P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Information hath been given to his Majesty at this Board, That the Journeymen Taylors in and about London, having refused to work for the Master Taylors on the Terms required by Act of Parliament, the said Master Taylors had made Application to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, at their General Quarter Sessions held at Hicks's Hall on the 11th of July last, to alter the Wages of the said Journeymen, in such Manner as the said Court should think just and reasonable, (they having Power by Law so to do;) And that thereupon the Wages of the said Journeymen were ordered to be encreased, and both Sides acquiesced therein, and seemed to be well satisfied therewith; yet that many of the said Journeymen do now again refuse to work for the Wages thereby settled and allowed; and great Numbers of them have entered into a Combination, not only not to work for the said encreased Wages, but also by Force and Violence deter others who are willing to comply therewith, from working; That they are a numerous Body, and have committed many Riots, Tumults, and Outrages; and some of them have sent Letters to the Master Taylors, threatening to murder them and fire their Houses in case they would not comply with their illegal Demands, and have actually assaulted, beaten, and abused some of them, to the great Terror of his Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects.—His Majesty taking the same into his Royal Consideration, and thinking it proper for the Preservation of the Peace, that an immediate Stop should be put to such unlawful Proceedings and Combinations, doth therefore, with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, require and command all his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under-Sheriffs, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to use their utmost Endeavours to carry into Execution the Act of Parliament passed in the Seventh Year of his late Majesty King George the First, For the Regulation of the Journeymen Taylors within the Weekly Bills of Mortality; as likewise all the several other Laws that have been heretofore made, and are now in Force against unlawful Combinations of Workmen, Riots, and Tumults; and also against sending threatening Letters; his Majesty being resolved to suppress all such Practices by a most strict and exemplary Punishment of the Offend-

ers.—And whereas the sending threatening Letters without any Name, or with fictitious Names subscribed thereto, demanding Money, or any other valuable Thing, is by an Act of Parliament of the Ninth Year of his late Majesty King George the First, declared to be Felony without Benefit of Clergy; his Majesty is therefore pleased for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make Discovery of any Person or Persons who knowingly sent any of the threatening Letters to the Master Taylors as aforementioned, hereby to promise and declare, That there shall be paid to any Person or Persons, who shall within Twelve Months from this Time, discover and apprehend any Person or Persons who knowingly sent any of the threatening Letters as aforesaid, so as he or they shall be convicted thereof, the Sum of Fifty Pounds a Piece for each Person so convicted: And his Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of his Treasury, for the Payment of the said Rewards accordingly. And his Majesty does hereby command the respective Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, that they do from Time to Time transmit an exact Account of what they shall do, pursuant to this his Majesty's Order, to one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Naples, Oct. 6. The King having nothing more at Heart than effectually to protect the Commerce of his Subjects, and being fully convinced, that the surest Way to accomplish it, is to put his Naval Force upon a good Footing, has ordered the new Men of War and armed Vessels that are upon the Stocks, not only in this Port, but in the other Ports of this Kingdom, to be finished as soon as possible, in order to have a powerful Squadron ready to put to Sea upon all Occasions. 'Tis said an Ordinance will be published here against excessive Gaming, which is lately carried to a greater Height than ever. An Epidemical Distemper which reigned for some Months at Messina, having carried off a great Number of Artificers, and the Manufactures established in that City having greatly suffered thereby, the King has promised, by a late Edict, that all Artificers who shall go and settle in that City, shall not only be exempt from all publick Taxes whatsoever for ten Years, but shall likewise enjoy some other very considerable Privileges.

Rome, Oct. 9. On Monday last, being the Feast of St. Francis, whose Name the Emperor bears, Cardinal Alexander Albani, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties to this Court, received the Compliments of the Nobility

Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion; to whom he afterwards gave an elegant Entertainment.

Petersbourg, Oct. 9. Her Imperial Majesty is gone to pass some Days at Czarkaselo. They have began at Court to make Preparations for the Empress's Journey to Moscow, but no one can say as yet when it will take Place. The Baron de Greiffenheim, the Swedish Envoy Extraordinary at this Court, intends giving a sumptuous Entertainment on the 14th Instant, on Occasion of the Coronation of their Swedish Majesties.

Turin, Oct. 10. The King has caused an Ordonnance to be published, expressly forbidding the Exportation of Corn out of his Dominions, upon Pain of very severe Penalties.

Genoa, Oct. 11. We learn by the Master of a Neapolitan Pink just arrived in this Port from Bastia, that several of the Pieves or Communities are already beginning to form new Pretensions, so that notwithstanding all the Pains and Care that has been taken by the Marquis de Curiay, Commander of the French Troops, and by M. Grimaldi, the Republick's Commissary General, in establishing the Tranquillity of that Island, 'tis thought the same will not be very lasting. By our last Letters from Nocera we learn, that several very severe Shocks of an Earthquake were felt there, and in that Neighbourhood about the End of last Month, which had not only thrown the Inhabitants into the utmost Consternation, but had also done considerable Damage.

Vienna, Oct. 16. The Aulick Council of the Empire is at present employed in adjusting the Disputes which have happened in some of the Imperial Cities. Those which have subsisted for some Time past between the Magistrates and Citizens of Nuremburg are already in a fair Way of being adjusted to the reciprocal Satisfaction of both Parties. A few Days ago a new invented Engine, for putting out of Fires, was played off in their Imperial Majesties Presence, and gave great Satisfaction; and 'tis thought will be preferred by most People to those we used before.

Copenhagen, Oct. 18. The two Men of War that have been equipping for some Time past in this Port, are to put to Sea the Beginning of next Week, in order to sail for the Coast of Tranquebar to protect our Commerce. They have on board three Companies of regular Troops, who are sent to reinforce the Garrison of Fort Dannebourg.

Lipsick, Oct. 19. Since the Departure of the Court for Dresden, most of the Foreign Nobility, who came here to see the Fair, and to pay their Compliments to their Majesties, have likewise left this City.

Franckfort, Oct. 22. We have received Advice from Heckingen, that the Princess of Hohenzollern was a few Days ago happily delivered of a Prince, the Birth of whom had caused great Joy to all the Inhabitants of that Principality; and that the young Prince was soon after baptized by the Names of Frederic-Louis-Francis-Xavier; the King and Queen of Prussia, and the Duke and Dutchess of Wirtemberg, standing Godfathers and Godmothers.

Hague, Nov. 2. Last Night a Deputation from the States of Friesland arrived here, to condole with the Princess Royal, and to administer to her Royal Highness the Oaths as Governante and Guardian to the young Prince Stadtholder her Son; and this Afternoon the

said Deputation, consisting of eight Persons, with the Secretary of State of that Province at their Head, set out from hence for the House in the Wood, in order to execute their Commission. Yesterday the Body of the late-Stadtholder was removed from the House in the Wood to an Apartment in the Court, where it is to lie in State till it is interred. This Evening died here suddenly, Baron Charles Louis de Wassenauer, greatly regretted.
