HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain, within the Space of one Year, from the Twenty Fifth Day of March, One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty two.

An Act for continuing and granting to his Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One thousand Seven hundred and Fifty two.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

And to two private Bills.

AT the Court at St. James's the 19th Day of December 1751,

P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS his Majesty was pleased, by his Proclamation bearing Date the 29th Day of March 1750, to declare, That all Passes of the present Form now in being, which had been granted for Ships and Vessels belonging to his Majesty's Subjects Trading in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algier, should not continue in Force longer than until the First Day of April 1752, (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Passes;) and his Majesty did thereby strictly charge and command all his Subjects, who were, or should, be possessed of any such Passes, that they should before the said First Day of April 1752, return the same (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of the Customs at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of his Majesty's Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they should furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High

Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, as by the said recited Proclamation is directed— And whereas since the issuing the said Proclamation, it has been agreed by and between his Majesty and the Dey of Algier, that the Passes of the present Form should not expire so soon as the said First Day of April 1752, but be continued and remain in Force until the Thirtieth Day of October 1752; at which Time the Passes of the New Form are to commence; except only in the Case of Ships going to the East-Indies, or other remote Voyages, whose Passes are to continue good for the Space of Three Years from the Thirtieth Day of October 1751.—His Majesty, with the Advice of his Privy-Council, doth therefore hereby declare and order, That the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force until the said Thirtieth Day of October 1752; upon which Day the Passes of the New Form shall commence and take Place, except in the Case of Ships going to the East-Indies, or other remote Voyages, whose present Passes are to remain good for Three Years from the said Thirtieth Day of October 1751.—And his Majesty doth hereby charge and command all his Subjects who shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the said Thirtieth Day of October 1752, return the same (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great-Britain, or to the respective Collectors of the Customs at the Out-Ports of Great-Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of his Majesty's Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a New Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain and Ireland in lieu thereof, agreeable to the Requisites of his Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation of the Twenty-ninth of March 1750.—Whereof all Persons whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and conform themselves to his Majesty's Pleasure hereby signified.

Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy
Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark,
has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of New-
castle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State,
the following Account from Copenhagen, dated
the 30th of October N. S. It having been found
necessary to change the Situation of the Fire
kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point
of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Ma-
riners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice
thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in
Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers
sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a
Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to trans-
mit the said Advertisement to England, for the
Information of the British Traders to the Bal-
tick; of which Advertisement the following is
a Translation.

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon
which a Fire has been kept hitherto in
the Night Time for the Direction of Ships
sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed
away by the Sea; and there is now erected,
instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower
of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further with-
in the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred
Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred
Feet more towards the North; upon which
Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future,
and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.}
_{21st of February, N. S.}
in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Or-
der of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c.
this Notice is given to the Publick, to the
End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the
Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course
through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be
destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent
Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in
that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted
up upon the Tower, instead of that which has
hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Naples, Nov. 30. The Eruption of Mount
Vesuvius has been very violent, and continues
still, insomuch that Publick Prayers are ordered
to be continued for nine Days successively, to
implore the Divine Assistance on so extraordi-
nary a Juncture. The King has obtained the

Pope's Consent for the Suppression of the Con-
vents of the Order of Benedictines in the Two
Sicilies, commonly called Collarettani, on Con-
dition of employing their Revenues in charitable
Uses, especially towards erecting the new Hospi-
tal which is building in this City for the Poor;
and the Fryars of those Convents are to be distri-
buted in the Convents of the Augustinians. A
few Days ago three Parties of Banditti, who
have lately infested the neighbouring Villages,
were arrested and conducted Prisoners to this
City, escorted by Parties of Grenadiers. On
the 18th their Majesties and the Royal Fa-
mily, attended by their respective Retinues and
Guards, returned to this City from Portici,
Rome, Dec. 4. The necessary Utensils and
Materials having been compleated and transported
from Gaeta to Porto d'Anzio, for repairing that
Port, under the Direction of two eminent En-
gineers, the Pope has ordered a large Supply of
Money from the Treasury for the commencing
of that Work. On the 13th Instant Cardinal
Portocarrero returned to this City from Parma,
after having stood as Proxy for the King of Spain,
at the Christening of the young Princess of Par-
ma; and on the 16th he had an Audience of
the Pope. It is said that he is to repair to Ma-
drid in the Spring, by Order of the Court of
Spain.

Florence, Dec. 6. M. de Verelst, late En-
voy Extraordinary from the States General to the
Court of Turin, after having observed the Cu-
riositys of this City, set out from hence a few
Days ago for Naples, where he is to reside with
the same Character. Two of the Emperor's
Ships of War are disarmed at Porto Ferrajo, by
his Imperial Majesty's Directions, and their
Crew and Officers (the Captain, first Lieute-
nant, Carpenter and Boatswain only excepted)
are discharged and paid off. The third Ship is
kept in Commission, to be made Use of upon
any Occasion.

Parma, Dec. 9. The Infant Dutchess was
this Morning happily delivered of a Princess.

Stockholm, Dec. 10. On Tuesday last the
Ceremony of their Majesties Coronation was
performed here with that Magnificence and So-
lemnity as is scarcely to be expressed. And
Yesterday the four Orders which compose the
States of this Kingdom waited on his Majesty,
and took the Oaths of Allegiance usual on this
Occasion, and were afterwards splendidly enter-
tained at Dinner by his Majesty. The publick
Rejoicings have been continued for three Days,
during which the Houses in this City were all
illuminated, and Fireworks were played off
every Night.

Munich, Dec. 12. Last Sunday the Preg-
nancy of the Electress of Bavaria our Sovereign
was declared at Court, to the great Joy of
the Inhabitants of this Electorate.

Dresden, Dec. 14. The Distemper amongst
the Horned Cattle, which was thought to have
entirely ceased in this Electorate, is broke out
again with great Violence in several Places, and
great Numbers of Cattle die of it every Day.

Hambourg, Dec. 14. M. Marteville, ap-
pointed Envoy from the States General to the
Court of Sweden, arrived here last Night.
