lowing Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found neceffary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Ufe of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers fent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, defiring him to transmit the faid Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

WHereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships failing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the faid wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, flanding further within the Land at the Diftance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, 21st of January, O. S. and to commence on the $\frac{2110}{110}$ of February, N. S. in the enfuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick; to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly. Should the forefaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Cafe a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill. Rome, Nov. 23. A few Days ago a fecret Confistory was held at the Quirinal, at which the Pope and many Cardinals affifted, when the Abbe Mastrandre's Qualifications for accepting the Bishoprick of Vico in the Kingdom of Naples, were approved, and he was accordingly confirmed in the fame. The Court of Madrid has caused a Bank to be established in this City for the advancing to the Spanish Ecclesiasticks fuch Sums of Money as they may want for paying Fees to the Datary, which they have hitherto been obliged to borrow at the extravagant Rate of Six per Cent. The Ceremony of the Beatification of Maria Francisca de Chantal, Foundress of the Order of the Visitation, will be performed To-morrow with great Solemnity in the Church belonging to that Order, The Marquess de Malespine, Minister from the King of the Two Sicilies to the Court of Drefden, arrived here fome Days ago, and will in a Day or two continue his Journey for Naples. Cardinal Landi having refolved to fpend the Remainder of his Days in Retirement, is daily expected to refign his Archbishoprick of Benevento, but it is not faid as yet who is like to fucceed him in that rich Benefice.

Franckfort, Dec. 3. The Elector of Mayence is still at Aschaffembourg, and intends staying there till the 15th Instant, when he proposes coming to this City for the Winter. Several private Letters from Strafbourg fay, that the Magazines of that City had been lately filled with great Quantities of Corn; but the general Opinion was, that it was only brought thither in order to be shipped for the French Settlements in America. Dusseldorp, Dec. 9. Most of the Members who compose the Diet of the States of Juliers and Bergues, are already arrived in this City, and will open their Affembly in a few Days, M. Ammon, the King of Pruffia's Refident at Cologn, and Directorial Councillor of the Circle of the Lower Rhine, being expected here To-day or To-morrow to affift thereat. We learn from Bonn, that the Elector of Cologn has conferred on M. Browmann, the Place
