venice, made his publick Entry into this City with great Magnificence; and on Tuesday Morning he set out with a grand Retinue for Schonbrun, where he was admitted to his first private Audience of their Imperial Majesties. Yesterday he was admitted to a separate Audience of her Imperial Majesty, in Quality of Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, and To-Day he is to be presented to all the young Imperial Family. On Thursday last about 300 robust Curzay, General of the French Troops, made young Fellows arrived here from Mantua and into the interior Parts of that Island, has had Milan; they were taken out of the different Houses of Correction in those Countries, and were going, under a strong Guard, to Tameswear, and other Places in Hungary, in order to work at the Fortifications. The Plague continuing to rage very much at Constantinople, and in several other Places of the Turkish Empire, the Court has fent positive Orders to the Commissaries of Health upon the Frontiers of Hungary, not to suffer any Effects, or even Letters except they are perfumed, to pass the Limits of that Country.

> Osnabrug, Sept. 26. A few Days ago, a Cartel, lately concluded between his Imperial Majesty and the Elector our Sovereign, was published

published here, by which they reciprocally agree to exchange all Deserters from each other's Troops.

Berlin, Sept. 28. The King has appointed M. Pfuel to be one of his Privy Council. Last Saturday being the Anniversary of the Birth of Prince Frederick William, eldest Son of the Prince of Prussia, the same was celebrated with great Magnificence at the Palace of Montbijou, where all the young Nobility of both Sexes went to compliment him on that Occasion, most of whom had the Honour of Supping with his Highness, and of being afterwards present with him at a Ball which lasted till 'twas very late.

Hambourg, Sept. 28. Field Marshal Count Lowendahl came here on Sunday last from Holstein, and proposes setting out the latter End of this Week, on his Return to France. Letters received here by the last Post from Stockholm say, that the Sieur Wickmann, who had been for some Months past closely confined in Finland, for having carried on a Correspondence with the Enemies of that Kingdom, had at Length received his Sentence, in Conformity to which he was beheaded on the 11th Instant. The same Letters add, that the Day before he was executed, fix Perfons, who were convicted of having set Fire to several Houses in that City, were conducted to Marstrand, in order to their working in the Gallies for Life. And by Letters from Gluckstadt we are informed, that the great Losses the Inhabitants of that City have sustained by the late Overslowings of the River Elbe, having been represented to the King of Denmark, his Majesty had sent Orders to General Count d'Alefeld, Governor of that City, to furnish such of them as are in Want of it, with all Necessaries for their present Sublistance, and to use all possible Means for causing the Banks of that River, which are broke down in several Places, to be repaired before Winter.

Hambourg, Oct. 1. Yesterday in the Asternoon Field Marshal Count Lowendahl set out from hence for France, and took his Route by Harbourg, We learn from Stockholm, that the Funeral Ceremony of the late King of Sweden, will be performed with great Solemnity on the 6th of next Month; and that the Coronation of their present Majesties is to be celebrated on the 15th, if the Preparations that are making for that Purpose, can be got ready by that Time.

Maestricht, O.A. 4. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange arrived here this Day at Noon from Aix-la-Chapelle. He was received by a general Discharge of our Artillery, and by the whole Garrison under Arms. His Highness alighted at the Baron d'Aylva's, Governor of this Fortress, who had provided a very elegant Entertainment for him, to which several General Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, were invited. To-morrow his Serene Highness proposes to visit the Magazines and Fortifications of this City, and afterwards to dine with

the Magistrates, who are making great Preparations to entertain him in a most splendid Manner.

Amsterdam, Oct. 5. The Representatives of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, and the other Directors of the East-India Company, have come to a Resolution to order Ten new Ships to be built; five of which are for the Chamber of this City; two for the Chamber of Zealand; and the other three for the Cham-

bers of Delft, Hoorn, and Enckhuysen.

Hague, Oct. 5. According to our last Advices from Aix-la-Chapelle, his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange was to let out from thence as Yesterday for Maestricht, from whence he is expected here towards the End of this Week. The Deputies of the respective Colleges of the Admiralty are expected here in a few Days, in order to deliberate, with those of the Assembly of the States-General, upon the Plan laid before them by the Prince of Orange, for the Reduction of the Duties of Importation and Exportation, as a Means for Re-establishing the Commerce of these Provinces.
