Whereas his Majesty has been pleased, by his Royal Proclamation of the 29th of March 1750, and by his Order in Council of the 19th of last Month, to direct that Passes of a new Form shall be issued to all his Subjects Trading in the Way of the cruising Ships of the States of Barbary; My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that in Pursuance of the aforesaid Proclamation and Order in Council, Passes of a new Form will be ready to be issued at this Office from the 1st of February next, to such Persons as shall apply for them; and at his Majesty's Foreign Colonies and Plantations as soon as conveniently may be; but that such Passes of the old Form as have been issued will nevertheless continue in Force till the 30th of October next.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 31st of December 1750, to the 30th of June 1751, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf;
