Dublin, September 22. N Thursday last His Grace the Lord Lieutenant left Kilkenny, and came that night to Mad-dinfton, and the next day arrived here, being met at some distance from the City, by a great number of the Gentry with their Coaches, and upon his entrance into the Town by the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, the Milicia's being in their Armes on each fide of the Streets through which he passed. The next day His Grace signed a Proclamation for a Fast to be kept throughout this Kingdom, on the same day as in England, and a Committee ordered to confider of the speediest and reasilest way of affishing such as are more particularly distressed by the late Fire in London.

Sunderland, Sept. 23. A Durch Man of War falling in about Whitby, into the midft of a Fleet of Colliers, who are fince arrived here with their Convoyes, was so well received by a Lyn Collier of ten Guns, that he was forced to Tack about, and lay by to the Windward, where he was again attaqued by a Ketch that belonged to their Convoy, who broadfiding him, forced him again to stand off: Bu: afterwards the third time falling into the Rear of the Fleet, The Keich still pursuing him, and the Zealand Fregat another of their Convoyers powring in a B oadfide into him, forced him to make away with much damage, the Eregat and Ketch continuing the Chace of him, till the night coming on, they loft fight of him.

The Drake and Colchester Fregats coming on Thursday last into Tynmouth Haven, brought in with them a prize of about 200 Tuns, laden with Sack, Soape, Brandy-wine, and some Bone-lace, together with another Vessel that pretends to be a Sweds.

Barwick, Sept. 26. This week we are informed, were brought up into Leith Road four Hollanders, one laden with Bellast, two with Wine and Braniy, and the other with Spanish Wool and Treak'e: Captain Browne an Englith Privateer hath brought in herea Vessel with Spanish Salt and Gummes; and several others are reported to be now in the Frith, taken by Captain Erown.

West-Cowes, Sept. 26. On Monday last Captain Gun-Tuns of Salt, which telonged to the Grand party.

Norwich, Sept. 26. This City is in a very deplorable

condition, by reason of the continued raging of the Sickness, and is become a very fit object of Charity. Mr. Anthony Mingay at the Pinctree in Red Cross-street, is by the Magistrates appointed to receive what shall be contributed for the relief of the poor in that City.

The Bill of Mortality for this last week runs thus, buried in all 150. whereof of the Plague 139.

Ohn Phillips His Majestics Auditor for the Counties of Norfolk, Suffolk, Huntingdor, Cambridge, Eslex, Here-ford, Middlesex, and the City of London, bath settled bis Office at Mr. Watts at the Rose and Crown over against the New Exchange in the Strand; where also is the Office for the Receipt of His Majesties Revenues within the Counsies of Estex, Hertford, Middlesex, and the City of London.

Naples, Sept. 7. This morning arrived here our five Gelleys which have been fix moneths out attending the Em-The leven Galleys of the Spanish Squadron which made some stop at Legorn, to take up necessaries, are every day ex-peded. The Malta Galleys keep out at Sea, and are upon their return home; those of Sicily lie at present at Genoua

to wait for the Duke of Albuquerque, who after he has ended his attendance on the Emprels, deligns with the Convoy to Pals to his Government of Sicily.

Vienna, Sept. 16. The Interpreter lent lately from his Imperial Majesty to Offen, to complement the new Vister, and to treat of other affairs between the two Empires, is returned hither with eight Christian prisoners, which the Visier freely released, making very rich presents to the Interpreter. Monsieur Fohn Van Wicha has received his Instructions in order to his speedy disparch from this Court to France, where he is to remain, as is said, in Quality of Resident from his Imperial Majelly.

His Imperial Majesty, besides the sour Regiments of Horse formerly designed from Milan, to attend and Guard the Empress, is sending likewise five Regiments of Foot, viz. Lieutenant General Heisters, who commands in cheif, Colonel Zeiff, Schmid, Gonsaga, and Portsa's. The other Regiments about Neussat have order to be in readings likewile to march.

The Court is much troubled at a stop upon the confines made of several Commedities and Suits for the Commediens that were by order bought in Italy, with other necessary provisions for the reception of the Empress, and may possibly retard it for some time.

The difference between the two Electors, Palatine and Mayence, grows every day wider; but this Court is not at all pleased with the procedure of the Elector of Mayence, in bringing in the Lorrainers; of which, the Elector Palatine has made a sharp Remonstrance to his Imperial Ma-

Rome, Sept. 21. The despair men generally have of the Popes recovery, induces Cardinal de Rest to delay his journey into France, which the French Ambassador will by no means seem to leste; and therefore tis thought, that at the last his Eminency will finde Limsels obliged against his will to make his voyage, having some time since made his visits in order théreunto.

We are informed, that the Duke of Parma in his return from Loretto, whither he went post incognito, in a Vow upon the death of his Dutchels, coming in this posture to the Gates of Boiogna, the Officers of the Sanita denied him admission, which he very ill resented; and passing round the Fown, took the way to Modena, but the Cardinal Caraffa, Legate of that Province, being informed of it, immediately dispatche the Master of his Chamber with some Coaches with fix horses after him; to invite him back, and to inform him of the imprisonment of the Officers of the Sanita, which a-bundantly satisfied the Duke, who mevertheless proceeded on his journey.

The Count de Vindisgratz, employed from the Empetor for the-composing all differences between the two Dutchies, is now arrived from Mantua, at Modena, but finds both parties so exasperated, that is generally conceived, he will be constrained to return without effecting any thing, the differences being probably like to continue as they are, during the minority of the two Dukes.

Ditto. The Cardinal d'Este, Uncle to the Duke of Modena, who is nearly allyed to the house of the Barbarini, the Dutchels his Mother and Tutrice, being fifter to the Prince de Palestrine, has caused a Remonstrance, as is sail, to be given in by the Abbot of Oritlas to the French King, shewing reasons why his Majesty ought rather to assist then exclude the Cardinal Barbarini in the next Conclave, as being a person very fit, in the opinion of all Christian Princes, to succeed in that holy Chair; which, it seems; is not well taken by

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the Kings Council, who have required him to meddle no farther in that delign : In the interim, the Cardinals of the Squadrave are openly engaging for the exclusion of all Pope Alexanders Cardinals, and consequently of Farnese, whom the French seem most to aim at : The generality opposing all ways possibly the French defign.

Don Sigismond, his Holinesses Nephew, who went with the Legat into France, hath lately taken the habit of a Prelate, in order to a Cardinals Cap, which 's is thought will be conserred on him the next Promotion. 'Tis likewise discoursed, that the Prince Matthias of Florence, and the Dake

de Mercoeur, may ftand fair for the fame Dignity.

Dantzick, Sept. 18. Letters from Poland inform us of a diffe ence between the Swedes Envoyé Extraordinary (; s his Credentials stile him) and the Elector of Brandenburghs Ambassador, occasioned by the latter taking the upper liand in his own boule, upon avait given him by the other; which the Envoyé telling him was not civil, the other replied, He would not in complement give away his Matters honor, which pur an e'd to the visit with much discontentment. The Sweder Envoyé intends (as 'cis said) very suidenly to leave the Court, and to go for Livenia, the Polish Agenthaing likewise expected home.

The Treaty betwixt the Poles and Muscovites is not like to have its effects; but that betwixt the Swedes and Muscovites is so far advanced, that there is no doubt made but a

Peace will be fuddenly concluded between them.

Elbe Stream, Sept. 18. The Swedes Troops ordered for the Dukedom of Bremen, appreach very near 3 and fince they cannot be suffered to pass through the Countrey of I unenburg, 'cis said, part of them are to come by water, in order to which, all the Boats on the Swedes side are under an Embargo for that fervice, the other part of them to march by Land to Blanckenness; the Artillery lies ready for them at Wilmar.

Several Passengers arrived from the Swedes Leaguer before Bremen, report them to be extraordinarily well fortified, and in the lowest places of it so deeply intrencht about, and so well drain'd by their Engines called Schaken, an invention of the Fieldhere Wrangel, that they are kept very dry in their Trenches, and intend to lie all the Winter before the Town, keeping always a Light Body ready to oppose the Sallies of the

belieged.

On Munday morning last, a party of Horse commanded by a young Swedes Cornet, took the Seur Fan Ufflen, M.fler of the Artillery, with a Major called Hammerstein, and about forty foot coming from Niemberg, intending for Bramen, and brought them prisoners to the Leaguer, which every day grows stronger; their Levies going on vigorously on the other fide of the water in Weftphalia, and the N.ighboring Countreys.

He Plague continuing still very dangerous at Cambridge, Peterborough, and other places near the Gity of E'y, The Lord Rishop of Elv hath thought fit to prohibit the kolding of the Fairs of St. Luke and St. Audrey at Elv this instant October.

Genoua, Sept. 15. The 11 instant arrived a Gally of this place from Alecant, having made some stop at Barcelona, to dispose of a Brigantine prize the took by the way, and brings with her 100 thousand pieces of Eight for this place: The Durch ships in this Port, finding it very hazardous for them to adventure homewards, and the leafon too far spent, have altered their designed Voyage, and intend to drive a Trade

between Spain and this place.

The Empress is now arrived at Milan, having from Bosco where she lay the 5th night, after her parting from Finale, arrived the 6th at Casselnuovo de Scrivia, the 7th night at Voghera, the 8th at Pavia, the 9th at Certosa, and from thence reached Milan : but her publique entry in that City will not be till the 28 Instant. The two Envoyes designed thither from this City, intend now to wave that place, and to complement her at her arrival at Vienne, towards which place they are to let forwards in 8 or 9 daies with a very splended Equipage, each of them attended by 6 pages, and 8 Footmen in rich Liveries, being Gentlemen of the best note.

Paris, Sept. 29. The Duke de Beaufort with his Fleet of above 50 Sail, great and small, accounting his Fireships and Advice Veffels, arrived at Diege the 23 initant; and the very next day according to Order he there found from his Ma-Jefty, returned for Breft, aifmiffing the Merchants under Lis Convoy for their several Ports; some of which, had it seems, the missortune to fall amongst the English Fleet, by whom divers of them were funk and destroyed

We are likewise informed from Diepe, that two Vessels arrived there the 26 instant, with the news, that five of the eight Datch ship, which accompanied our Fleet from the Streights, and had proceeded on for Diepe, intending to joyn de Ruyter, were met by some of the English Fleet about the height of Eologne, by whom, two of them were lunkinor can they yet have any good account of the other three.

We are in no small apprehensions for our Fleet, upon the news brought us of their ingagement with the English, which we are the more inclinable to believe, upon advice we have f om Diepe of the appearance of the English upon that Coast. The Duke de Beaufort has not reinforst his Fleet with these fiesh men sent out of the Guards thither for that purpose, feering they might not be fit for Sea fervice, whereupon they have orders fent them to return.

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Harwich, Sept. 27. Thi: day arrived here the Fanfan from the Fleet, whose commander gives us this account, that on Tuesday last the Prince with the whole Fleet sailed by Dungeonness, keeping without the Goodwins on pu pose to look for the Durch, the wind then at S.S.W. that in the afternoon they discovered them, and made them between 70 and 80 fail great and small, standing large away; and were then to the N r.hwards of the Knack, and curs to the Southwards, but the Wind blew such a stress, theethey were in no possibility of Engaging, whereupon our Fleet bore under the Kensish-Knock, where they came to an Anchor in much fafety, and in the night lost the Dutch, whom they suppose to be to Leeward of the Gaber, or keeping Sea to the Northwards; when he lest them, the Fleet was in a very good condition, not a Mast amils, only some few of their hoates misting. He adds that he was at the taking of the great French Man of War, and that he law four more burnt; who delpairing of making their escapes, got themselves into Bylanders, and there let fi e to their own ships : he knows not what gura they carried, but faies in his judgement he never faw nor heard a greater blait then they made when their Powder rooms took fire, which m.k.s him conclude them Men of War; the same account is confirmed by his Boatswain, and othersin his Company.

Alborough, Septemb. 18. On Wednelday at 4. the Fanfan came from the Fleet, then at Anchor near the Kentish Kneck, the Dutch, with some French ships, riding near the Geleter-Sands, the foulness of the weather at that time hindring their Engagement : About 4. hours after the Amity came off from the Fleet, to repair some small Damages received by the

Storm.

This night the Revenges Ketch came into this Harbor, speaking the good Condition of our Fleet, being very Healthy and full of Courage; and that the Red Flag was out, both Fleets in sight of each other, expecting every hour fit weather to Engage, if so, we shall in few days hear more of

Harwich, Sept. 29. This day at noon were discovered from our Beacon, though the weather were very hazy, 12 fail, and after them, as they seemed a whole Fleet, which we conclude to be our own, steering S. W. and by W. the Wind between North and West, in few houres we expect

to hear more of them.

Whitehal, Sept. 29. This day by a Warrant from his Majesties principal Secretary of State, the Person of Valentine Knight was committed to the custody of one of His Majesties Messengers in Ordinary, for having presumed to publish in Print certain Propositions for the rebuilding the City of London, with considerable advantages to His Mejesties Revenue by it, as if His Majesty would craw a benefit to lumsels, from so publick a Calamity of his people, of which His Majelly is known to have so deep a sence, as that he is pleased to feek rather by all means to give them eafe under it.
