Lisbon, September 5.

HE Ingineers and Officers whom the King has appointed for carrying the late Treaty concluded with Spain relating to Nuova Colonia into Exetution, have received Orders to embark the 16th Instant. The small Squadron that has been for some Weeks at Sea for the Preservation of the Commerce of this Kingdom against the Barbary Pyrates, is returned into Port, but is foon to fail again on another Cruize. The Cargo of the Fleet from Rio de Janeiro, which arrived here the 24th of last Month, consists of three Millions in Gold on the King's Account, and ten Millions for the Merchants, besides a valuable Loading of Sugar and Hides.

Naples, Sept. 14. Four young Turks, who were here in Slavery, having expressed a Desire to abjure the Mahometan Religion, and to embrace Christianity, they were accordingly publickly baptized on Tuesday last with great Solemnity in one of our Churches named the Conception, in the Presence of a prodigious Number of Persons who came on Purpose to see the Ceremony. Several rich Abbies, and other Religious Communities, having contribyted very largely towards the Building of the magnificent Hospital that is erecting in this City, that Work goes on with great Expedition.

Great Dutchess from Petershoff, this City begins to fill very fast with Nobility and Gentry from their respective Country Seats; and they have begun to go on with all publick Diversions. Major Obreskoy, Minister from this Court to that of the Ottoman Empire, has acquainted her Imperial Majesty by an Express, that, soon after his Arrival at Constantinople, he was introduced by the Grand Vizier to a private Audience of the Grand Seignior, in which his Highhels had given him the strongest Assutances of his inviolable Resolution to maintain the good Harmony that at present subsists between the two Empires; to which Purpose he would immediately send Orders to all the Bashaws or Governors of the respective Provinces bordering upon Russia, to conduct themselves

in such a Manner as not to give the least Uneasiness or Cause of Complaint to any of het

Imperial Majesty's Subjects.

Hermanstadt, Sept. 20. General Count Brown, who Commands in Chief the Imperial Troops in this Province, is preparing to fet out to take the Command of those in the Kingdom of Hungary. The Regiment of Cuirassiers of Bernes is arrived here, in order to replace that of Pretlach, which is actually on its March for Bohemia.

Madrid, Sept. 21. The 18th Instant arrived at Cadiz the Oriente Register from Vera Cruz with upwards of two Millions of Dollars in Money and Effects; and the Sobervio (another equally rich) is foon expected. The same Day Commodore Steward returned from a long Cruize without bringing any Prizes. On the 23d Instant his Catholick Majesty's Birth-day will be celebrated here with an Opera, and the

other usual Demonstrations of Joy.

Modena, Sept. 22. The Duke our Sovereign returned on Wednesday last with the Hereditary Prince from Massa to Sassuolo. On the 16th Instant, the Soldiers of the Regiment of Mirandola, mutinied against their Officers, and refused to work at the great Road that is making at Massa, alledging it was not come to their Turn; and the Affair was carried to such a Height, that General Palude was obliged to march against them with the Regiment of Petersbourg, Sept. 16. Since the Return of Mandre, and some other Troops, before he her Imperial Majesty and the Great Duke and could bring them to Reason. The Ringleader's however were apprehended, two, of whom are to be hanged on Saturday next, four to be thot, two to be sent to the Gallies, and nine to be whipped.

> Vienna, Sept. 25. As nothing remarkable is passing at this Court at present, their Imperial Majesties take almost every Day the Diversion of Hunting in the Neighbourhood of Schon-

brun.

Dresden, Sept. 27. Their Majesties are still at Weissenselds, from whence they are to set out on the 1st of October next to see the Fairof Leiplick. Count Bellegarde, Minister srom this Court to that of Sardinia, is arrived here from Turin. The 7th of next Month being the King's Birth-Day, the same will be magnificently celebrated at St. Hubertibourg, where PréPreparations are already making for that Pur-

pole.

Copenhagen, Sept. 28. On Saturday last all the Field Equipage belonging to the Regiments here in Garrison, were viewed by the King's express Orders, and afterwards deposited in the Arsenal of this City. We have received Advice, that a Ship belonging to our West India Company has been entirely destroyed by Fire in the North Sea, but no one could tell how the Accident happened: The Crew had the good Fortune to save themselves on board a Dutch Ship.

Franckfort, Oct. 2. The Elector of Mayence, who has been for some Days taking the Diversion of Hunting at Stenheim, is returned to Aschaffembourg, where he proposes to stay till the End of the Month. Recruiting for the Imperial Troops goes on very successfully both in this City, and in all the neighbouring Villages, several considerable Bodies having been lately sent away to join their respective

Regiments.

Cologne, Oct. 4. The Baron de Burmania, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces to their Imperal Majesties, arrived here on Thursday last, and on the Saturday following continued his Journey for Vienna. 'Tis said he takes his Route by Munich, in order to execute a private Commission with the Elector of Bavaria. This Day a general Discharge was made of the Cannon upon the Ramparts of this City, on Account of its being the Feast of St. Francis, whose Name the Emperor bears.

Brussels, Oct. 4. A sew Days ago a considerable Number of Beaver Hats were seized in the Shop of a principal Dealer in this City; the same having been run in from France without paying the new Duty imposed by the late Edict. They write from Liege, that the States of that Bishoprick have given their Consent to the Project for cutting a Canal from Hasselt to Bois-le-Duc, and for making a new paved

Road from Liege to Viset.

Dusseldorp, Oct. 5. The Corps of the late Electress of Bayaria, which was carried from Ahauss to Munster, conformable to the Intentions of the Court of Munich, was interred Yesterday with great Funeral Pomp in the Cathedral Church of that City.

Amsterdam, Oct. 6. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has confirmed the Nomination of the Directors of our East-India Company, by appointing M. Mossel to be Governor General of the Dutch Settlements in the Indies.

Cologne, Oct. 7. We learn by our last Letters from Upper Austria, that a dreadful Fire had lately broke out at Ottensheim, a small Town about a Mile from Lintz, which burnt with great Violence, and reduced to Ashes one hundred and ten Houses besides the Parish Church.

Hague, O.R. 7. Our Lords the States of this Province, who were assembled on Tuesday and
