The Lord Lieutenant's Answer.

Am extremely obliged to the House of Commons for this very kind Address. This publick Mark of your Satisfaction, on my Return to this Kingdom, gives me the greatest Pleasure, and I shall take every Opportunity of contincing you, that I have nothing so much at Heart, as the true Interest of Ireland.

Petersbourg, Oct. 12. The last Advices received here from the Ukraine say, that Count Rasoumossky, Commander in Chief of the Cossacks, arrived at Gluckow the Beginning of last Month, and had taken Possession of that important Post; after which he set out for Batturin, to visit the Fortifications of the Castle of that Place. During the Stay of Count Rasoumossky at Gluckow, the Atteman or Chief of the Cossacks of Sporavia, arrived there with a numerous Retinue, to compliment him upon his new Dignity, and upon his Arrival in the Ukraine; and on the 24th the said Atteman let out from thence with his Retinue on his Return Home, after having taken his Leave of Count Rasoumossky, and received several rich Presents from him.

Turin, Oct. 12. On Tuesday last M. Vetelst, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces, had his private Audience of Leave of the King, and of the rest of the Royal Family, and was presented with his Majesty's Picture richly set with Dia-

monds.

Warfaw, Oct. 16. We have received Adwice from Kaminieck, that Count Branicky, Great General of the Crown Army, being arrived there to visit the Fortifications and Magazines of that Place, the Bashaw of Choczim had sent an Officer of his Garrison to compliment him upon his Arrival, and to assure him of the Grand Seignior's Intention to live in persect Friendship with his Master the King of Poland; and that Count Branicky had there-upon returned the Compliment by one of his own Officers, by whom he had sent a considerable Present to the Bashaw.

Munich, Oct. 19. The Baron de Burmania, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General to the Court of Vienna, arrived here on Wednesday Morning last from the Hague, being charged with a private Commission from the States his Masters to this Court. The next Day he had an Audience of the Elector, and met with a gracious Reception. 'Tis said he will stay here a few Days, and then proceed on his

Journey to Vienna.

Ratistan, Oct. 21. The Ratification of the Emperor, by which his Imperial Majesty approves of the Choice of Count Hohenembs to fill the Post of General of Horse of the Empire, has been communicated to the Diet by the Minister of the Elector of Mayence. There has likewise been delivered to the Diet, a Letter from Count Seckendorss, Governor of Philips-bourg, representing the bad Condition in which be found the Fortifications of that Place, and

desiring Orders may be given for putting the

same into immediate Repair.

Vienna, Oct. 23. The Departure of Prince Charles of Lorrain for the Low Countries is deferred for some Days. On Thursday Morning last the Emperor, accompanied by his Brother Prince Charles of Lorrain, and attended by leveral Lords of the Court, let out for the Country Seat of Prince Aversperg, his Imperial Majesty's Master of the Horse, in order to take the Diversion of Shooting for a few Days. The Court having received Advice that a Ship from Dalmatia, having the Plague on board, was got into the Italian Seas, has fent strict Orders to the Commanders of Trieste, Fiume, and Leghorn, not to suffer, upon any Pretence whatfoever, the said Ship to enter into either of those Ports; and the like Orders are gone to the rest of the Maritime Places in the Dominions of his Imperial Majesty:

Berlin, Oct. 26. The Princes Henry and Ferdinand, who arrived here on Saturday last from Potzdam, set out Yesterday Morning on their Return thither. We have received Advice from Prentzlow, that the young Princes, of which the Spouse of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Darmstadt was brought to Bed on the 16th Instant, was christened two Days after by the Name of Louisa. Within these sew Days past several of the Nobility and General Officers are set out from hence, with the King's Permission, for Stockholm, in order to be present at the Coronation of their Swedish Majesties.

Copenhagen, Oct. 28. The King, who went the Beginning of last Week to take the Diverfion of Hunting in the Neighbourhood of Jagerpreys, returned here on Tuesday Night last. The Baron de Woss having taken his Leave of the King, Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family, set out on Wednelday last on his Return to Berlin. Before his Departure he received the disagreeable News, that the Vessel, on board of which was his Equipage, and some of his Domesticks, had perished at Sea between this Port and that of Stetin. The young Prince of Anhalt Cothen having lately quitted this Service, to enter into that of his Prussian Majesty, the King has given to M. Schulenbourg the Command of a Company which that Prince held in the Horse Guards.

Brussels, Ost. 28. We learn from Liege, and divers other Places situate along the Meuse, that the Waters of that River had swelled so very much towards the End of last Week, as to overflow their Banks in several Places, and

have done an infinite deal of Damage.

Hambourg, Oct. 29. According to the last Advices received here from Poland, the Election of a Marshal of the Tribunal of Petrikau, after it had been long debated, sell on Count Malachowsky. By Letters from Stockholm we learn, that the States of that Kingdom continue their Deliberations with great Unanimity; and that the King had disposed of the three Places, vacant in the Senate, in Favour of Baron Lovenhielm, Count Strombourg, and Baron Scheffar.

Hague, Nov. 4. My Lord Holdernesse, one of his Britannick Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; arrived here Yesterday Morning from London, and set out immediately for the House in the Wood, where he had a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Royal.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending, and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges adorned with Streamers and Pendants to Wettminster; and having walked round the Hall, and folemnly faluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryers, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction.
