Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.} 1st of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Stockholm, Oct. 29. Their Majesties, attended by Count Tessin, the Barons Hopken and Palmstierna, and the Generals Ungern and Lieven; are gone to Drottningholm, to take the Diversion of hunting for a few Days. Their Majesties Coronation remains fixed for the 25th of next Month, for which very great Preparations are making.

Warsaw, Oct. 30. On Monday last Count Zalufki, President of the Tribunal of this City, arrived here from Dresden, and the same Day opened the said Tribunal. We have received Advice, that Prince Woroniecky, Starost of Lucko, Count Zamcysky, Palatin of Lublin, and Count Humiecky, are all lately dead at their respective Seats in the Country.

Prague, Nov. 3. The States of this Kingdom will open their Assembly on the 23d Instant; and the Commissaries appointed by the Empress Queen; for laying before them the Propositions of the Court, are daily expected here from Vienna. Most of the Regiments quartered in this Kingdom are already compleat, notwithstanding which, they continue to raise Recruits in the Room of such Invalids as are to be dismissed the Service and admitted into the Hospitals.

Modena, Nov. 4. We learn from Massa, that M. Sibon, whom the Duke our Sovereign employs in erecting a Port at the Mouth of the River Lavenza, is arrived there with several Engineers and others from Marsailles, in order to begin that Work.

Vienna, Nov. 6. His Serene Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine having taken his Leave of their Imperial Majesties, set out from hence Yesterday Morning on his Return to Brussels. They have fixed upon Monday next for the Distribution of the Premiums allowed by their Imperial Majesties amongst those who have excelled most in the Arts of Architecture and Painting. The Marriage of the young Count Wolkenstein, with the Countess d'Aprumont, one of her Imperial Majesty's Maids of Honour, was celebrated here on Sunday last, in the Presence of their Imperial Majesties and the whole Court.
