Berlin, Sept. 28. The King has appointed M. Pfuel to be one of his Privy Council. Last Saturday being the Anniversary of the Birth of Prince Frederick William, eldest Son of the Prince of Prussia, the same was celebrated with great Magnificence at the Palace of Montbijou, where all the young Nobility of both Sexes went to compliment him on that Occasion, most of whom had the Honour of Supping with his Highness, and of being afterwards present with him at a Ball which lasted till 'twas very late.

Hambourg, Sept. 28. Field Marshal Count Lowendahl came here on Sunday last from Holstein, and proposes setting out the latter End of this Week, on his Return to France. Letters received here by the last Post from Stockholm say, that the Sieur Wickmann, who had been for some Months past closely confined in Finland, for having carried on a Correspondence with the Enemies of that Kingdom, had at Length received his Sentence, in Conformity to which he was beheaded on the 11th Instant. The same Letters add, that the Day before he was executed, six Persons, who were convicted of having set Fire to several Houses in that City, were conducted to Marstrand, in order to their working in the Gallies for Life. And by Letters from Gluckstadt we are informed, that the great Losses the Inhabitants of that City have sustained by the late Overflowings of the River Elbe, having been represented to the King of Denmark, his Majesty had sent Orders to General Count d'Alefeld, Governor of that City, to furnish such of them as are in Want of it, with all Necessaries for their present Subsistence, and to use all possible Means for causing the Banks of that River, which are broke down in several Places, to be repaired before Winter.

Hambourg, Oct. 1. Yesterday in the Afternoon Field Marshal Count Lowendahl set out from hence for France, and took his Route by Harbourg. We learn from Stockholm, that the Funeral Ceremony of the late King of Sweden, will be performed with great Solemnity on the 6th of next Month; and that the Coronation of their present Majesties is to be celebrated on the 15th, if the Preparations that are making for that Purpose, can be got ready by that Time.

Maestricht, Oct. 4. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange arrived here this Day at Noon from Aix-la-Chapelle. He was received by a general Discharge of our Artillery, and by the whole Garrison under Arms. His Highness alighted at the Baron d'Aylva's, Governor of this Fortrefs, who had provided a very elegant Entertainment for him, to which several General Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, were invited. To-morrow his Serene Highness proposes to visit the Magazines and Fortifications of this City, and afterwards to dine with

the Magistrates, who are making great Preparations to entertain him in a most splendid Manner.

Amsterdam, Oct. 5. The Representatives of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, and the other Directors of the East-India Company, have come to a Resolution to order Ten new Ships to be built; five of which are for the Chamber of this City; two for the Chamber of Zealand; and the other three for the Chambers of Delft, Hoorn, and Enckhuysen.

Hague, Oct. 5. According to our last Advices from Aix-la-Chapelle, his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange was to set out from thence as Yesterday for Maestricht, from whence he is expected here towards the End of this Week. The Deputies of the respective Colleges of the Admiralty are expected here in a few Days, in order to deliberate, with those of the Assembly of the States-General, upon the Plan laid before them by the Prince of Orange, for the Reduction of the Duties of Importation and Exportation, as a Means for Re-establishing the Commerce of these Provinces.
