Madrid, Aug. 14. He a instant arrived here an Express from Naples to give her Majesty an account of the disorders at Message. There has been of late no Action in Gatalania; as well the French as our Troops having so fortified themselves in their several Camps that they Cannot attempt any thing on the one fide or the other. The 8 instant arrived here 500 Hosse from Andalufia who are to march for Catalonia. The Prince of Montesarchio and Don Beltran de Guevarra are gone hence for Barcelona to take possession of their respective Commands, the one as General of the Sicilian; and the other of the Neapolitan Galleys. From Gadiz of the s instant they write that the General of the Royal Armada, Don Melthor de Cueva, was embaiked on the Capitana in order to fail with fuch ships as he had with kim to joyn with the rest of the Armada at Barcelona.

Francfort, August 22. On unday salt the young Count Souches passed through this place by Post for Frenna. The Troops of the Duke of Lunenburg are at present within two Leagues from this City, and this day the Dike of Ho'flein Piven their Velt Marthal General, and Monsseur de Ch evel Lieurenant General arrived here; to morrow it is faid thefe Troops are to pass through this place, in order to their con-junction with the Duke of Bourne witte, who so foon as they arrive will decamp, and march towards

Monsieur de Turenne.
Coblenis, Aug. 20. The Prince of Baden being off his murch with 5000 men to joyn with the other Confederate Troops Commanded by the Duke of Bournonville hath received orders from the Emperor to rerum for hwith to the Imperial Aimy, but the Elector of Treves and the Baron d'Iffola uling great inftances with the faid Marquels to continue his marchanotwithstanding the said Orders to the Palatinate, he hath fo far yielded to them, as to remain with his Troops in the Territory of the Prince of Hessen Rhainfeld, till the return of the Courier which he has on this fubject disparched to Vienna. From Strasburg they write that Monsieur de Turenne continues between Landam and Weissenburg, and that he was about fortifying Billecum; and from Spire we hear, that Monfieur de Turenne had fent part of his Troops towards the Saar. We have advice that Yesserday the Lundeburg Troops encamped between Giessen and Wezlar, and that to morrow they are expected to arrive in the Neighborhood of Francfort. The Duke of Bournonville lyes full between the Rhyne and the Min, having his Quarters from Geram to Bengheime.
Ditto, Aug. 23. Our Letters from Phitipsburg tell

us, that the Troops which it was thought Monfieur de Turenne had sent into Lorraine, were marched part of them towards Brifac, and the others towards saverne, to fetch from the first place 12 great pieces of Canon, and from the latter a great many Wagons with Ammunition and other Military Provisions and to convoy them to Monsieur de Turennes Army, which is at present encamped between Landan and Weissenburg on a little River called Queich where Monfieur de Turenne is refolved to fortifie his Camp , and int. the mean time cates great Provision to be made of all things necessary for the substituence of his Troops. The Confederate Troops under the Command of the Duke of Bournonville continue in their former quarters.

Cologne, Aug. 24. From Lipstadi they write; that on Saturday last the Elector of Brandenburg intended to hold a general Rendezvous of his Forces near Mansfeldt, and the Monday following to decamp and begin his march. The Baron d'Ifola is at present at Francfort from whence he intends to pass to Vienna.

from the Camp before Grave, Aug. 22. The 18 in-flant at night the Enemy made a Salley, at first with a few men only, but still reinforcing them as they were engaged, they had at last out 500 men, between whom and our Troops Commanded by Collonel Choffer, for the Enemy attacked his Post, there was a tharp differe till morning, many men having been killed on both fides, at last the French were forced to retreat to the Town again, and about 8 a clock both parties agreed to a ceffation for the burying the dead; It is faid that Monsieur Pas late Governor of Nacrden for the French was killed in this Rengounters in the mean time as well we as the besseged employ the Canon against each other without any in-termission; and we now begin to m ke use of our Granadoes, Ge: Our Trenches are acvanted to the Palissadoes of the Enemies outworks.

Hague, Aug. 24. The last Letters we received from Flanders lest the Confederate Armies encamped near St. Giflain; they tell us that they had great hopes of the speedy recovery of Count Walder, as well as of several other Persons of quality who were wounded in the late Fight, a particular account of which the States received this day in a Letter from the Prince of Cringe, but is no more than what you fave already heard. The last week the Ratifications of the Treaties concluded between this State and the King of Denmarke, as likewife with the Elector of Brandenburg and Dukes of Luneaburg were interchanged. From the Palatinate our Letters tell us, that Monfieur de Turenne continues near I andaw, having fent several Troops towards the saar, to pass on from thence into Lorraine; and some Letters say that Monsseur de Turenne will follow them in Person, leaving only a flying Army of 5 of 6000 men under the Sommand of the Marquels of Vaubrun between Philipphurg and Landam: The Duke of Bournouville keeps still his Quarters not far from Guffavusburg between the Mayn. and the Rhyne, where he expects the arrival of the Prince of Euden with 5000 men, as likewise the Lunenburg Troops which are 10000 men. From France fort they write that the Son of Count Southes General of the Imperial Army was passed through that place in great hast for Vietna, being sene by his Father to give the Emperor an account of the lage Fight. The Siege of Grave advances Hill very flowly, though it is faid that this evening the States have by an Express recleved advice from Monfiedr Rabenhaupt, that

the French had quitted all their outworks, having let fire to their Huts, &c. and were retreated into the Town, which we as yet know not how to give any abfolute credit to,

Ghent, August 244 Our Armies continue still encamped about st. Giflain, On Monday last was held a Councel of Warr at Mons in the Lodgings of Count Walderk, whose wounds will not permit him to take the Field fo suddainly as was hoped, but the Prince of Lorraine was so well as to be present at the Councel, and begins to walk abroad. The Convoy defigned to go from Bruffels to the Army, does not yet itir, upon advice, that a body of French Horse is abroad to intercept it. On Wednesday night arrived here three Datch Regiments of Foot, and it is faid more are followingson their way to Bruffet from whence they are to march to the Army. Amidst these preparations of Warr many people discourse of the likelyhood there feems to be that a Peace may be concluded this Winter, which these Countries earnestly desire.

Ghent, Aug. 28. From Bruffels they write, that on Sunday last in the evening the Count de Montery arrived there very unexpectedly from the Camp with a Convoy of 3000 Spanish Horse Commanded by the Prince of Vaudemont; That the same day arrived there Monsieur Beaumont Secretary to the States of Holland with a confiderable fumme of Money for the Prince of Orange, and that he intended to depart with the great Convoy that goes this day from Bruffels to the Aimy; with the said Convoy marched about 5000 Durch Foot, who have been drawn out of several Garrisons. The Armies are in the mean time removed from St. Giffain and are at present encamped between Kieuraing, Conde and Valenciennes; and from the Camp they write that when this great Convoy arrives from Bruffels they will go and befiege fome confiderable place, but that they are in the interim in such scar-bity of Forage, that the Foragers are every day forced to goe 3 or 4 Leagues, by which means they often fall into the hands of the French. The Prince of Conde lies encamped on the other side of the Sambre between Marchienne au Pont, Ham fur hajue and Walcourt, the Van of his Army being near Phi ipville; and at Marcheinne du Pont ke has lest a considerable Body of Horse and Foor to secure that Passage; It is said his Army. has plenty of Provisions and lies much at their ease, very narrowly observing our Morions. The Count de Merode is dead of his wounds in the French Camp, Kefferday arrived at Bruffels the Prince of Courland with a handsom Train, and is gone this day to the Armies. Amperp, Aug. 28. We have Letters from the Prince

of Oranges Camp dated the 25 inffant, which tell us that they were then marching from St. Giffain towards Volenciennes; that the Armies were composed, of 40000, Foot and 20000 Horfe; and befides that the Brandenburg Troops which are 15 or 16000 men are on their march to joyn them. In the mean time there feems to be a great want of good Officers in the firmy, very few having escaped the late Fight; as you may fee by the following Lift. Paris, August 25. His Majesty having as we told in our last, caused his Orders to be published for the affembling the Arrearban, great numbers of Gertry in obedience thereunto are already come together, and expect his Majetties Command how farther to dispose of themselves.
