· Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is Enacted as follows, viz.

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty, King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, follicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to fail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every fuch Oftence, 500 l.

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record, at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with Double the Value thereof.

ABSTRACT of Several Acts of 9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of fuch Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any fuch Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

> And the Attorney General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery fuch Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in fuch Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by fuch Offender.

> And that every Subject of His Majelty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any fuch Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforefaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforefaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than fuch as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Impriforment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them,) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were fent to, acquired, traded or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Naples, Feb. 8. The great Rains that have fallen in this Country for some Days past, have made the Roads impassable in many Places, to the great Hindrance of Commerce; and even some of the Couriers are obliged to go many Miles about before they can reach this City. A few Days ago the Aid Major of Barri's Regiment, who went off some Months since with a considerable Sum of Money he was intrusted with to purchase Cloth for that Regiment, was apprehended at Capua, where he has ever since secreted himself, and last Week the was escorted to this Place by a Detachment of Grenadiers, and committed to Prison.

TO Eon, Feb 19. The Elector our Sovereign proposes to leave Munich on the 8th or 9th of next Month on his Return hither, 'The great Qu ntity of Snow that has fallen here of late, has added greatly to the Diversions of the Carnival, as many of the Nobility and Gentry are almost daily Coursing in Sledges. We learn by our last Letters from Franckfort, that all the Imperial Officers in that City and its Neighbourhood, who have been there recruiting for some Time, have received Orders to repair to their respective Regiments, in order to be prefent at the General Reviews, that are appointed for the Month of April next. The same Letters add that the French continue to buy up great Quantities of Corfi in the Lower Palatinate, and in the Dutchy of Wirtembourg, in order to fill their new Magazines in Alface.

Rome, Feb. 12. The Differences which subfisted between this Court and that of Modena, are at last happily adjusted, and the Marquess Salvatico, who came here for that Purpose from Modena, is preparing to return to his Court.

Warfaw, Reb. 19. Their Majesties are expected here in the Month of May next, and tis said they will be accompanied by the Princes Charles and Xavier: They propose to stay here some Part of the Summer, and then go to Grodno, in the Great Dutchy of Lithuania, to assist at the General Diet of the States of that Kingdom, which is to assemble in the Beginning of October. We are informed by

Letters from Podolia, and other Provinces on the Frontiers, that Count Branicky, General of the Crown Army, has taken such prudent Precautions in the posting of his Troops, that no considerable Body of Heyducks have ventured to shew themselves for some Weeks past.

Hambourg, Feb. 25. M. Poniso, the Spanish & Consul, sets out this Evening or To-morrow Morning for the Hague, agreeable to the Orders he received by the last Post to quit this

City immediately.

Brussels, Feb. 28. 'Tis said the States of Brabant have at last come to a Resolution to rebuild the ancient Palace that was burnt down, and that the same will be begun as soon as the necessary Funds are provided. They continue working at the Canal from Bruges to Ghent, and 'tis thought it will be finished by the End of the Summer.

Groninguen, Feb. 28. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has been pleased to augment the Number of Prosessors in this University, who are to read publick Lectures, viz. Messrs. Bertling and Hollebeek on Theology; Messrs. Schwartz and Rukkers on Law and Equity; M. Lennep on the Oriental Languages; M. Wynpers on Philosophy; and M. Moine on the English and French Languages.
