**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation,

*Advertisement.*

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st of January, O. S.</sup> 1st of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Naples, Nov. 9.* By Order of the Court ten Shebecks are building in this Port, which are to be compleated within the Month of January next. On the 16th past we had a violent Hurricane, accompanied with Thunder and Lightning, which burst on the House of a Merchant, and caused considerable Damage. On the 18th anchored at this Port from a Cruize, two of the King's Half Gallies to refit. They are ordered to sail again with all possible Expedition for the Coast of Calabria, the Rendezvous of the King's Sea Forces, to protect his Subjects from the great Impediment they meet with in their Commerce by the Barbary Pyrates.

*Rome, Nov. 11.* The Chevalier Cappello, the new Venetian Ambassador to this Court, arrived here on Thursday Morning last; and the same Day sent one of his own Secretaries to acquaint the Secretary of State therewith. The Pope has conferred the Abby which the late Cardinal Albani enjoyed in the Novarrais, of about the Value of 1000 Crowns per Annum, on Cardinal Mellini.

*Stockholm, Nov. 11.* The Diet of the States of this Kingdom continue their Assembly with the greatest Harmony imaginable, and it is expected will have compleated all their Business by the End of this Month. 'Tis now said for certain, that the Ceremony of their Majesties Coronation is actually fixed for the 8th of next Month, to see which, great Numbers of Foreign Nobility are already arrived here. They continue with great Diligence the Building of the Houses that were consumed by the late great Fires; and, according to the King's Example, the Senators, and other Persons of Distinction among the Nobility, have contributed very considerable Sums towards rebuilding the same.

*Prague, Nov. 13.* Orders having been given for preparing against the Spring new Cloaths for all the Troops quartered in this Kingdom; the Officers of the Regiments in Garrison in this City and its Neighbourhood, are already taking the necessary Measures for that Purpose.

*Dresden, Nov. 13.* Their Majesties are still at St. Hubertsbourg with the whole Court, and propose to reside there till the End of this Month. A few Days ago died at Chemnitz Major General Franckenbourg; and the King has already disposed of the Regiment he commanded in Favour of General Perck.

*Vienna, Nov. 15.* Last Week the Court dispatched an Express to Petersbourg, with the Pictures of their Imperial Majesties and the young Imperial Family, as likewise those of Prince Charles and the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain; they were done at the Desire of the Empress of Russia, and are to be placed in the Great Hall of her Palace of Czarkazelo. On Monday next their Imperial Majesties propose coming hither from Schonbrun for the Winter. We have received Advice, that the Differences which have subsisted for some Time past between the Electors of Saxony, Bavaria, and Palatin, in Relation to the Right of exercising the Function of Vicar of the Empire, in Case of the Emperor's Death, are at length happily adjusted to the mutual Satisfaction of those three Courts. This News gives great Pleasure here, and 'tis said the Convention agreed upon on this Occasion, will be immediately laid before the Diet of Ratisbon for their Approbation, in order to its being afterwards ratified by his Imperial Majesty.

*Hague, Nov. 25.* Yesterday the States of Holland and Westfrizeland opened their Assembly. This Day her Royal Highness the Princess Governante nominated the Magistrates of this Place for the Year ensuing.
