*ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.*

**B**Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, *viz.*

*5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.]* By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty, King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500 *l.*

*7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.]* By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record, at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any

other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

*9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.]* By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime,

Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at *Westminster*, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them,) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

*Algiers, Jan. 27.* The two Ships that brought here the Presents which the Regency of *Hambourgh* were engaged by a late Treaty to make to the Dey and principal Members of the Divan, put to Sea a few Days ago on their Return Home. These Presents consist of 52 Pieces of Iron Cannon with their Carriages, 4 Bras Mortars, 10,000 Balls, 2400 Bombs, 1300 Barrels of Powder, a great Quantity of Lead, Cables, Cordage, and about 2000 Planks of Oak.

*Naples, Feb. 1.* M. Verelt, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, is to have his Audience of Leave of the King and Queen next Week; after which he soon proposes setting out on his Return for the Hague. The King has ordered two Men of War, four Gallies, and four Chebecks, to be equipped by the Middle of next Month, in order to cruize on the Barbary Pyrates, who continue to infest the Coasts of this Kingdom, and greatly interrupt our Commerce. The Building of the Men of War, now on the Stocks, goes on very briskly; and Yesterday a fine Chebeck, of 24 Guns, was launched in the Presence of a Multitude of People.

*Leghorn, Feb. 4.* The Letters received here Yesterday [from different Parts of Italy, and particularly from the Lunegiana, were full of melancholly Accounts of the great Damages they have received by the Overflowing of the Rivers. But by Letters from Rome we are assured, that the Waters of the Tiber had been falling off for two Days together, so that their Apprehensions of the Overflowing of that River seemed to be vanish'd for the present.

*Bologne, Feb. 6.* We have received Advice, that four Genoese Ships, which were returning from Sicily, laden with Corn, have been cast away in a violent Tempest, on the Coast of the Ecclesiastical State; and that every Soul had perished on Board them, except one of the Masters, who had saved himself by swimming.

*Stockholm, Feb. 10.* On Tuesday last their Majesties and the young Royal Family set out for Drotningholm for a Fortnight. The Diet continues its Deliberations with great Harmony, and 'tis thought will break up soon after Easter.

*Geneva, Feb. 14.* Last Month about 300 Inhabitants of the Valley of Piemont passed by this Place in order to settle in Prussia. They took their Route by Swisserland, and coming to Neuschattel, they solicited the Governor for the necessary Passports, and Money to bear their Expences to Brandenbourg; but the Governor telling them he had received no Orders relating thereto from the Court of Berlin, they all seemed greatly surprized, and immediately returned back.

*Dresden, Feb. 15.* The King has raised Colonel Count Nostitz to the Rank of Major-General. On Saturday last died General Olonne, who arrived here a few Days before from Vienna. To-morrow there is to be a grand Ball and Masquerade at Court, which finishes the Diversions of the Carnival.

*Hague, Feb. 24.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly Yesterday, have continued To-day their Deliberations. Their High Mightinesses have conferred on M. vander Esch, the Post of Advocate of this Province, in the Room of M. Patin. M. Winter, Counsellor of the Regency, and private Secretary to her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, who went some Days ago to Brunswick, to execute a private Commission, returned here on Sunday last, extremely pleased with the Reception he had met with.

*Whitehall, February 22.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable George Earl of Cardigan, the Offices of Constable of the Castle of Windsor and of Lieutenant of the said Castle, in the room of his Grace Charles Duke of St. Albans, deceased.
