To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, humbly beg Leave to renew our solemn Assurances of the most zealous and affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government.

We must ever be deeply affected at any melancholy Event in your Majesty's Royal Family, and embrace this first Opportunity to present our sincere Condolence on the great Loss lately sustained by these Nations.

Your Majesty, upon that solemn Occasion of publick Grief, engaged in all the Offices of paternal Affection and Tenderness, (to which alone few Minds could have been equal) even then made the future Safety of your People the principal, the immediate Object of your Concern.

It is your Majesty's Glory not only to have made the Laws the Standard of your Government, and the Ease and Happiness of your Subjects the constant Object of your Attention through the whole Course of your auspicious Reign, but to have generously extended your Royal Care to the Preservation of our happy Constitution to succeeding Ages.

We want Words sufficiently to express the Reverence and Gratitude, with which our Hearts are filled, when we consider the Greatness and the Goodness of your Majesty's Mind.

May the Divine Providence long bless us with the Continuance of your precious Life, and perpetuate the Crown of these Realms in your Majesty's Illustrious House, for the Security and Happiness of our latest Posterity.

We esteem it a particular Mark of your Majesty's Goodness, that you have been pleased, a second Time, to commit the Government of Ireland to his Grace the Duke of Dorset, whose Zeal for your Majesty's Service, and the Prosperity of this Kingdom, we still happily experience in the beneficial Effects of his Grace's former Administration.

A just Regard to the Welfare of our Country must make us ever solicitous for the Security and Advancement of the Protestant Interest and the Trade of this Kingdom. We shall therefore be particularly attentive to the Support of the Charter-Schools, and the Improvement of our Linen Manufactures; and beg Leave to as-

sure your Majesty, that we will cheerfully concur in every Measure which may promote the publick Good, and contribute to the Ease, Stability and Honour of your Majesty's Reign.

Permit us, Sir, with all Humility, to condole with your Majesty on the great Publick Loss lately sustained by these Nations, and to express our Reverence and Admiration of that heroic Constancy of Mind, which not only supported your Majesty under the Pressure of so heavy an Affliction, but enabled you to exert your Royal Vigilance, to guard your faithful Subjects, (as far as human Prudence can guard them) from the dangerous Consequences which might otherwise arise from any fatal Event.

Truly sensible of the unparalleled Justice and Benignity of your Majesty's auspicious Reign, we cannot, without the deepest Anguish, look forward to that Period which your Majesty contemplated with the greatest Fortitude and Serenity; and we ardently wish, that that most salutary Law, which with the warmest Sentiments of Gratitude, we ascribe to your Majesty's consummate Wisdom, may, by the Goodness of Divine Providence, become unnecessary, by lengthening that precious Life, upon the Continuance of which, the Felicity of all your Subjects so much depends.

We assure your Majesty, that we will, with the greatest Cheerfulness and Unanimity, grant the usual Supplies; and as we have at all Times abundantly experienced your Majesty's paternal Goodness, so we acknowledge with particular Satisfaction and Thankfulness, your Majesty's gracious Attention to our Ease and Happiness, in recommending to us the Application of the Money, now remaining in the Treasury, (so far
