**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

*Advertisement.*

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st of January, O. S.</sup> <sub>11th of February, N. S.</sub> in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick; to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Whitehall, December 7.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto Joshua Van Neck, of Putney, in the County of Surry, Esq; The Dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain.

*Rome, Nov. 23.* A few Days ago a secret Consistory was held at the Quirinal, at which the Pope and many Cardinals assisted, when the Abbe Mastrandre's Qualifications for accepting the Bishoprick of Vico in the Kingdom of Naples, were approved, and he was accordingly confirmed in the same. The Court of Madrid has caused a Bank to be established in this City for the advancing to the Spanish Ecclesiasticks such Sums of Money as they may want for paying Fees to the Datary, which they have hitherto been obliged to borrow at the extravagant Rate of Six per Cent. The Ceremony of the Beatification of Maria Francisca de Chantal, Foundress of the Order of the Visitation, will be performed To-morrow with great Solemnity in the Church belonging to that Order. The Marquess de Malespine, Minister from the King of the Two Sicilies to the Court of Dresden, arrived here some Days ago, and will in a Day or two continue his Journey for Naples. Cardinal Landi having resolved to spend the Remainder of his Days in Retirement, is daily expected to resign his Archbishoprick of Benevento, but it is not said as yet who is like to succeed him in that rich Benefice.

*Franckfort, Dec. 3.* The Elector of Mayence is still at Aschaffembourg, and intends staying there till the 15th Instant, when he proposes coming to this City for the Winter. Several private Letters from Strasbourg say, that the Magazines of that City had been lately filled with great Quantities of Corn; but the general Opinion was, that it was only brought thither in order to be shipped for the French Settlements in America.

*Dusseldorp, Dec. 9.* Most of the Members who compose the Diet of the States of Juliers and Bergues, are already arrived in this City, and will open their Assembly in a few Days, M. Ammon, the King of Prussia's Resident at Cologne, and Directorial Councillor of the Circle of the Lower Rhine, being expected here To-day or To-morrow to assist thereat. We learn from Bonn, that the Elector of Cologne has conferred on M. Browmann, the Place

Place of Director of the Chamber of Finances, in the Room of Baron Frankenbourg. The same Advices add, that it was generally reported, that his Electoral Highness intended shortly to take a Tour to Munich.

### General Post Office.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.

This therefore is to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
