Naples, April 11.

**T**HE Queen continues to advance happily in her Pregnancy, and 'tis expected will be brought to Bed by the End of next Month, or the Beginning of June at farthest. The Workmen employed in digging up the Ruins of the ancient City of Heraclea, have made some very valuable Discoveries within these few Days past. Since our small Squadron of Ships of War, Gallies and Chebecks put to Sea on a Cruize against the Barbary Corsairs, those Pyrates have entirely quitted these Coasts, and we hear they are now cruising in the Sardinian Seas, and upon the Coast of the Ecclesiastical State.

Genoa, April 15. The Great and Little Council have assembled for several Days together upon the Affairs of Corsica, which at present give great Uneasiness to this Government. The Count de Sartyrane, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia to this Republick, is on his Departure for Turin.

Florence, April 16. We learn from Leghorn, that the Trade of that Place is visibly encreasing, as appears by the great Number of Ships which have lately arrived in that Port; and which, 'tis imagined, is chiefly owing to the Convention lately concluded with the Regency of Barbary.

Rome, April 18. On the 9th Instant the Pope performed, in the Presence of the greatest Part of the Sacred College, the Ceremony of consecrating the new Bishop of Albano, to which Cardinal Spinola was lately presented; in which Ceremony he was assisted by the Cardinals Guardagni, Spinelli, Delci, Alexander Albanj, Corsini, and Colonna. The Commissaries who were sent to Subaico, on Occasion of the Tumults which lately happened at that Place, are already returned hither, and have brought with them the principal Promoters of those Tumults, who are all committed to Prison, and ordered to be prosecuted with the utmost Severity. By our last Letters from Naples we are informed, that the King of the two Sicilies has presented Father Orlandi to the vacant Bishoprick of Giovenazzo.

Munich, April 27. The Elector Palatine and his Family arrived here on Saturday last. He was saluted upon his Arrival by a tripple Discharge of the Cannon upon our Ramparts;

and on Monday his Highness left this Place on his Journey Home.

Hague, May 4. This Morning M. Calmette, Minister from this Republick to the Court of Portugal, set out from hence for Lisbon. Within these few Days past several Military Officers, who have lately been promoted by her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, took the usual Oaths before the Council of State, in order to qualify themselves for their several Employments.
