Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st} of January, O. S. ^{1st} of February, N. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand-Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Naples, Dec. 7. On the 30th past, in Consequence of the Pope's Bull for the Suppression of Eleven Convents of Monks of the Order of the Benedictins, the Chief Chaplain of this Kingdom, being properly authorized from Rome, went to the Convent of S^{ta}. Maria della Fede, and caused an Inventory and a Conignment to be made of all the Furniture and Effects of that Convent; having directed likewise the same Orders to the respective Bishops of the Kingdom, who, agreeable to their Instructions, suppressed the said Convents, and distributed the Monks amongst the Convents of the Dominicans. On the 4th Instant the Queen of Spain's Birth Day was celebrated at Court with the usual Solemnity. At Noon the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and Military Officers, appeared at the Palace in their richest Habits to compliment their Majesties on this Occasion; and, in the Evening, there was an Opera at the Theatre of the Court, and a triple Discharge was made of the Cannon of the Fortresses. Count Policastro, who was banished from this City for Misbehaviour, has obtained the King's Leave to repair here for two Months, on Account of his Health. On the 6th their Majesties and the Royal Family, attended by their respective Retinues and Guards, set out for Caserta, where they propose to pass some Weeks.

Rome, Dec. 11. A few Days ago arrived in this City from Tuscany, M. de Verelst, the late Envoy from the States General at the Court of Turin, on his Journey to that of Naples with the same Character. Last Week Cardinal Landi arrived here from Benevento, with a Design to renounce that Bishoprick, and it is said M. Pacha is to succeed him.

Florence, Dec. 17. On the 4th Instant Mr. Acton, Commodore, of the Emperor's three Ships of War, arrived here from Porto Ferrajo, and has since had several Conferences with Count Richcourt, relating to Naval Affairs. On the 8th the Emperor's Name Day was celebrated here with the usual Solemnity; on which Occasion the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and Military Officers, appeared in their rich Habits; and, in the Evening, the usual Fireworks were played off, and the Cannon of the Castles were fired.

Petersbourg, Dec. 14. The Preparations that were making for her Imperial Majesty's Journey to Moscow are suspended for the present. On Friday last her Imperial Majesty's Birth Day was celebrated at Court as usual, when Mr. Funck, the new Polish Envoy Extraordinary to this Court, had his first private Audience, and delivered his Credential Letters. We have received Advice by the Way of Astracan, that the Sophi of Persia, being greatly alarmed at the considerable Progress made by Prince Heraclius in Ghilan, had marched with a powerful Force into that Province, and totally defeated that Prince's Army, after a desperate Engagement. The same Advices add, that this important Victory will, in all Probability, entirely re-establish the Tranquillity of Persia.

Stockholm, Dec. 16. On Thursday last his Swedish Majesty conferred the Dignity of Count on the Baron de Lowen, Governor of Pomerania, on the Baron de Rosen, Commander in Chief of the Swedish Troops in Finland, and on some others. And at the same Time Vice Admiral Kiddarstolpe, and the Majors General Ackerhielm and Kulbars, had the Title of Barons conferred on them.

Hambourg, Dec. 24. By several private Letters received here from Franckfort upon the Mayne we have Advice, that the Protestants have at length obtained Permission to build themselves a Church in that City, and the same is accordingly to be begun next Spring.

Vienna, Dec. 25. Notwithstanding the repeated Advices received here of the Plague's being entirely ceased at Constantinople, her Hungarian Majesty has sent fresh Orders to the Officers commanding her Troops upon the Frontiers of Hungary towards Turkey, to continue taking the same Precautions they have hitherto done, in order to prevent that fatal Distemper's being brought into her Dominions. By Letters from Peterwaradin we have Advice, that the two new Magazines of Ammunition and Provisions, lately erected there, have been entirely reduced to Ashes, without any Person's being able to give the least Account how the Accident happened.

Hague, Jan. 4. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has approved of the Nominations that have been presented to her of the Magistrates of Amsterdam, Turgau and Gorcum for the Year ensuing. M. Bedaulx is appointed by her Royal Highness Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Major General Thierry. By Letters from Italy we are informed, that Count Stampa, Knight of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, and General of Foot in the Service of their Imperial Majesties, died at Milan on the 15th of last Month in the 72d Year of his Age.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
