Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation:

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.} 1st of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly:

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Modena, Nov. 5. On Wednesday last in the Evening the Court came to their Palace in this City from Suffuolo. The Senator Motroni, whom the Republick of Lucca sent hither to settle some Disputes in Relation to the Limits of the Frontiers of the Garfagna, having produced his Credential Letters, his Serene Highness the Duke our Sovereign has appointed the Marques

Machiavelti to confer with him on that Subject. Within these few Days past the Court has received Advice, that the Dutchess of Penthièvre was happily delivered of a Princess at Paris; and that the Princess, Spouse to the Prince of Albani, and Sister to our Hereditary Princess, was safely delivered of a Prince at Rome.

Rome, Nov. 6. Advice having been received at Court, that several Barbary Corsairs have within this Fortnight past appeared on the Coast of the Ecclesiastical State, the Pope has caused Orders to be dispatched to Civita Vecchia, for equipping two Pinks to cruize against those Pyrates, in the Room of his Gallies, which were lately unrigged. The Prohibition against sending Corn out of the Ecclesiastical State, is carried into Execution with the utmost Rigour.

Warsaw, Nov. 6. The Tribunal of Petrikau continues its Assembly with the greatest Unanimity; and have appointed a Deputation to wait on the King at Dresden, in order to receive his Majesty's Instructions, and to assure him of their Readiness to carry them into Execution.

Vienna, Nov. 13. The States of Lower Austria, who opened their Assembly on Monday last in this City, have sent a Deputation to Schonbrun, at the Head of which is Count Konigsegg Erps, Provincial Marshal of the Diet, in order to receive the Propositions which her Imperial Majesty proposes to lay before them. The Court has sent circular Letters to all the Judges of the flat Country, to examine all Vagrants, and other loose or disorderly Persons, who shall come into their respective Districts, and to secure all those who are not capable of giving a good Account of themselves. It having been observed, that great Desertions have frequently happened in those Regiments where Prussian Deserters have been admitted, Orders are given that for the future none of those Deserters shall be enlisted. 'Tis said, that before the Departure of Prince Charles of Lorraine for Brussels, most of the Affairs of the Low Countries, and particularly those relating to the Barrier, were adjusted.

Berlin, Nov. 13. The King has granted a yearly Pension of six thousand Crowns to his new Great Chamberlain the Prince Colwaren Loos; with a Permission for him to go every Summer to visit his Estates in the Low Countries. His Majesty seems greatly satisfied with the Declaration that has been made by the Ministers residing here from the Courts of Dresden, Munich, and Manheim, touching the Steps that have been lately taken by those three Courts for adjusting the Differences that have arisen in Relation to the Vicaridge of the Empire. On Tuesday last, being the Birth Day of the Princesses

cess Amelia, who then entered into the 29th Year of her Age, the same was celebrated at Court as usual. The King has appointed Lieutenant General Count de Haake, to be Grand Bailiff of Zoffen, in the Room of the late Count Schewrin.

Ratisbon, Nov. 15. Yesterday a Resolution was taken in the Assembly of the Ministers of the Evangelical Body, to renew their Representations to the Emperor, in order, if possible, to obtain an immediate Redress of the Religious Grievances which still subsists in several Places in the Empire; and the said Representation is now actually drawing up in the College.

Brussels, Nov. 21. Prince Charles of Lorraine has declared, agreeable to her Imperial Majesty's Appointment, Field Marshal Count de Los Rios, to be Governor of Ath; and the Post of Commandant of that Place is given to M. Malowitz, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Aremberg. Her Imperial Majesty has also appointed Baron Woestenraedt, Count Marode, and M. de Caudelier, to be Majors General of her Armies. All the Imperial Regiments quartered in this Country being ordered to be compleated by the Beginning of next Spring, several of the Subaltern Officers belonging to the Regiments in this City and its Neighbourhood, are gone from hence in order to raise Recruits.

Hague, Nov. 23. On Saturday last M. Buteux and the Greffier Faugel, went to the House in the Wood, and acquainted her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, with the Resolution of the States General, for creating her Son Prince William V. Hereditary Stadtholder and Captain General of Brabant, Flanders, the Upper Quarter of Guelderland, and the three Counties of Outre Meuse, Wedde, and Westwoldingerland; and at the same Time administered to her Royal Highness the Oaths, in that Quality, as Governante and Guardian to the young Prince her Son. They likewise acquainted her Royal Highness, that their High Mightinesses had conferred on the young Prince Stadtholder, the Right of granting Pardons and Favours throughout the whole Extent of the Jurisdiction of the Council of Brabant, the City of Maestricht and its District, the County of Vroenhove, and the Jurisdiction of the Council of Flanders, and of the Court of the Upper Quarter of Guelderland; as also the Right of naming the Magistrates of the City of Bois-le-Duc; all which Privileges and Prerogatives are to be enjoyed by her Royal Highness during her Son's Minority. The Deputies of the Province of Overijssel, and those of the County of Drenthe, have been admitted to Audiences of the Princess Royal, to condole with her on her late Loss, and to tender her the Oaths as Governante and Guardian to the young Prince Stadtholder her Son. Yesterday Notice was given to their High Mightinesses, to the Council of State, and to the Committee of the Council of the Province of Holland, that the Body of the late Prince Stadtholder is to lay in State on Thursday next, the 25th Instant, in the Hall wherein his Serene Highness used to give Audiences, and might be seen from Ten to Twelve o'Clock in the Forenoon, and from Two to Four in the Afternoon.
