Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement:

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said washing Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.} _{1st of February, N. S.} in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore; by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned; in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

St. James's, October 30.

This being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, His Majesty received thereupon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; in the Evening there was a very numerous Appearance of the Nobility, &c. at the Drawing Room at Court, all dressed in the deepest Mourning; and at Night there were Bonfires, Ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster; but no Day is as yet appointed for celebrating the same in Form, on Account of the Mourning for his late Serene Highness the Prince of Orange.

Constantinople, Sept. 21. The Plague has greatly ceased this Month; the great Mortality is over; there are only some small Remains as usual; it has left us a natural Consequence, Scarcity of some Necessaries, which the Porte is occupied at present to remedy. The Seamen, Artisans, and Labourers, are so considerably diminished by Flight and Death, that they reckon one Quarter of the Inhabitants of this Capital wanting, so that they are dispatching Commands to all the Paschas, Beglerbegs and Commandants, throughout the Empire, to send hither a new Recruit of People. The Grand Seignor is preparing to return to his Seraglio in Town. The Distemper has made great Havock in his Court and Harem. The old Drugoman of the Porte is returned, and lives easily and quietly; they have not molested him. Haggy Mehemet Pascha, who was banished to Retimo on Account of his Transactions at Bagdad, died there in Exile. The new Venetian Bailo, Signior Diedo, is arrived at Jenedos. M. de Lezze is preparing for his Departure.

Lisbon, Sept. 21. The Commissaries and Engineers appointed to set out the new Limits of the Portuguese Settlements in America, are to set sail the 26th of this Month; and have the King's Orders to deliver up the Colony of St. Sacramento to the Spaniards, agreeable to the late Treaty. His Majesty having been informed, that great Numbers of Robberies have been lately committed by a Sett of desperate Fellows in the Province of Alentejo, as well upon the Highways, as by breaking open Houses, &c. has caused an Edict to be published, in which large Rewards are offered for the apprehending of any of these Robbers; and a Tribunal of six Persons is already appointed for their Tryal, of which Don Ignace de Costa Quintela is named President.

Petersbourg,

Petersbourg, Oct. 10. By the last Advices we received here from our Missionaries in the Kingdom of Casan, and the neighbouring Provinces, they go on very successfully in making Converts, having brought over no less than 4000 Persons, as well Men as Women, during the first six Months of the present Year.

Naples, Oct. 12. Last Sunday Night we had here, and in this Neighbourhood, the most violent Storm of Wind and Rain that has happened for some Years; the Wind blowing so very hard as to untile several Houses, and force away great Numbers of Glass Windows. The Sieur Rota, one of the most eminent Merchants of this City, died here Yesterday in a very advanced Age, and immensely rich.

Barcelona, Oct. 13. Don Jean Escoiquiz, Lieutenant General of the King's Armies, on whom the King has conferred the Command of his Troops at Oran in Africa, arrived here on Monday last from Madrid; he is accompanied by three principal Engineers, who have Orders to repair all the Fortifications belonging to Spain on the African Coast; and they are to set sail with the first fair Wind in a Man of War that has been equipped here for that Purpose. We have just received Advice, that Vice-Admiral Stuart, who has been cruizing in the Mediterranean with two of the King's Ships, has taken two Tunesian Corsairs, and sunk a third, upon the Coast of Catalonia.

Florence, Oct. 16. We learn by our last Advices from Corsica, that the present Situation of Affairs in that Island are very critical, some of the Pieves or Communities beginning already to murmur at the new Regulation that has been lately published there, and others seem resolved not to subscribe to it.

Stockholm, Oct. 22. Count Tessin, President of the Chancery and Governor of the Prince Royal, has renewed his Instances to the King for obtaining his Dismission from those Employments. The Ceremony of their Majesties Coronation is fixed for the 26th of next Month.

Hambourg, Oct. 29. The last Letters from Dantzick say, that the Magistrates of that City had at length published, on the 19th Instant, the Rescript sent them some Time since by the King of Poland, in Relation to their Differences with the Citizens; which favourable Circumstance gave great Reason to hope, that the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor of Poland, who were expected there on the 3d of next Month, would soon terminate, in an amicable Manner, the Troubles that have so long subsisted in that City.

Franckfort, Oct. 29. The Protestants established here, seem now more solicitous than ever to obtain Leave for building themselves a Church within the Walls of this City; to which Purpose they have renewed their Representations to the Court of Vienna, and to the Diet of the Empire, in such strong Terms, as makes it believed that Affair will soon end in their Favour. A large Body of Troops belonging to the Circle of the Upper Rhine, which have been for some Time past in Garrison at Philipsbourg, arrived here towards the End of last Week, and are now actually new Cloathing. Last Tuesday Morning a Courier passed by this City; he came from the Hague, and was going to Carlsruhe, to carry the melan-

choly News of the Death of the Prince of Orange to the Margrave of Baden Dourlach.

Brussels, Nov. 1. The Town Council, and the different Bodies of Tradesmen of this City, have agreed, in a General Assembly, to the new Duty proposed by this Government upon Provisions. The Price of Corn, which rose considerably some Time since in this Province, begins now to fall; but 'tis feared that of Flesh Meat, which also goes at a very high Price, will still continue dear, on Account of the Scarcity of it; so that the Regency have thought proper to postpone the Orders they were about to issue for prohibiting the Importation of Fish into these Provinces. They are continuing to make the necessary Preparations for the Reception of Prince Charles of Lorraine our Governor-General, who is expected here on the 15th Instant at farthest.

Hague, Nov. 6. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has appointed M. Viersten, Major of the Regiment of Foot of Glinstra, to be a Lieutenant Colonel; M. Logau, Captain in the Regiment of Lindman, to be Major of the said Regiment; and M. Chastillon to be a Captain in the Regiment of Grenadiers of Lieutenant General de Villegas.
