**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

### Advertisement.

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattogat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said washing Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st</sup> of January, O. S. <sup>1st</sup> of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattogat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Peterbourg, Oct. 19.* Colonel Panin, whom the Empress sent some Time ago to Stockholm, to compliment their Swedish Majesties on their Accession to the Throne of that Kingdom, returned here a few Days ago, extremely satisfied with his Reception at that Court; the Account he gives of which seems perfectly agreeable to her Imperial Majesty's A large Quantity of Wines and other Provisions are sending from hence to Moscow;

from whence we are informed, that Count Ra-foumofsky, General in Chief of the Cossacks, was preparing to set out for that Place with a large Retinue, in order to wait the Arrival of her Imperial Majesty. We learnt from Riga, Revel, and Wybourg, that the Troops cantoned in those Districts during the Summer, were all gone into Winter Quarters. And by Advices from Derbent and Astracan we are informed, that the Troubles in Persia, which for a long Time had interrupted our Commerce with that Kingdom, began to be appeased. This News gives great Satisfaction to our Merchants, who now propose sending a large Quantity of rich Merchandize to Ispahan the ensuing Spring.

*Leghorn, Oct. 24.* The Magistrates of Health having been informed, that a Ship from the Levant, supposed to have the Plague on board, had attempted to put into Porto Ferrajo, have sent strict Orders to all the proper Officers on the Sea Coast of Tuscany, not to permit any Ship whatever from the Levant to come into any of their Ports. The two Jews, who put themselves under the Protection of a Clergyman in this City, in order to be instructed in the Christian Religion, are sent from hence to a Convent in Florence.

*Stockholm, Oct. 26.* The King has lately made a great Promotion of Military Officers, when Mess. Palmstruck and de Muhl were appointed Majors General. The Diet continues its Deliberations with the greatest Unanimity.

*Prague, Oct. 26.* The Commissaries of War, who have been for some Time at Com-mottau, to divide the Horses that have lately been purchased for remounting the Imperial Cavalry, are returned here, having sent to Vienna an Account of the Number they have delivered to each Regiment, amounting in the Whole to about 2000.

*Vienna, Oct. 30.* The Empress Queen of Hungary has raised Prince Ligne to the Rank of Field Marshal of her Armies; Count Wenceslaus is named to command the Imperial Troops in Transilvania, in the Room of the late Count Bernes; and 'tis said Count Trautmandsdorf will have the Command of the Regiment of Cuirassiers, vacant by the Death of the said Count Bernes. The Baron de Burmania, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to this Court, arrived here on Thursday last from the Hague. By our last Letters from Bohemia we are informed, that a Fire had lately broke out at Kolin, which burnt very violently for many Hours, and reduced near half the Houses in that Town to Ashes, before a Stop could be put to the Flames.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 30.* The King returned here from Jagerspreys last Thursday Evening; and Yesterday the Queen Mother came hither from Hirschholm for the Winter. His Majesty has appointed M. Sobutze, Rector of the College of Altena, to be Professor of Theology in the University of this City.
