**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

### Advertisement:

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said washing Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st of January, O. S.</sup> <sub>1st of February, N. S.</sub> in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Petersbourg, Oct. 15.* It is now said that the Court will for certain set out for Moscow as soon as a sufficient Quantity of Snow shall have fallen for their going in Sledges, and the sledging Way shall become open. The Regiments of Guards have already Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march thither; and a like Number of Forces are ordered from Livonia and Finland to supply their Places in this City. We are informed by Letters from Cronstadt, that the Fleet is all unrigg'd and laid up, and the Sailors are returned to their respective Homes by Permission of the Admiralty; notwithstanding which they go on with the building of the new Men of War and Frigats that are upon the Stocks, her Imperial Majesty being determined to keep up a respectable Fleet.

*Naples, Oct. 15.* Besides the Advantages which the King has promised by the late Edict to Tradersmen and Artificers who shall settle at Messina, of an Exemption from all publick Taxes for Ten Years; his Majesty also allows them to partake of all extraordinary Free Gifts for the said Term; and promises moreover, that neither his Subjects, or Strangers, who shall establish themselves in that City with their Wives and Families, shall be obliged to do any publick Duty, or serve in any publick Capacity whatsoever, for the said Term of Ten Years. The Nephew of Prince Esterhasi, Ambassador from the Court of Vienna to the King, having attempted to salute a Lady with whom he had danced a Country Dance at a Ball, and received from her a Slap on the Face for his Imprudence; and Count Caraccioli, a Captain in the Empress's Service, who happened to be present, having gently reprimanded the said Gentleman, he immediately challenged him to fight with Pistols; to prevent which, the former was by the Government put under Arrest in his House, as was the latter by General Pappalardo in the Name of the Empress. The King has nominated the Abbe Mereli to succeed in the vacant Bishoprick of Cassano. Their Majesties and the Royal Family continue at Portici in perfect Health; and the Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy.

*Rome, October 16.* A few Days ago we had a most violent Hurricane of Wind, which overthrew many Trees, and caused considerable Damages at the Villa Ludovici, and Porta Salaria.

Rome, Oct. 23. Last Thursday Evening died here Cardinal Hannibal Albani, in the 69th Year of his Age, by whose Death a Twelfth Hat becomes vacant in the sacred College.

Florence, October 22. The Marquis Malaspina, the late Minister from the Court of Naples to that of Dresden, having been recalled, and being on his Return home, is taken ill of a Fever. From Parma we hear, that the Ceremony which Cardinal Portocarrero was to perform, in the Name of the King of Spain, to christen the young Princess, was fixed for the 17th Instant, in the Chapel of the Ducal Palace; and that the Duke of Parma had appointed Count St. Vitali to set out for the French Court, to compliment the King, and the Dauphin and Dauphiness, on the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy.

Warsaw, Oct. 25. We have received Advice from Leopold, that the Princess Spouse to the Prince of Jablonowsky, was lately delivered of a Prince at that Prince's Seat in the Neighbourhood of that City. By Letters from the Frontiers of Podolia and Volhinia we learn, that since the late Defeat of the Heyducks, they have not committed the least Outrages, or attempted to face the Detachments of the Crown Army. There are several important Posts vacant in this Kingdom, but 'tis said they will not be filled up till the Spring, when his Majesty is expected in this City.

Vienna, Oct. 27. The Emperor and Prince Charles of Lorraine are returned hither from Prince Aversperg's in Upper Austria, where they have been taking the Diversion of Shooting. The Empress Queen, accompanied by the Archduke Joseph, and the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine, went on the 25th to Schonbrun, and were present at the baptizing the new born Daughter of the Prince of Schwartzenberg.

Frankfort, Oct. 31. The Elector of Mayence, who was gone for some Time to Steinheim, is returned to Aschaffembourg, in order to wait the Arrival of Prince Charles of Lorraine, who proposes passing by that Place in his Way to the Low Countries.

Hague, Nov. 12. On Monday last a Deputation from the States of Guelderland were introduced to her Royal Highness at the House in the Wood, and condoled with her on the Death of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange; after which they tendered her the usual Oaths as Governante of their Province to the young Prince her Son. Towards Six o'Clock the same Evening, a Deputation from the Assembly of their High Mightinesses waited on her Royal Highness, and administered to her the Oaths, by which she is empowered at all Times to sit as President in the Council of State. On Tuesday Morning a Deputation from the Province of Zealand waited on her Royal Highness, and condoled with her on her Loss, and at the same

Time conferred on the young Prince Stadtholder the Title of First Noble of their Province. The same Day a Deputation from the Province of Groningen waited on her Royal Highness, from whom she took the usual Oaths, &c. Yesterday Morning the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of his Britannick Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, took Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and his Lordship sets out this Evening for Helvoetsluys, in order to embark for England.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Man, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
