PRESENT,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Hereas his Majesty was pleased, by his Proclamation bearing Date the 29th Day of March 1750, to declare, That all Passes of the present Form now in being, which had been granted for Ships and Vessels belonging to his Majesty's Subjects Trading in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algier, should not continue in Force longer than until the First Day of April 1752, (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Passes;) and his Majesty did thereby strictly charge and command all his Subjects, who were, or should, be possessed of any such Passes, that they should before the said First Day of April 1752, return the same (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of the Customs at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of his Majesty's Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they should furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, as by the said recited Proclamation is directed— And whereas fince the issuing the said Proclamation, it has been agreed by and between his Majesty and the Dey of Algier, that the Passes of the present Form should not expire so soon as the said First Day of April 1752, but be continued and remain in Force until the Thirtieth Day of October 1752, at which Time the Passes of the New Form are to commence; except only in the Case of Ships going to the East-Indies, or other remote Voyages, whose Passes are to continue good for the Space of Three Years from the Thirtieth Day of October 1751. -His Majesty, with the Advice of his Privy-Council, doth therefore hereby declare and order, That the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force until the said Thirtieth Day of October 1952; upon which Day the Passes of the New Form shall commence and take Place, except in the Case of Ships going to the East-Indies, or other remote Voyages, whose present Passes are to remain good for Three Years from the said Thirtieth Day of October 1751 ——And his Majesty doth hereby charge

and command all his Subjects who shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the said Thirtieth Day of October 1752, return the same (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great-Britain, or to the respective Collectors of the Customs at the Out-Ports of Great-Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of his Majesty's Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a New Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain and Ireland in lieu thereof, agreeable to the Requisites of his Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation of the Twenty-ninth of March 1750. WAlter Titley, Efq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmarks has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of States the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N.S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, deliring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

WHereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships failing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the 21st of January, O. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration

Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course

through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Thursday last his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went to the House of Peers with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, his Grace gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills, viz.

An Act for granting and continuing to his Majesty an additional Duty on Beer, Ale, Strong Waters, Wine, Tobacco, Hides, and other Goods and Merchandizes therein mentioned, and for probibiting the Importation of all Gold and Silver Lace, except of the Manufacture of Great Britain.

An Act for Payment of the principal Sum of One hundred and twenty thousand Pounds, in Discharge of so much of the National Debt; and for granting to his Majesty an additional Duty on Wine, Silk, Hops, China, Earthen, Japanned, or Lacquered Ware, and Vinegar; and also a Tax of four Shillings in the Pound on all Salaries, Profits of Employments, Fees, and Pensions, to be applied to discharge the Interest of the said principal Sum, until the same shall be paid; and also to pay an Interest of Four Pounds per Cent. per Annum for the Sum of One hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred Pounds, which will remain due after Payment of the said Sum of One hundred and twenty thousand Pounds, and towards the Discharge of the said Sum of One bundred and seventeen thousand five bundred Pounds, or so much thereof as shall remain due on the 25th Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and fifty one.

At the presenting of which Bills, the Speaker of the House of Commons made the following Speech to the Lord Lieutemant.

stance of his Majesty's paternal Regard and Attention to our Happiness: Those distinguished Talents which recommended your Grace a second Time to that high Station which you formerly filled, with equal Abilities and Integrity; your perfect Knowledge of our true Interest, and your approved Inclinations to promote it on every Occasion, qualify you in the best Manner, faithfully to represent a dutiful and loyal People to the greatest and best of

Kings.

The Provision made this Session of Parliament for the further Reduction of the National Debt, and the Endouragement given to the Protestant Charter Schools, for the Advancement of Religion and Industry, are Considerations of the most interesting Nature to every Well-wisher to this Country; they must inspire us with the warmest Sentiments of Duty to his Majesty, and engage us to contribute every thing in our Power, to perpetuate the Honour of your Grace's Administration, by co-operating with you in all fuch Measures as may enlarge and secure to us the Advantages of our present happy Situation: It is with very great Pleasure, therefore, that, pursuant to the Command of the Commons, I now present these two Bills of Supply to your Grace for the Royal Assent.

The Commons being returned to their House, resolved, Nem. Con. That the Thanks of this House be given to the Right Honourable Henry Boyle, Esq; their Speaker, for the Speech by him made this Day at the Bar of the House of Peers; and that he be desired to print the same.

Madrid, Dec. 20. Saturday the 18th of this Month, being the Queen of Spain's Birthday, the same was celebrated at Court with great Magnificence. In the Morning their Catholick Majesties received the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Nobility, and Foreign Ministers in the Drawing-Room; but the King having been slightly indisposed the Day before with a severish Disorder, there was no Besarranos; and the Opera, that was to have been performed at Night in the Retiro, was put off. His Majesty has since had some slight Returns of his Fever, but is To-day thought to be perfectly recovered, though he has not appeared in Publick since the Queen's Birth-day.

Paris, Dec. 31. Last Wednesday Morning died here Prince Charles of Lorrain, his most Christian Majesty's Grand Ecuyer, and was buried this Day in the Forenoon: His Nephew the Comte de Brionne, who had the Survivorship of his Place, has been declared Grand Ecuyer; and the Governments of Picardie and Artois, which Prince Charles had, are given to

the Duke de Chaulnes.
