**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

### Advertisement.

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st of January, O. S.</sup> 1st of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Stockholm, Oct. 29.* Their Majesties, attended by Count Tessin, the Barons Hopken and Palmstierna, and the Generals Ungern and Lieven; are gone to Drottningholm, to take the Diversion of hunting for a few Days. Their Majesties Coronation remains fixed for the 25th of next Month, for which very great Preparations are making.

*Warsaw, Oct. 30.* On Monday last Count Zalufki, President of the Tribunal of this City, arrived here from Dresden, and the same Day opened the said Tribunal. We have received Advice, that Prince Woroniecky, Starost of Lucko, Count Zamcysky, Palatin of Lublin, and Count Humiecky, are all lately dead at their respective Seats in the Country.

*Prague, Nov. 3.* The States of this Kingdom will open their Assembly on the 23d Instant; and the Commissaries appointed by the Empress Queen; for laying before them the Propositions of the Court, are daily expected here from Vienna. Most of the Regiments quartered in this Kingdom are already compleat, notwithstanding which, they continue to raise Recruits in the Room of such Invalids as are to be dismissed the Service and admitted into the Hospitals.

*Modena, Nov. 4.* We learn from Massa, that M. Sibon, whom the Duke our Sovereign employs in erecting a Port at the Mouth of the River Lavenza, is arrived there with several Engineers and others from Marsailles, in order to begin that Work.

*Vienna, Nov. 6.* His Serene Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine having taken his Leave of their Imperial Majesties, set out from hence Yesterday Morning on his Return to Brussels. They have fixed upon Monday next for the Distribution of the Premiums allowed by their Imperial Majesties amongst those who have excelled most in the Arts of Architecture and Painting. The Marriage of the young Count Wolkenstein, with the Countess d'Aprumont, one of her Imperial Majesty's Maids of Honour, was celebrated here on Sunday last, in the Presence of their Imperial Majesties and the whole Court.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 6.* 'Tis said the Court has received the disagreeable News by Letters from Marsailles, that the Emperor of Morocco has caused most of the Danish Merchants established at Saffia and St. Croix, to be arrested, and their Effects to be sequestred, notwithstanding

ing the Solemn Cession he had made of those two Places to his Danish Majesty.

*Cassel, Nov. 6.* The Baron de Wyllick, Aid de Camp to his Prussian Majesty, arrived here a few Days ago from Berlin, with a numerous Retinue. This Lord comes with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from his Prussian Majesty, and is empowered to demand in Form the Princess Guillemine, third Daughter of Prince Maximilian, for Prince Henry of Prussia; and that Princess has already received the Compliments of the principal Nobility on that Occasion.

*Ratisbon, Nov. 8.* Prince Charles of Lorraine, who set out on Wednesday last from Vienna, arrived here Yesterday Afternoon; and having received the Compliments of the Magistrates of this City by a Deputation, continued his Route for Brussels, where he proposed to arrive on Saturday next the 13th Instant.

*Brussels, Nov. 11.* The Government has received new Orders to compleat the National Troops of this Country; in Consequence of which they are now raising Recruits; a considerable Body of whom, and some Horses, arrived here lately for the respective Regiments.

*Brussels, Nov. 15.* Prince Charles of Lorraine, Governor General of these Provinces, arrived here on Saturday last from Vienna.

*Schoonhoven, Nov. 15.* Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante having been pleased to approve of the Nomination of the Magistrates of this Place, they were accordingly sworn in and installed Yesterday with the usual Ceremonies.

*Hague, Nov. 16.* The College of Nobles of this Province have this Day adjourned their Assembly; and To-morrow the Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty open their Assembly; but 'tis said the States of Holland and Westfrizeland will not assemble till the 24th Instant. The Deputies from the Body of Merchants of Amsterdam were admitted to an Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante Yesterday in the Afternoon, and returned Thanks, in Behalf of themselves, and the whole Body of Merchants of Amsterdam, for the great Care and Pains that were taken by the late Prince of Orange her Spouse, in establishing the Commerce of the Republick. Her Royal Highness received them very graciously, and gave them the strongest Assurances of her sincere Zeal for the Advancement of the Commerce of these Provinces. By Letters from Madrid of the 26th of October we learn, that a Decree has been published there, forbidding all Commerce whatsoever between the Subjects of his Catholick Majesty and those of the City of Hambourg; that the said Decree, which has been sent to all the Governors, Commandants and Intendants of Marine in the Ports of Spain, forbids the Admittance of all Ships from Hambourg after the Expiration of 50 Days; and says, that all Consuls, and Hambourg Merchants, shall be obliged to leave the Kingdom with their Effects within the Space of three Months from the Date thereof. We

hear the Noblesse of the Quarter of Nymeguen have conferred the Title of First Noble of that Quarter on the young Prince Stadtholder. We also hear, that Captain Steenis, Commander of a Dutch Ship of War named the Huys ten Bosch; has taken a Tunisian Corsair upon the Coast of Andalusia, and conducted her to Gibraltar.

### General Post Office.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.

This therefore is to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
