ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty, King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500 *l.*

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record, at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.



And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them,) shall, directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Naples, Dec. 28. The Duke de Policastro, whom the King banished some Time since to his Estate, having fallen into a lingering Disorder, his Majesty has permitted him to come to this City for two Months to take the Advice of his Physicians. The two Magistrates of Aquila, who were brought here some Months ago, and committed to Prison on Account of bad Management, were set at Liberty on Wednesday last, after having been deprived of their Employments.

Leghorn, Dec. 31. The Master of a French Ship just arrived in this Port from Tunis says, that in his Passage he met at Sea with two Tunessian Corsairs, conducting to Tunis three Barks which they had taken in the Catalonian Seas.

Petersbourg, Dec. 31. On Wednesday last was celebrated at Court the Anniversary of the Empress's Birth Day, who then entered into the 43d Year of her Age. On this Occasion a triple Discharge was made in the Morning of the Cannon of the Fortrefs and of the Admiralty, and at Night the whole City was illuminated. The same Day Count Lynar, the Danish Minister, set out from hence for Copenhagen, having received of the Empress a Present of 1000 Ducats, besides the usual one of 3000 Rubles. The Esclavonian Officers who came here some Time since to solicit for Leave to enter into her Imperial Majesty's Service, are at length all provided for according to their Rank. This Court seems greatly pleased with the Dispatches it has lately received from Stockholm, as they tend to the adjusting in an amicable Manner, all Disputes relating to the Limits of Finland.

Genoa, Jan. 3. The Count de Sartyrane, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia to this Republick, has informed the Government, that the King his Master has concluded a Treaty with the Courts of Vienna and Madrid, for establishing the Tranquillity of Italy. We learn by private Letters from Corsica, that the Affairs of that Island are so far from being peaceably settled in the Manner as was insinuated, that the Marquess de Grimaldi, the Republick's Commissary General, solicits strongly to be recalled, on Account of the perpetual Uneasiness he labours under there. A few Days

ago arrived here about 200 Recruits, raised in Swisserland, for the Service of the Troops of that Nation in the Pay of the King of the Two Sicilies; but as the great Quantity of Snow that is fallen in this Country, makes it absolutely impossible for them to continue their March, they are quartered in the Villages round this City, where there Officers oblige them to observe a strict Discipline. We learn by our last Letters from Cadiz, that they have received Advice, that the Island and Fortrefs of St. Gabriel, upon the River Plate, has been evacuated by the Portuguese to the Spanish Troops that the Governor of Buenos Ayres had sent to take Possession of them. The Masters of several Ships which have arrived here within these few Days from the Ocean assure us, that there are a considerable Number of Barbary Corsairs cruizing near the Straits of Gibraltar, in order to intercept the Spanish Register Ships that are expected at Cadiz from the West-Indies.

Copenhagen, Jan. 8. On the 5th Instant, the Court went into Mourning for the Death of th late Queen, when the King and Queen-Mother received the Compliments of Condolance from the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that melancholy Occasion. The Mathematician whom the Court sent some Time ago to Iceland, to make Observations on that Climate, finds, that though they have not quite so much Heat as we have here, yet the Difference between the two Climates, in cold Weather, was not very considerable. He adds, that the Northern Lights are more frequently seen there than here, but that they were seldom troubled with foggy Weather.

Franckfort, Jan. 15. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rhine opened their Assembly on Monday last, but have not as yet taken any Resolutions relating to Taxes. We have received Advice, that the young Prince, of whom the Princess of Hesse Rothenbourg was lately delivered, has been christened by the Names of Charles-Phillippe, the Elector Palatine standing Godfather. And from Luneville we hear, that the Academy of Sciences established at Nancy by King Stanislaus, is in a very flourishing Condition, it consisting already of 70 Members, most of them being Gentlemen of great Learning.

Dusseldorp, Jan. 17. The Members who composed the Diet of Juliers and Bergues, are setting out successively for their own Homes. The Rhine, which was overflowed some Days ago, is now confined to its Natural Channel; and the Navigation of that River, which was entirely interrupted thereby, goes now on again as before.

Vienna, Jan. 18. Her Imperial Majesty advances happily in her Pregnancy, and enjoys a good State of Health. Count Leopold de Daun is set out from hence for Neussadt, in order to give Directions for erecting the Military School the Empress is going to establish at that Place. And the Baron de Toussaints is setting out to visit the Manufactures established by her Imperial Majesty in her Hereditary Countries.
