The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS Information hath been given to his Majesty at this Board, That the Journeymen Taylors in and about London, having refused to work for the Master Taylors on the Terms required by Act of Parliament, the said Master Taylors had made Application to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, at their General Quarter Sessions held at Hicks's Hall on the 11th of July last, to alter the Wages of the said Journeymen, in such Manner as the said Court should think just and reasonable, (they having Power by Law so to do;) And that thereupon the Wages of the said Journeymen were ordered to be increased, and both Sides acquiesced therein, and seemed to be well satisfied therewith; yet that many of the said Journeymen do now again refuse to work for the Wages thereby settled and allowed; and great Numbers of them have entered into a Combination, not only not to work for the said increased Wages, but also by Force and Violence deter others who are willing to comply therewith, from working; That they are a numerous Body, and have committed many Riots, Tumults, and Outrages; and some of them have sent Letters to the Master Taylors, threatening to murder them and fire their Houses in case they would not comply with their illegal Demands, and have actually assaulted, beaten, and abused some of them, to the great Terror of his Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects.—His Majesty taking the same into his Royal Consideration, and thinking it proper for the Preservation of the Peace, that an immediate Stop should be put to such unlawful Proceedings and Combinations, doth therefore, with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order,

require and command all his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to use their utmost Endeavours to carry into Execution the Act of Parliament passed in the Seventh Year of his late Majesty King George the First, For the Regulation of the Journeymen Taylors within the Weekly Bills of Mortality; as likewise all the several other Laws that have been heretofore made, and are now in Force against unlawful Combinations of Workmen, Riots, and Tumults; and also against sending threatening Letters; his Majesty being resolved to suppress all such Practices by a most strict and exemplary Punishment of the Offenders.—And whereas the sending threatening Letters without any Name, or with fictitious Names subscribed thereto, demanding Money, or any other valuable Thing, is by an Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of his late Majesty King George the First, declared to be Felony without Benefit of Clergy; his Majesty is therefore pleased for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make Discovery of any Person or Persons who knowingly sent any of the threatening Letters to the Master Taylors as aforementioned, hereby to promise and declare, That there shall be paid to any Person or Persons, who shall within Twelve Months from this Time, discover and apprehend any Person or Persons who knowingly sent any of the threatening Letters as aforesaid, so as he or they shall be convicted thereof, the Sum of Fifty Pounds a Piece for each Person so convicted: And his Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of his Treasury, for the Payment of the said Rewards accordingly; And his Majesty does hereby command the respective Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, that they do from Time to Time transmit an exact Account of what they shall do, pursuant to this his Majesty's Order, to one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State,

*Naples, Sept. 30.* Last Tuesday, being the Birth Day of the King of Spain, the King's Brother, the Court was very numerous and extremely brilliant at Portici, all the principal Nobility and Foreign Ministers appearing there in their richest Habits to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion. The Corsairs of Barbary, which have infested these Coasts for some Weeks past, and greatly interrupted our Commerce, having received Information that some Ships of War were equipping in this Port with great Diligence, and almost ready to put to Sea to give them Chace, are all sailed off within these few Days past, in order to cruize elsewhere. By Letters received here from Constantinople, by the Way of Venice, we learn, that the Plague still rages there with great Violence, Numbers of the Inhabitants continuing to die every Day of that fatal Distemper; and that even those who had retired into the Country, in hopes of escaping it, had found but little Security, the Distemper having spread almost twenty Leagues round the City.

*Warsaw, Oct. 6.* The last Advices received here from Kamienieck say, that the Dietine which assembled there the Middle of last Month for the Choice of Deputies to assist at the General Tribunal of the Kingdom, had ended very successfully, without the least Dispute whatever.

*Lubeck, Oct. 6.* We learn from Dantzick, that a Ship arrived there lately from Andalusia, laden with Wine, Oil, Olives, and Cloth of the new Manufacture of Spain, all produced in the Dominions of his Catholick Majesty; and that they shortly expected some more Ships from thence, laden with the same Species of Merchandize.

*Stockholm, Oct. 8.* The Diet of the States of this Kingdom, which was opened in Form on Monday last in the King's Presence, has since been carried on with great Regularity; and 'tis not doubted but that their Resolutions will prove entirely agreeable to the King's Intentions.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 12.* On Sunday last Publick Prayers were put up in all the Churches in this City for the happy Delivery of the Queen, who is very far advanced in her Pregnancy. Their Majesties are expected here Tomorrow from Friedensbourg. The Ships bound from hence for the East Indies, will shortly put to Sea, most of the Officers and Sailors being already on board. According to the last Dispatches received here from the Baron de Juel, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Court to that of Sweden, the Diet of the States of that Kingdom opened their Assembly on the 4th of this Month; and as their Deliberations have since been carried on with the strictest Harmony, there is great Reason to believe the same will be attended with Success. The same Dis-

patches inform us, that his Swedish Majesty has lately conferred the Order of the Seraphins on the Prince of Anhalt Cothen.

*Dijou, Oct. 14.* The Vintage is begun in divers Cantons of this Province, and, considering the almost continual Rains we had for near two Months together, which prevented the Grapes ripening so kindly as they have done for some Years past, the Wines prove tolerably good.

*Frankfort, Oct. 15.* The Differences which subsisted for a long Time between the Courts of Hesse Cassel and Hesse Darmstadt, are, as we are assured, in a fair Way of being amicably adjusted by Commissaries appointed for that Purpose, who arrived here a few Days ago. The Affair concerning the Church which the Protestants have been so long soliciting to have built in this City, is not yet determined. The Duke de Saxe Meinungen, who went some Time since to Mannheim, returned here on Monday last. The Baron de Burmania, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Holland to their Imperial Majesties, passed by this Place a few Days ago, on his Way to Munich, from which, after he has executed a private Commission at that Court, he is to proceed on his Journey to Vienna.

*Brussels, Oct. 18.* The Marquess de Botta Adorno has lately taken a Tour to Ghent and Bruges, to view the new Canal that is cutting from one of those Cities to the other. We have begun to make the necessary Preparations for the Reception of Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor-General, who is expected here from Vienna towards the End of this Month; and they continue to say, that soon after his Serene Highness's Arrival, several important Affairs will be brought upon the Carpet.

*Whitehall, October 17.*

This Morning the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, set out for the Hague, with his Majesty's Compliments of Condolence on the Death of his late most Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder.

### General Post Office.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse, or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Man, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.

This therefore is to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
