Walter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

Whereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat; is almost washed away; by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the ^{21st of January, O. S.} _{1st of February, N. S.} in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c; this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Constantinople, Dec. 7. We have been (God be thanked) for some Weeks free from the Distemper; it ceased almost instantaneously; the Priests of the Frank Hospital, after performing a Quarantaine, are returned to the Convents, and all Communication is re-opened. Smyrna, by all Advices, has been quite uninfected, and likewise Cyprus, Scanderoon, and Aleppo, and all Parts of the Coast of Syria. Our Advices from Persia inform us, that almost every Province of that Kingdom having a Schach, that Country continues in the utmost Confusion.

Munich, Dec. 31. The Elector of Cologne arrived here Yesterday, accompanied by M. de Rolt, his Master of the Horse. The Electress of Bavaria is so well recovered of her Indisposition; as to intend appearing in Publick Tomorrow; and the Chancellor is now out of Danger.

Dresden, Jan. 2. Their Polish Majesties intend to set out for Warsaw soon after Easter.

Hambourg, Jan. 4. Letters from Stockholm mention, that the States of Sweden re-assembled on the 23d of last Month, and were that, and the following Day, in Deliberation upon a Proposal which they had received from his Swedish Majesty, That they should name three Persons for his Majesty's Election of one of them to fill the Post of President of the Chancery, become vacant by the Resignation of Count Tessin.

Hambourg, Jan. 7. The Bishop of Lubeck is returned to this City, and intends passing the rest of the Winter here with the Dutchess his Mother; and Prince George of Holstein is expected here some Time next Month.
