TH E Sovereign having determined to hold a Chapter of the most noble Order of the Garter, and the Knights Companions Resident in or near London, being summoned to attend here this Day, there appeared habited in their Mantles only, the Knights herein after mentioned, with the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Salisbury, Chancellor, the Register, Garter King of Arms, and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, in their respective Mantles, wearing their different Badges, who all waited the Sovereign's coming; and, upon his Appearance, Garter, by the Sovereign's Command, called over the Names of the Knights Companions present, beginning with the Juniors, who thereupon proceeded from the Apartment next the Sovereign's Closet, to the Council Chamber, where the Chapter was held, in the following Method, where the Juniors went first; and the Knights whose Companions in the Stalls opposite to them were absent went single.

T H E S O V E R E I G N.

Upon entering the Council Chamber, the Knights stood behind their several Chairs till the Sovereign had seated himself in the Chair of State, at the upper End of the Table, and then, by his Majesty's Leave, took their Chairs; the Chancellor standing near his Majesty's Left Hand, and the three other Officers at the lower End of the Table.

The Chancellor, by the Sovereign's Command, declared his Royal Pleasure, that the five Stalls, now vacant, should be supplied. Garter was commanded to introduce his Royal Highness Prince Edward, who being brought to the Sovereign, preceded by Garter and the Black

Rod, kneeled down, and being Knighted with the Sword of State, and having kissed his Majesty's Hand, withdrew.

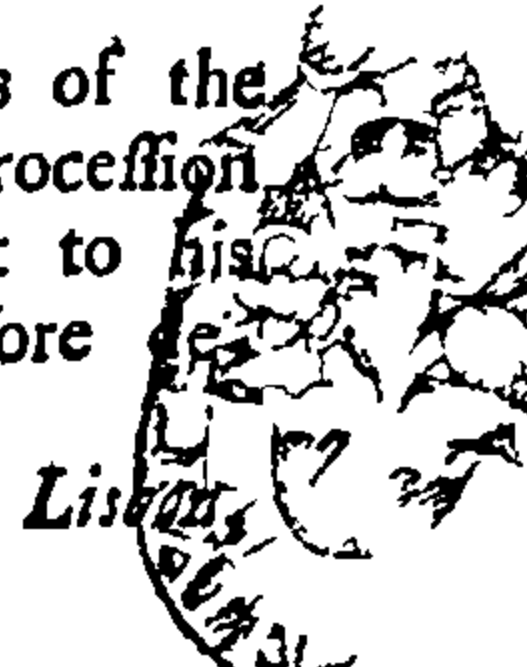
The Chancellor having collected the Scrutiny, and presented it on his Knee to the Sovereign, was directed by his Majesty to declare his Royal Highness Prince Edward duly elected; whereupon Garter and Black Rod were commanded again to introduce his Royal Highness, and having brought him to the Door of the Chapter Room, at the Entrance he was received by Earl Granville and the Duke of Bedford, the two Junior Knights, and conducted between them to the Sovereign, with the usual Reverences, preceded by Garter and the Black Rod, the former carrying, on a Crimson Velvet Cushion, the Garter, Ribbon and George; and having on his Knee presented to the Sovereign the Garter, his Majesty was pleased to deliver it to their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Cumberland, who buckled it about his Royal Highness's Left Leg, the Chancellor reading the Admonition. Then Garter in like Manner presented to the Sovereign the Blue Ribbon and George, who put it over His Royal Highness's Left Shoulder, athwart under his Right Arm, assisted by their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and the Duke, the Chancellor reading the Admonition: And his Royal Highness having again kissed the Sovereign's Hand, and thanked his Majesty for the great Honour done him, saluted all the Companions severally, and withdrew.

The Chancellor then collected another Scrutiny, and having presented it in like Manner to the Sovereign, was commanded to declare his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange duly elected.

The Right Honourable the Earl of Lincoln, and the Right Honourable the Earl of Winchilsea and Nottingham, having been knighted with the Sword of State, were elected and invested in the same Manner as his Royal Highness Prince Edward.

And lastly, the Right Honourable the Earl of Cardigan was declared duly elected.

Garter then called over the Names of the Knights Companions, and thereon a Procession was made back to the Apartment next to his Majesty's Closet, in the Manner before described.



Lisbon, Feb. 15. 'Tis confidently reported, that the Queen is again with Child. They continue to augment the Naval Force of this Kingdom, several Men of War being now actually on the Stocks, one of which, a 70 Gun Ship, is almost ready for launching. A few Days ago the Number of Workmen employed in erected the Palace of Corte Real was considerably augmented, so that there are now no less than 1500 Men employed on that Occasion.

Genoa, Feb. 26. A few Days ago some Disturbances happened in the Suburbs of Bisagno, that had like to have been attended with fatal Consequences; to prevent which, the Government sent thither a Party of Soldiers, in order to bring the Inhabitants, who were then in Arms, to Reason; but finding that impossible, and being informed they had got a great Number of Country People to join them, the Government was obliged to give Orders for acting more rigorously against them; and accordingly several Pieces of Cannon were pointed against the said Suburbs, which so intimidated its mutinous Inhabitants, that they immediately laid down their Arms, and submitted to all the Demands of the Government.

Copenhagen, March 7. The King has appointed the Countess de Schmettau to be Governante of the young Royal Family, which Post has been filled by the Baroness de Juel ever since the Death of the Countess d'Haxthausen. 'Tis said the Court will set out for Holstein the Beginning of May next. His Majesty has appointed the Count de Dannechiold Samsøe, to be one of the Directors General of the Posts in this Kingdom. The Regulation which the King of Prussia introduced into his Dominions for abridging the Proceedings at Law; and which this Court also ordered to be introduced, with some Variations, into this Kingdom, is now carrying into Execution in all the Courts of Justice.

Vienna, March 7. The Officers appointed for raising Recruits in the several Circles of the Empire during the Winter, have been so successful, that most of the Imperial Regiments, both Horse and Foot, are already compleat; and they talk of forming divers Camps during the Summer, in order to their being reviewed, and to compleat them in their new Exercise.

Hambourg, March 13. The last Advices received here from Persia, by the Way of Astracan, inform us, that the Army of Prince Heraclius of Georgia was encamped upon a Plain within a League and a half of Ispahan; and that Schach Doub had, at his Approach, abandoned that City, and was retired to the Mountains on the Side of Erivan.

Paris, March 15. There has lately been more Robberies in the Streets of this City than perhaps ever were known; and, although several Persons are in Prison on that Account, yet there is scarcely a Night passes that we do not hear of some Robberies being committed, which makes it very unsafe for People, even upon Business, to be out after 'tis dark.
