Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said washing Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.} _{11th of February, N. S.} in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Lemberg, Nov. 29. We have received the melancholy News of a Fire's breaking out a few Days ago at Katifow, which burnt with great Violence, and reduced the greatest Part of that Town to Ashes. This fatal Accident has thrown Numbers of the poorer Sort of Inhabitants of that Place into extreme Misery and Want, having no other Shelter or Subsistence than what they can collect from the Inhabitants of the Neighbouring Villages.

Parma, Nov. 30. Publick Prayers are put up in all the Churches of this City for the happy Delivery of the Infanta Dutchess our Sovereign, who now grows near her Time. By different Advices received here from Corsica we learn, that the Affairs of that Island seemed to be running into as great Confusion as ever.

Stockholm, Dec. 6. The Resolutions of the Diet of the States of this Kingdom are taken with such Unanimity, that, notwithstanding they have many important Affairs still before them, 'tis not doubted but they will separate in the Course of next Month.

Vienna, Dec. 10. On Wednesday last, being the Emperor's Birth-Day, who then entred into the 43d Year of his Age, the same was celebrated at Court as usual. Besides the Treaty lately concluded, by which the Peace of Italy is so happily established, 'tis said there is another on the Tapis, the principal Design of which is to preserve the Tranquility of the Empire. They continue to talk of their Imperial Majesties intended Journey to Fieume and Trieste in the Spring, in order to view those two Ports, and to give such Directions as they shall think necessary for the Improvement of Commerce. The States of Lower Austria continue their Deliberations with great Success; and 'tis not doubted, but that the Propositions that were laid before them by the Empress Queen, will be unanimously agreed to. Field Marshal Count Koenigsfegg continues extremely ill, and has received the last Sacraments. The Marquess de Spada, Grand Master of the Household of the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain, died here this Week. The Empress Queen has sent Orders for discharging all the Debts contracted by her Troops in the Low Countries during the late War. Count Batthyani, Palatin of Hungary, arrived here a few Days ago.

Copenhagen, Dec. 11. We have received Advice, that our two Ships, bound for Tranquebar, both passed the Sound a few Days ago, and continued their Voyage with a favourable Wind.

Berlin, Dec. 14. The Diversions of the Winter began upon the King's coming to Town, and several Foreign Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, are already arrived here to partake of them. His Majesty has given Orders for augmenting his Guards with a Regiment of Hussars, consisting of Five Squadrons. On Thursday next there is to be a great Hunting Match in the Neighbourhood of Grunnewald, at which the King, all the Princes of the Royal Family, the Duke of Brunswick, and a great Number of the Nobility and General Officers are to be present; after which his Majesty proposes giving them a grand Entertainment at the Castle of Charlottenbourg.

Franckfort, Dec. 15. The Price of Corn is considerably risen, not only in this City and its Neighbourhood, but also in all the neighbouring Provinces, which is attributed to the large Quantities the French have bought up to fill the Magazines at Strasbourg, and other Places in Alsace.

Bonn, Dec. 17. The Elector of Cologne our Sovereign, accompanied by the principal Lords of the Court, set out from hence on Wednesday Morning last for Munich.

Hague, Dec. 21. 'Tis said the Corps of his late Serene Highness the Prince of Orange is to be interred on the 15th of next Month. Yesterday the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Wolfenbuttle set out from hence for Brussels.
