WHITEHALL: The following being the laft Act of Parliament for the better preventing Thefts and Robberies, and for regulating Places of Publick Entertainment, and punishing Perfons keeping diforderly Houfes, is here inferted for the Information of the Publick.

Garden, or other Place, kept for publick Dancing, Musick, or other publick Entertainment of the like Kind, in the Cities of London and Westminster, or within Twenty Miles thereof, without a Licence had for that Purpose, from the last preceding Michaelmas Quarter Seffions of the Peace, to be holden for the County, City, Riding, Liberty, or Division, in which such House, Room, Garden, or other Place, is fituate, (who are hereby authorized and impowered to grant fuch Licences, as they in their Difcretion shall think proper) fignified under the Hands and Seals of Four or more of the Justices there affembled, shall be deemed a diforderly House or Place : And every fuch Licence shall be figned and fealed by the faid Justices in open Court, and afterwards be publickly read by the Clerk of the Peace, together with the Names of the Justices subfcribing the fame; and no fuch Licence shall be granted at any adjourned Seffions; nor shall any Fee or Reward be taken for any fuch Licence: And it shall and may be lawful to and for any Constable, or other Person being thereunto authorized, by Warrant under the Hand and Seal of one or more of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace of the County, City, Riding, Division, or Liberty, where such House or Place shall be situate, to enter such House or Place, and to feize every Perfon who shall be found therein, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law: And every Person keeping fuch House, Room, Garden, or other Place, without, fuch Licence as aforefaid, shall forfeit the Sum of One hundred Pounds to fuch Perfon as will fue for the fame; and be otherwise punishable as the Law directs in Cafes of diforderly Houfes. Provided always, and it is hereby further enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That in order to give publick Notice what Places are licenfed pursuant to this Act, there shall be affixed and kept up in some notorious Place over the Door or Entrance of every fuch House, Room, Garden, or other Place, kept for any of the faid Purposes, and so licensed as aforefaid, an Infeription in large Capital Letters, in the Words following; videlicet, LICENSED PUR-SUANT TO ACT OF PARLIAMENT OF THE TWENTY FIFTH OF KING GEORGE THE SECOND; and that no fuck House, Room, Garden, or other Place, kept for any of the faid Purposes, although licensed as aforefaid, shall be open for any of the faid Purposes, before the Hour of Five in the Afternoon; and that the affixing and keeping up of fuch Infeription as aforefaid, and the faid Limitation or Restriction in Point of Time, shall be inferted in, and made Conditions of, every such Licence; and in Case of any Breach of either of the faid Conditions, such Licence shall be forfeited, and shall be revoked by the Justices of TO the Peace in their next General of Quarter Sellions, and

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An Act for the better preventing Thefts and Robberies, and for regulating Places of publick Entertainment, and punishing Persons keeping diforderly Houses.

THEREAS the advertising a Reward with no Questions asked, for the Return of Things which have been loft or fto-Jen, is one great Cause and Encouregement of Thefts and Robberies; be it enacted hy the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Confent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this prefent Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the fame, That from and after the First Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and fifty two, any Person publickly advertifing a Reward with no Questions aked, for the Return of Things which have been tolen or loft, or making use of any Words in such publick Advertisement, purporting, that such Reward shall be given or paid, without feizing or making Enquiry after the Perfon producing fuch Thing fo tolen or lost, or promising or offering, in any such publick Advertisement, to return to any Pawnbroker, of other Person, who may have bought or advanced Money by way of Loan, upon fuch Thing fo stolen or lost, the Money so paid or advanced, or any other Sum of Money or Reward for the Return of such Thing; and any Person printing or publishing Juch Advisement, shall respectively forfeit the Sum of Fifty Pounds for every fuch Offence, to any Perfon who will fue for the fame. And whereas the Multitude of Places of Entertainment for the lower Sort of People, is another great Caule of Thefts and Robberies, as they are thereby tempted to spend their small Substance in riotous Pleasures, and in Consequence are put on unlawful Methods of supplying their Wants, and renewing their Pleasures : In order therefore to prevent the faid Temptation to Thefts and Robberies, and to correct as far as may be the Habit of Idlenes, which is become too general over the whole Kingdom, and is productive of much Mischief and Inconvenience; be it enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That from and after the First Day of December, One thousand ieven hundred and fifty two, any House, Room,
